Oldest Postmaster Is Dead. he oldest postmaster in the United States in continuous service, Roswell Beardsley, of North Lansing, near Ithaca, N. Y., died on Friday at the age of 93 years. He had been postmaster at North Lansing since he was ig years of age, a period of seventy-four years. His appointment was made in 1828, and he must, therefore, have been originally an appointee of John Quincy Adams, the predecessor of Andrew ackson.
