

"MY TURN"

WHILE ENJOYING a juicy watermelon over the Fourth of July holiday, my adult children reminded me that when they were small, I used to tell them not to swallow the seeds or they would sprout in their tummies and the vines would grow out their ears.

What atrocious things we tell our children! Most of these were handed down to us from our mothers and grandmothers who used colorful metaphors to encourage children to behave correctly. I guess that was before "getting grounded" was invented.

For instance, do you remember being told that "Children should be seen but not heard"... "You'd lose your head if it wasn't tied on"... "You can't fool me; I've got eyes in the back of my head"... "The Old Buggerman will get you if you don't watch out"... "You know just about enough to be dangerous"... "I've talked to you about that until I'm blue in the face"... "If you had a brain, you'd take it out and play with it."

It's a wonder any of us ever grew up with the ability to think for ourselves, or had an ounce of creativity left by the time we reached voting age. Who were the free-thinking individuals who came up with such indispensable items as the ball-point pen, the zipper, the flushing toilet, scotch tape, the safety pin, the screwdriver and the toothpick, all the while his or her mother was saying, "If you don't quit wasting time with such foolishness as that, you'll never amount to a hill of beans."

Mothers of the pre-1950 vintage were really good at the ultimate guilt trip with such all-time favorites as: "You're not the only pebble on the beach"... "Pretty is as pretty does"... "Your time will come"... "You embarrassed me so much, I just wanted to sneak"... "When I talk to you it just goes in one ear, and out the other"... "You'd try the patience of Job"... "Don't pout or you'll trip over your bottom lip"... "You're squirming around like a worm in hot ashes" (this was usually issued in a loud whisper during church service) and then "What will the neighbors think?"

We were also in jeopardy of growing up to look like freaks because we were told: "Keep a stiff upper lip"... "Don't bite your nails or you'll get fat"... "Drinking coffee will stunt your growth"... "Your eyes are bigger than your stomach"... "Don't cut off your nose to spite your face"... "Little pitchers have big ears"... all followed up with "Don't look like that or your face will freeze that way."

There were several expressions reserved for young girls when they began to express an interest in boys: "Boys don't make passes at girls who wear glasses"... "I wouldn't trust him any farther than I could throw a horse"... "You're known by the company you keep"... "Going steady is like putting all your eggs in one basket"... "I'll tell you that when you're older." Here's a really old one about a girl planning to marry a fellow whose last name started with the same letter as hers... "Change the name and not the letter, change for worse and not the better."

Many of the old expressions centered around table manners and eating correctly: "You eat like a horse. Chew with your mouth closed"... "Don't make a pig of yourself." Many of us today blame our dieting-gorging habits on such conflicting suggestions as: "Always leave a little on your plate for 'Mr. Manners'; he'll be along later" and "Eat everything on your plate; there are starving children in China."

Then, after we found out about Santa Claus, the Easter Bunny and the Tooth Fairy, we didn't for a minute believe Mom when she said, "This is going to hurt me worse than it does you."

Chris Wilson Takes Part In Student Fete

Chris Wilson, a student at Bovina Junior High School, has been selected to participate in Duke University's 1988 Summer Residential Program for academically gifted students. This program, which is administered by the Talent Identification Program (TIP), is open to seventh through tenth graders.

Selection for the program is based on scores from the Scholastic Aptitude Test or the American College Testing Program Assessment, tests normally taken by college-bound eleventh and twelfth graders. Only a small percentage of younger students achieve the high scores required for admission.

The Summer Residential Program offers intensive, fast-paced courses in the humanities, social sciences, natural sciences, and computer science. Students enroll in a single course during a three-week term and generally complete the equivalent of a year of

high school or a semester of college-level work. While at Duke, Chris will be enrolled in Latin I.

Seventh graders from Texas who participated in Duke University's Eighth Annual Search for mathematically and verbally brilliant students were honored at ceremonies held at Trinity University and Baylor University on June 17-18.

The 1966 students invited to the Texas ceremonies had attained at least one of the following criteria: an SAT-Math score equal to or greater than 500 (for boys) or 450 (for girls); an SAT-Verbal score equal to or greater than 430; a TSWE (Test of Standard Written English) score equal to or greater than 52; an ACT-Math score equal to or greater than 21 (for boys) or 17 (for girls); an ACT-English score equal to or greater than 24; an ACT-Social Studies score equal to or greater than 20; or an ACT-Natural Science score equal to or greater than 25.

On the state level, Chris was recognized for his individual scores in math, science, history, English, and also for his composite score.

Four Texas colleges gave out scholarships and Chris received one of them.

Chris is the son of Kregg and Brenda Wilson of Bovina.

Bovina Junior High School received a State Certificate of Distinction for having a student who attained the following criteria: ACT-Math at or above 26; English at or above 28; Social Studies, at or above 27; Natural Science, at or above 31; and ACT Composite at or above 26.

Sprayers Name New Manager

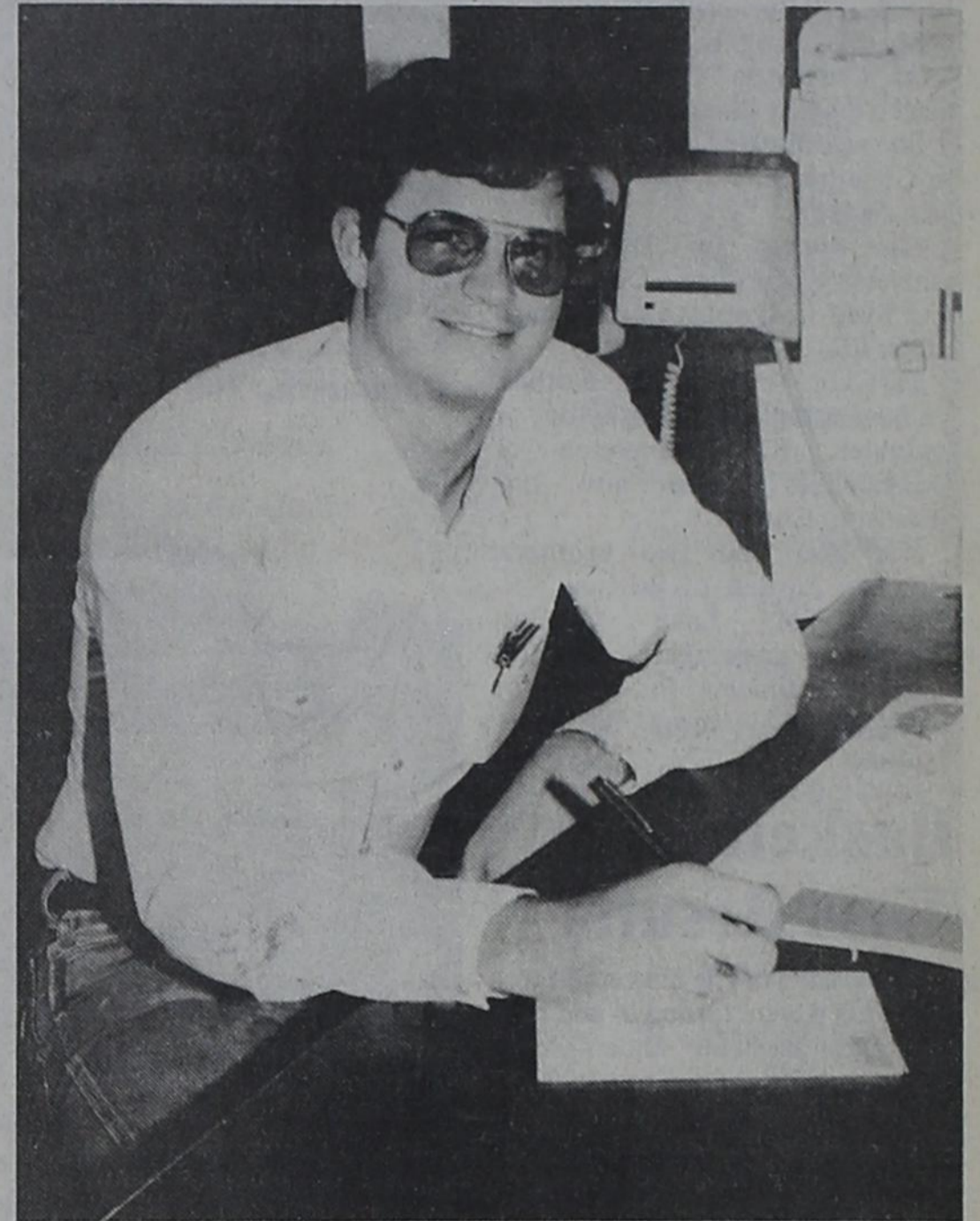
Agri-Sprayers is now under new management. Coleman Young is manager and comes from Hereford to Bovina.

He and his wife, Melissa, have two children, a daughter, Lacie, who is three years old and a son, Mathew, who is ten months old.

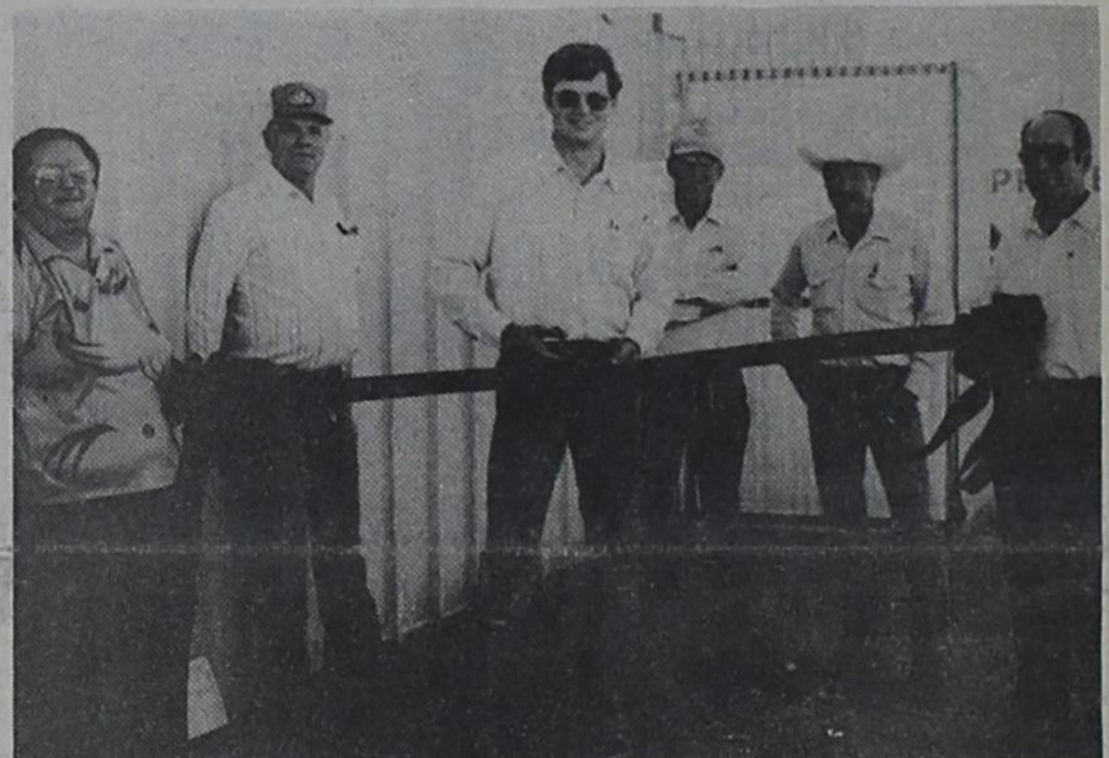
He said they would be moving to Bovina as soon as their house sold in Hereford. They are happy to be associated with Agri-Sprayers.

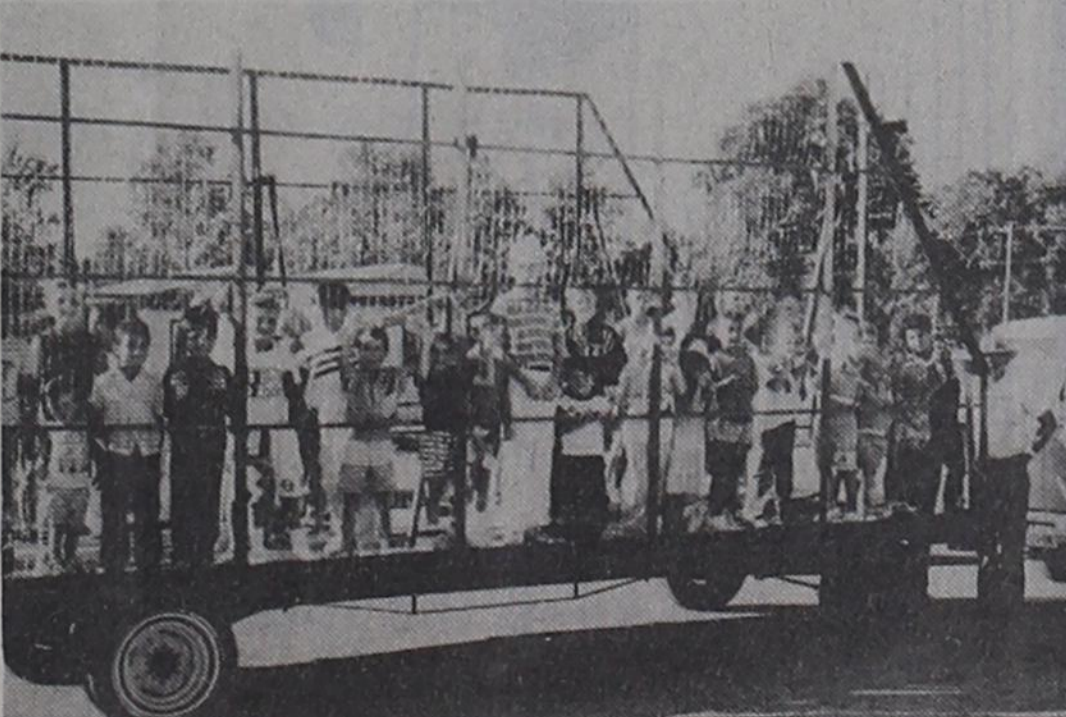

The results of the basketball toss held July 4 were turned in and they are: age six and under--Corey Oliver made eight in a row to win a youth-size basketball.

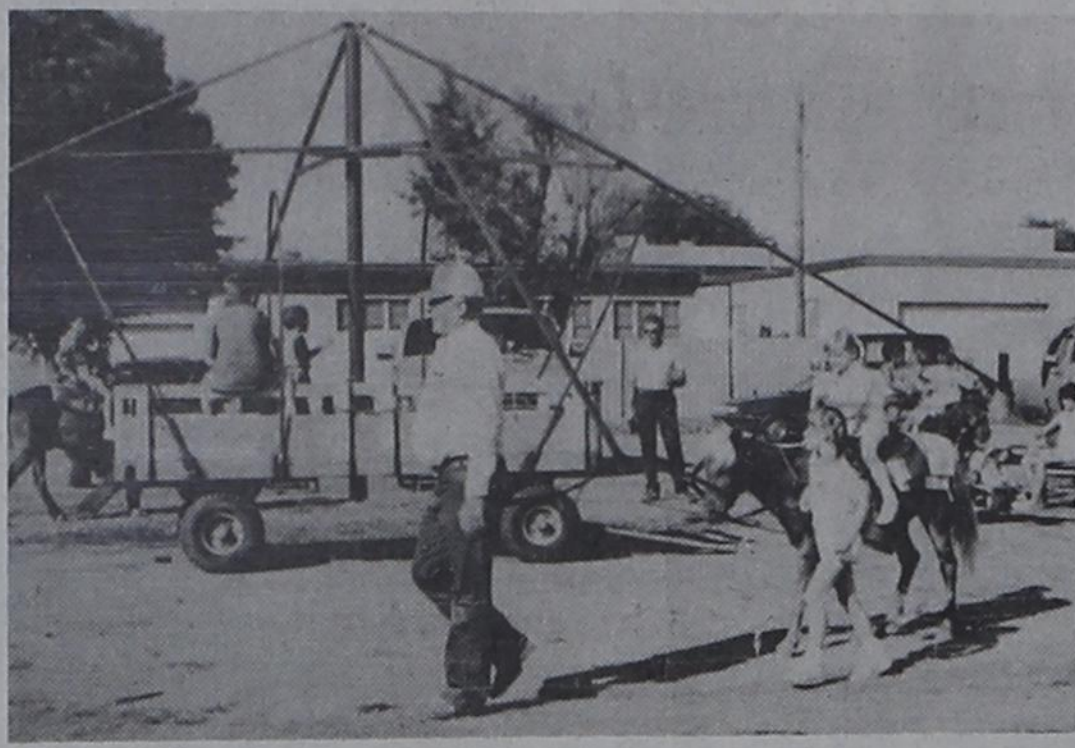
Age 7-12--Roel Garza made ten in a row to win an official size Wilson basketball.

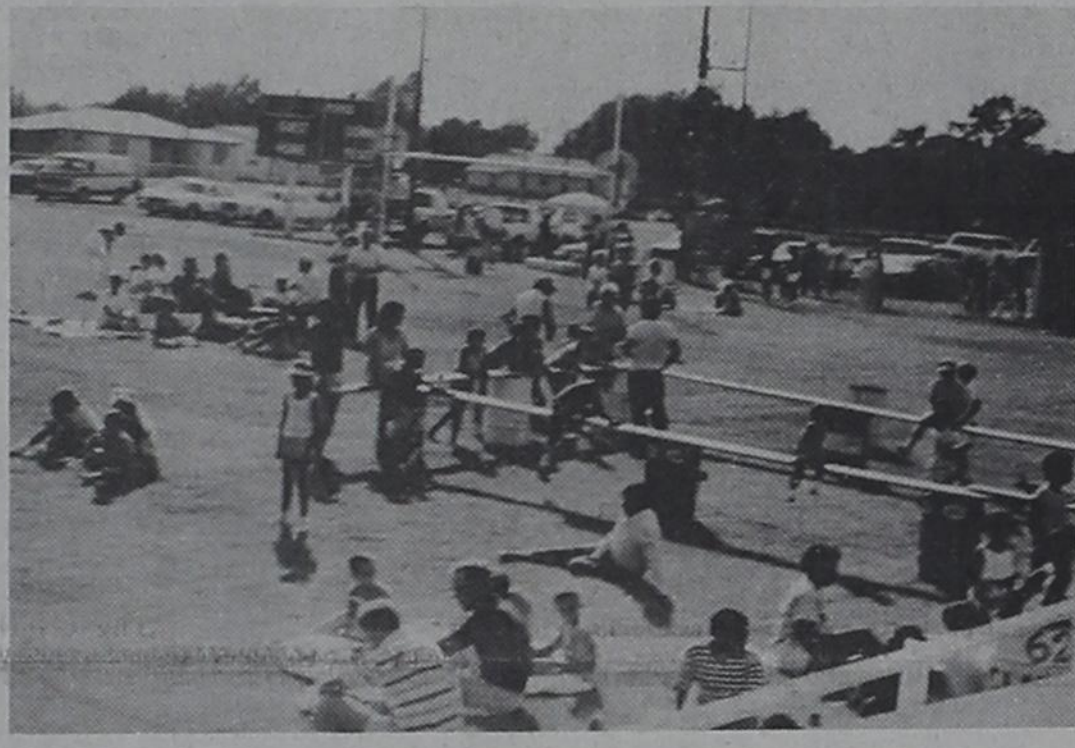

Bovina received 1.8 inches of rain during the past week, according to weather observer Maggie Moore.

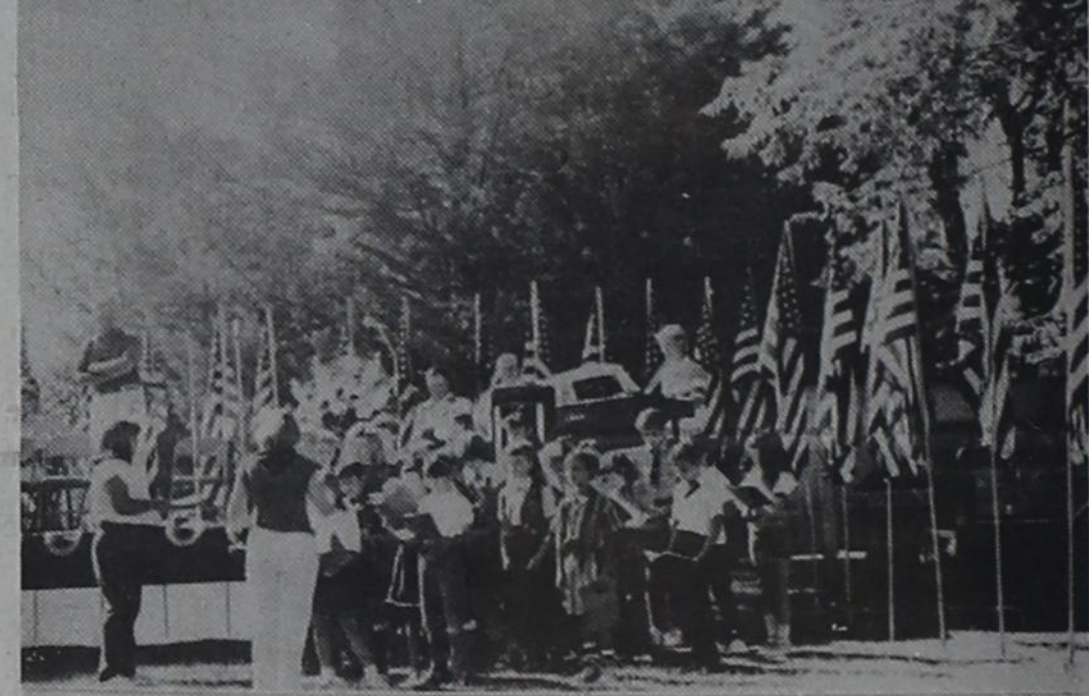

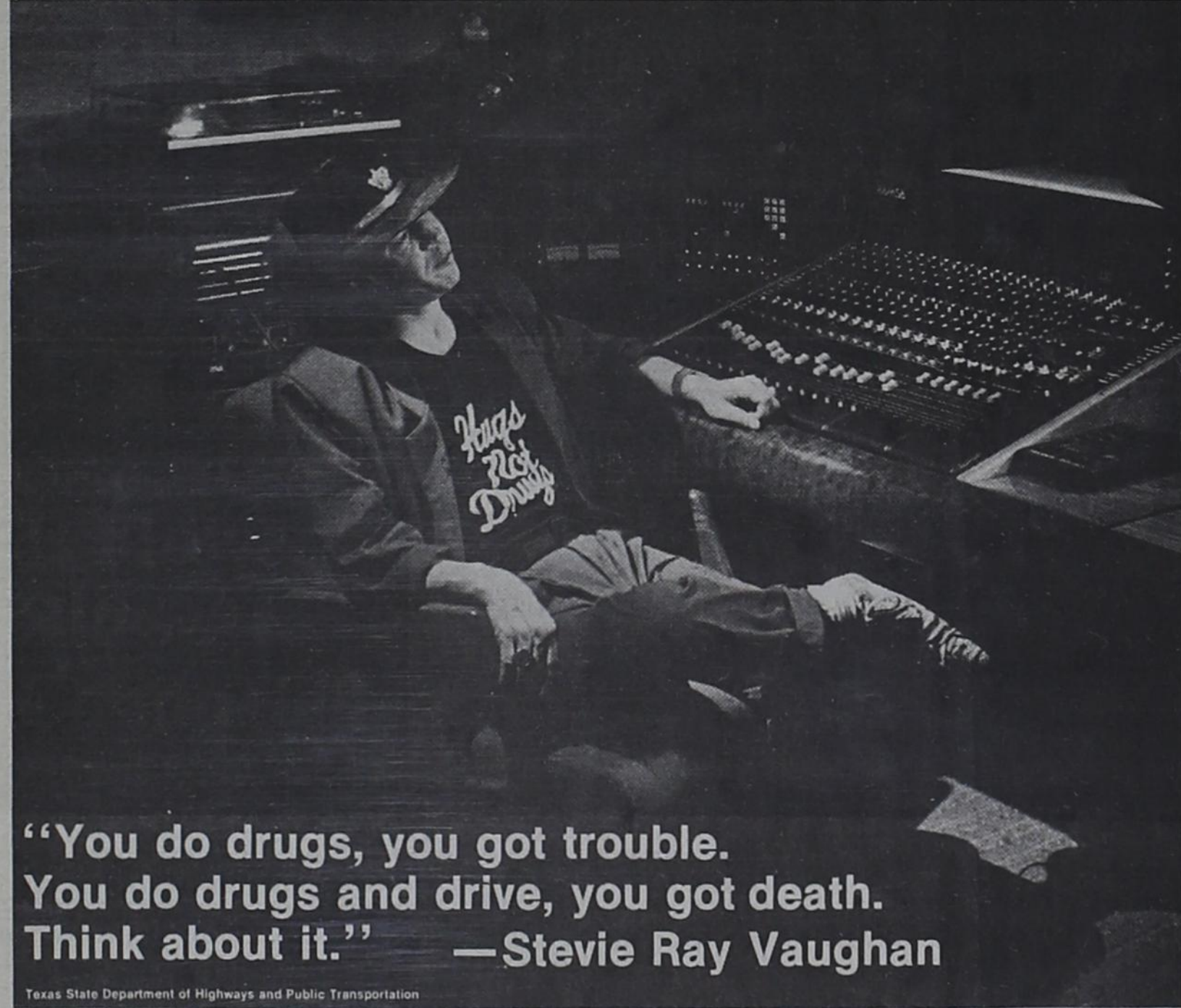
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CHILDREN'S CHOIR...Brenda Wilson is shown directing the children's choir for services held at the City Park Sunday morning.

Closing prayer was led by president, Tina Uriegas, and refreshments were provided by Norma Villarreal and Mrs. Saenz.

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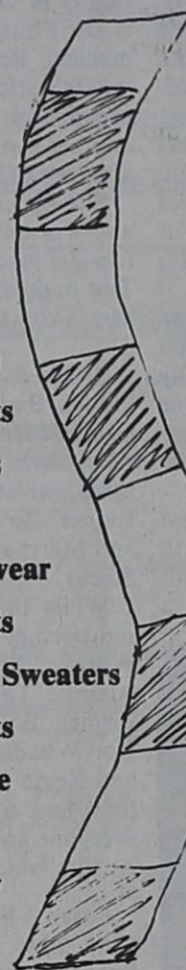

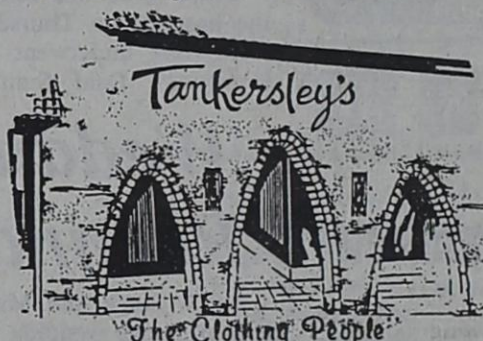
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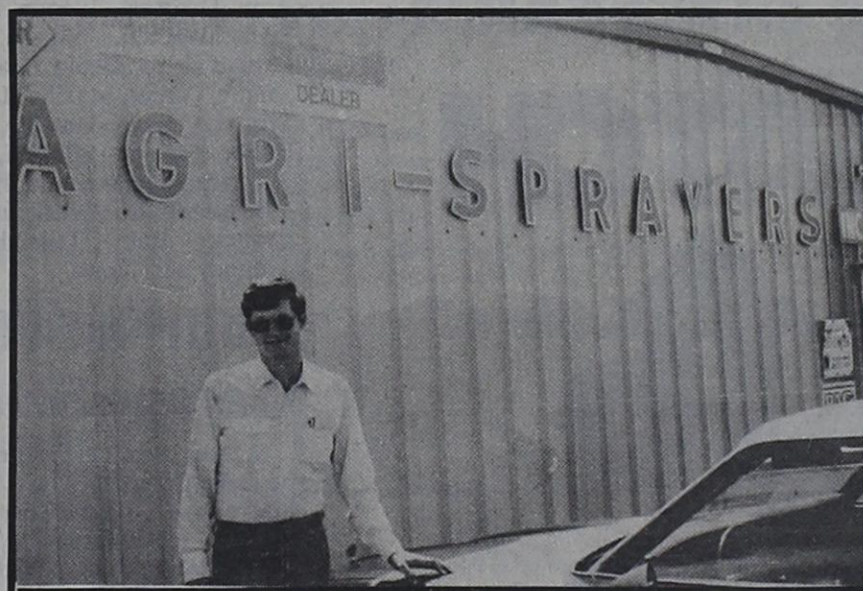
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Scooter's Scoops
