IT WAS A TOUGH decision that the Chamber of Commerce's board of directors made this past week, to withdraw its sponsorship of Bull Town Days.

The celebration has been beset by lack of participation in recent years, but it was apparent to many people that the timing of the celebration was wrong from a community-involvement angle.

Having the event on the final weekend before the start of school was sort of like having the climax of a gospel meeting the same night of the biggest football game of the season--you expect that your event is likely to suffer.

On that last weekend of summer, almost everyone, at least those with children in school, are anxious to work in that last trip out of town before getting settled down to the long grind of the school year.

It isn't too surprising that the chamber has had trouble lining up workers to run off the various events, much less have the attendance and/or participation in the events once they are held.

Bull Town Days is the county's second-oldest local celebration (only to Friona's Maize Days), and has enjoyed considerable success in its time.

It has always been our contention that communities should hold onto their local celebrations, since they provide an identity, and a common goal for citizens to work toward.

With that in mind, it is hoped that some organization will take on Bull Town Days; if not for an annual, perhaps on an alternate-year or other schedule. We need to hold on to our traditions as long as possible.

THIS BEING AN odd year (by the calendar), it is the year that the University Interscholastic League (UIL) will re-draw and possibly reshape the district boundaries for UIL competition.

School officials and coaches always hold their breath until the new alignments are announced, and hope for the best.

There has been some talk this year of re-vamping the enrollment set-up, in order to increase the number of 4A teams in the state. Currently, whereas there are 32 districts in 2A, 3A and 5A, there are only 16 districts in the 4A classification.

What the UIL might do, is attempt to make a more or less equal number of teams in each classification. The extra teams for 4A would have to come down from 5A, and up from 3A, with a lot of other schools being shifted one way or the other.

Besides there being a smaller number of schools in 4A, there are more schools in class A than any other division, and while some of the larger schools in this division could be moved into class 2A, a big majority of these are small schools, and would be unable to compete on a larger level.

We get accustomed to having certain schools and teams in our districts, but sometimes when the re-alignment procedures are completed, some of the old rivals are lost, perhaps due to enrollment changes.

This was the case the last time around, when Olton dropped from a 3A school down into class 2A, and Vega went from class 2A into A.

With enrollment figures continuing to change for almost every school, and with the possibility of restructuring the entire setup, there's no telling how it will affect the local school and its district alignment. But everyone will know within the next week or so. Until then, we just have to hope for the best.

Chamber Withdraws As BTD Sponsor

The Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture recently had their regular meeting in October and Bovina's Bull Town Days was taken into careful consideration. It was the concensus of the directors that due to lack of participation and local interest they have decided to withdraw their sponsorship of Bull Town Days.

It was felt that perhaps another organization might be interested in taking sponsorship of this event or re-scheduling the celebration on a five year basis. The Bovina Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture would welcome any comments or suggestions regarding the continuation of Bull Town Days.

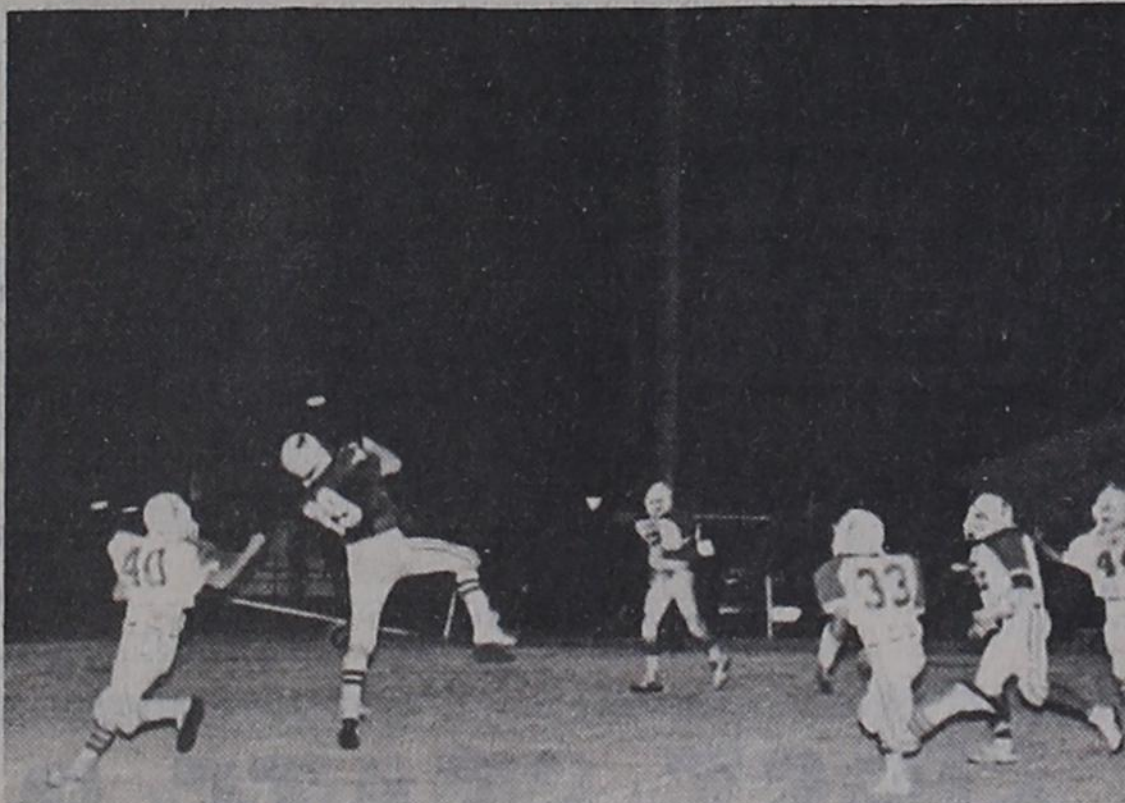
Everyone is invited to attend the carnival on Halloween night.

Burial was in the Bovina Cemetery under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

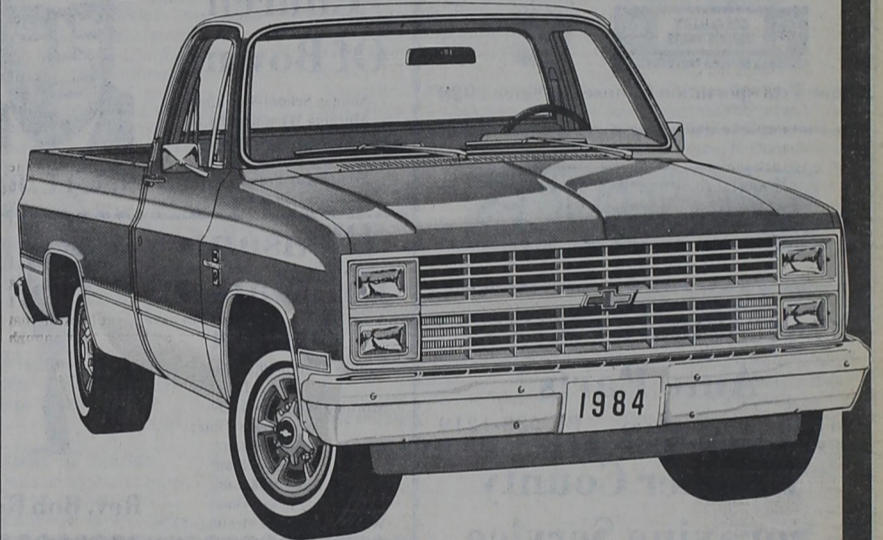
