It also provides for the fine and mprisonment of＂any person who shall unlawfully and know－ ingly stop and detain live stock that have crossed any quarantine line＊＊after said stock have been inspected by an officer duly authorized to make such inspec－ tion and found not to have tick in number sufficient to commu nicate disease，or after being sprayed as provided in article 5043 n ，etc．，or during the time between Nov． 15 and Jan．15，etc． The sum of $\$ 20,000$ is appro－ priated to carry out the provis－ on of the bill．

The Two Widows at Coberg.
The whirligig of time sometimes moves over a small cycle in its quick rotation of events. Who would have prophesied forty years ago that the widow of Ulysses Grant and the widow of Jefferson Davis would be inti mate friends in the year 1902?
The impression and somewhat pathetic intimacy of these two notable women was brought about by propinquity.
During the past summer Mrs Grant and Mrs. Davis have stayed in the little Canadian vil lage at Coberg. Without know ing it they selected adjoining cottages and thus came to see each other every day.
It is not known who made the first advances toward aequaintance, but the two women were seen sitting side by side every day for weeks. They held themselves aloof from the other cottagers and seemed absorbed in each other's company.
What a theme for an Ameri can artist!
It should be painted and hung as a companion piece to Appomattox when Grant said to the beleaguered and worn remnant of the ragged Confederacy : "Keep your horses, you will need them to plow your fields."
Ulysses Grant sleeps beneatn the tomb of a conqueror and the soil of Virginia wraps the clay of Jefferson Davis. The path of glory and defeat leads but to the grave, where bitterness and hate are at an end. Along with these two great leaders lie the host who died:
