CAN YOU BELIEVE the turn-around the Bovina Mustang football program has made this season under Coach Bill Talley?

After their season-opening loss to strong Happy, the Mustangs have now won seven games in a row and are poised with a 4-0 district record and a great opportunity to make the football playoffs.

Talley suffered through a winless year in his first season as Mustang head coach, when his squad members hit the bottom. "I remember that year when we played at Friona, we only had 12 boys on our squad to play," Talley says.

Things began to jell last season and the losing streak came to an end. The team finished with a 3-7 record for the season.

This year, the turn-around is almost complete, as the Mustangs stand at 7-1 and 4-0 in district. This past week, Bovina downed Whiteface, 54-0. A couple of years ago, if the team was involved in a 54-0 score, it most generally was the other way around.

Winning is definitely more fun than losing, and Coach Talley credits the hard work by the members of this year's team as paying big dividends. He says he is especially proud for the junior and senior members of the team, who have had to suffer through adversity, and now are able to enjoy some success.

The Mustangs have scored a pair of big district wins, over Farwell and Sudan, along with easier wins over Lorenzo and Whiteface. They have two more "biggies" left on their schedule, Petersburg and Anton.

Bovina has turned things around, and we're especially proud for Coach Talley and his Mustangs.

Now, they have one more goal for the season: being district champions and/or making the playoffs. From this perspective, we think they can do it.

Immunization Clinic Set

Mustangs Topple Whiteface By 54-0

The Bovina Mustangs roared to their seventh straight win of the season and ran their district record to 4-0 with a convincing 54-0 win at Whiteface last Friday.

The Mustangs scored in every quarter, holding a 27-0 halftime lead and a 47-0 lead after three quarters. Coach Bill Talley had an opportunity to play every member of his squad, and everyone played well.

It took Bovina just four offensive plays to take control of the game, when Bud Venable took a pass from Scott Scaff and completed a 28-yard scoring play. Venable kicked the point and Bovina was ahead 7-0 after less than two minutes of clock time.

The Mustangs held on downs, regained the ball, and before long were back in business. This time Scaff connected with Denver Riddle on a 50-yard scoring play. The point kick failed, but Bovina had a 13-0 lead.

In the second quarter, Riddle stepped in front of a Whiteface pass and dashed 30 yards for a touchdown, hiking the lead to 19-0 as the kick again was wide.

Before the quarter had ended, the Mustangs put together a scoring drive capped when Albert Espinoza ran a yard. Venable ran for two points, giving Bovina a commanding 27-0 lead at halftime.

The third quarter turned out to be the same song, only more of it. Fullback Todd Ware scored on a one-yard run to climax a drive, and Venable's kick made it 34-0, Bovina.

The Mustang defense, which was unyielding all night, gave the ball back to Bovina and Venable got into the touchdown act with a 12-yard run. His kick stretched the lead to 41-0.

Vicente Munoz intercepted a pass at the Bovina 47-yard line and set sail on a 53-yard touchdown scamper. The kick failed, but the lead had become 47-0.

Bovina closed out its scoring in the final quarter when Ware ran three yards and Venable's kick was true for the final margin of 54-0.

The Mustang defense held Whiteface to 88 total yards and only three first downs.

Venable led the balanced attack with 114 yards on 12 carries. Ware had 110 yards on 13 trips, and Espinoza added 48 yards on nine attempts. Scaff ran the ball twice for 44 yards, and completed four of ten passes for 120 yards.

"The entire team played well. Everyone contributed. We were able to play everyone, and they all played well," said Coach Bill Talley.

Late in the game when Bovina had it wrapped up, Talley let his front four linemen get a chance to carry the ball, "a lineman's dream."

Steve Gauntt, Tom Fuentes, Chad Clayton and Byron Neal all took a turn with the ball. Gauntt caused some raised eyebrows when he ripped off a 15-yard gain. "Maybe I've been playing him at the wrong spot," Talley said.

Mustangs To Host Potent Petersburg

The Petersburg Buffaloes will come to town Friday night in the first of two "really big" district games for the Bovina Mustangs.

The Buffaloes have their backs to the wall after losing two tough district games to Farwell and Anton. So this may make them a doubly-tough opponent Friday.

Petersburg stands with a 5-2 season record and 2-2 in district play. The Buffaloes will feature one of the biggest lines that Bovina will face this season.

"They have a 225-pounder, one at 215, and others weighing 210," says Coach Bill Talley. The Top-

of-Texas Football Magazine lists six players on Petersburg's roster over 200 pounds. "Happy had some big players, but I think Petersburg is bigger overall than Happy was," Talley said.

Talley says the Mustangs will just run their regular offense and try to block the big guys. Bovina led in the game at Petersburg last November, 7-6, before losing to the playoff-bound Buffaloes, 14-7. The Mustangs had a scoring threat going when time was running out.

Although the Mustangs have a 4-0 district record, there are so many playoff possibilities with two weekends of games left that it's best not to speculate.

"We just need to go out and win our last two games, then we'll know where we are," said Talley. Bovina hasn't been in the football playoff since 1972, and would sorely like to remedy this situation.

Osborn To Head Party

Forrest W. Osborn of Friona has been named Parmer County chairman for the Populist Party of Texas according to Tom Parker, state chairman of the party.

Osborn, a lifelong resident of Texas, and a resident of Parmer County since 1926, is a Navy veteran of World War II, and served two terms as Commissioner of Precinct 1 in Parmer County.

The Osborns have three children, five grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. Concern for their future led Osborn to accept this post.

P. M. Warns About Mailbox Vandalism

Through rain, sleet, snow, or dead of night, the U.S. Mail gets delivered to postal customers across the nation. The elements of nature don't stop letter carriers from getting the mail into a customer's mailbox, but sometimes mailbox vandalism does.

Mailbox vandalism comes in a variety of shapes and sizes from the placement of objects inside the mailbox to the actual theft or destruction of the mail receptacle. Letter carriers and customers have reported finding bottles, snakes, snails, food, trash, and even small animals inside their mailboxes. These items are usually easily removed and do not disrupt the delivery of mail.

On the other hand, firecrackers, shotgun pellets, baseball bats, rocks, and even an occasional pickup truck usually do enough damage to cause an interruption in mail service until the box is repaired or replaced. Beyond the

damage to the boxes, which costs the postal customer time and money to repair or replace, mailbox vandalism sometimes causes the loss or destruction of valuable and important mail.

U.S. Mail receptacles and the mail inside are protected by Federal law from theft, damage, and destruction. The violations are felonies which carry penalties of between three to five years imprisonment and/or fines between \$1,000 and \$2,000.

Through the years, it has been discovered that the vast majority of incidents of mailbox vandalism are the result of juveniles playing pranks. Juveniles, those under the age of 18, cannot be prosecuted in Federal court, so frequently, even though vandalism is a Federal offense, the local sheriff or police are called upon to investigate. They can respond quickly and usually have a good idea which individuals are most likely to be involved. In addition, juveniles can be prosecuted for vandalism of mailboxes under the State law concerning criminal mischief.

The best way to prevent the destruction and vandalism of mailboxes is through education. Parents with young children should take a few moments to explain the importance of an individual's mail to them. They should also let their older children know that what may be intended to be a harmless prank is actually against the law and that everyone involved loses; the prankster who can end up in jail; the customer who has to pay for the repair or replacement of the damaged mailbox and mail; and the community who pays the local sheriff or police to investigate the incident.

It's your mail--protect it. Any act of vandalism or information concerning vandalism of mailboxes should be immediately reported to the local sheriff or police and to your local postmaster.

Capt. Bob Russell, District Supervisor of the Amarillo Highway Patrol District comprising of 31 counties said, "For the month of September, our troopers investigated four fatal accidents, 63 personal injury accidents, and 119 property damage accidents. There were four persons killed and 100 persons injured in these accidents."

Sgt. Billy Don Scott of Hereford stated, "In Parmer County, our troopers investigated no fatal accidents, five personal injury accidents, and seven property damage accidents in the month of September. There were no deaths and five persons were injured in these accidents."

FOR MORTGAGES

New Agreement Is Signed By Co-op

A new mortgage agreement with the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation was signed October 12 by officers of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, Inc., according to James Hull, president of the cooperative.

The officers, acting in full authority vested in them by unanimous action of the full Board of Directors, signed the new mortgage document which replaces the old REA all inclusive lien on cooperative property. Eldred A. Brown, chairman of the Board of Directors, Donald J. Wright, vice-chairman of the Board of Directors, and Jerry L. Roberts, secretary-treasurer of the Board of Directors acted on behalf of all members of the Cooperative in signing the new mortgage and thereby releasing lien restrictions on many assets of the \$29,000,000 electric utility plant.

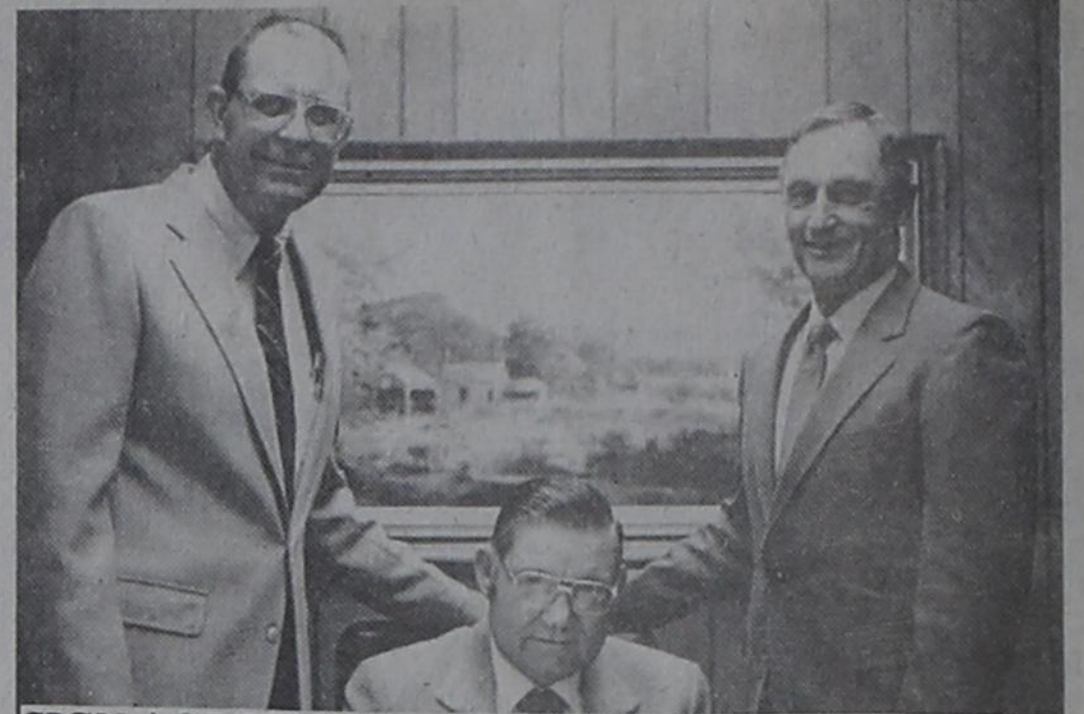
The new mortgage has no lien on all motor vehicles, cash and other interest bearing investments, accounts receivable, warehouse inventory, fuel, and CFC Capital Term Certificates which amount to over one and one-third million dollars. The old voided REA mortgage included a lien on all assets of the Cooperative, but on December 30, 1986, this Cooperative retired completely all outstanding debt to the United States Government at a 31 per cent discount amounting to a write-off by the government of 3.1 million dollars.

Another advantage of the new mortgage will be to provide an opportunity for the cooperative to negotiate for lowest interest rates available when borrowing money for new construction, that is, investment in distribution plant, electric generation, or in transmission lines. These borrowing options include the Texas Bank for Cooperatives, sale of bonds, local banks, and the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation.

Since this Cooperative retired 100 per cent of its REA debt at discount, a total of 30 electric cooperatives over the nation have done likewise. This was made possible because of Public Law 99-509, which expired September 30, 1987. Retirement of this debt at discount increased member equity in Deaf Smith Electric Coopera-

tive to 66 per cent. Many of the old REA requirements still exist under the new mortgage, however, as related to engineering standards, accounting standards, and annual audits by approved CPA firms.

The Board felt that adoption and acceptance of this new mortgage agreement would provide the cooperative members with much more flexibility and latitude in operating the rural utility system.

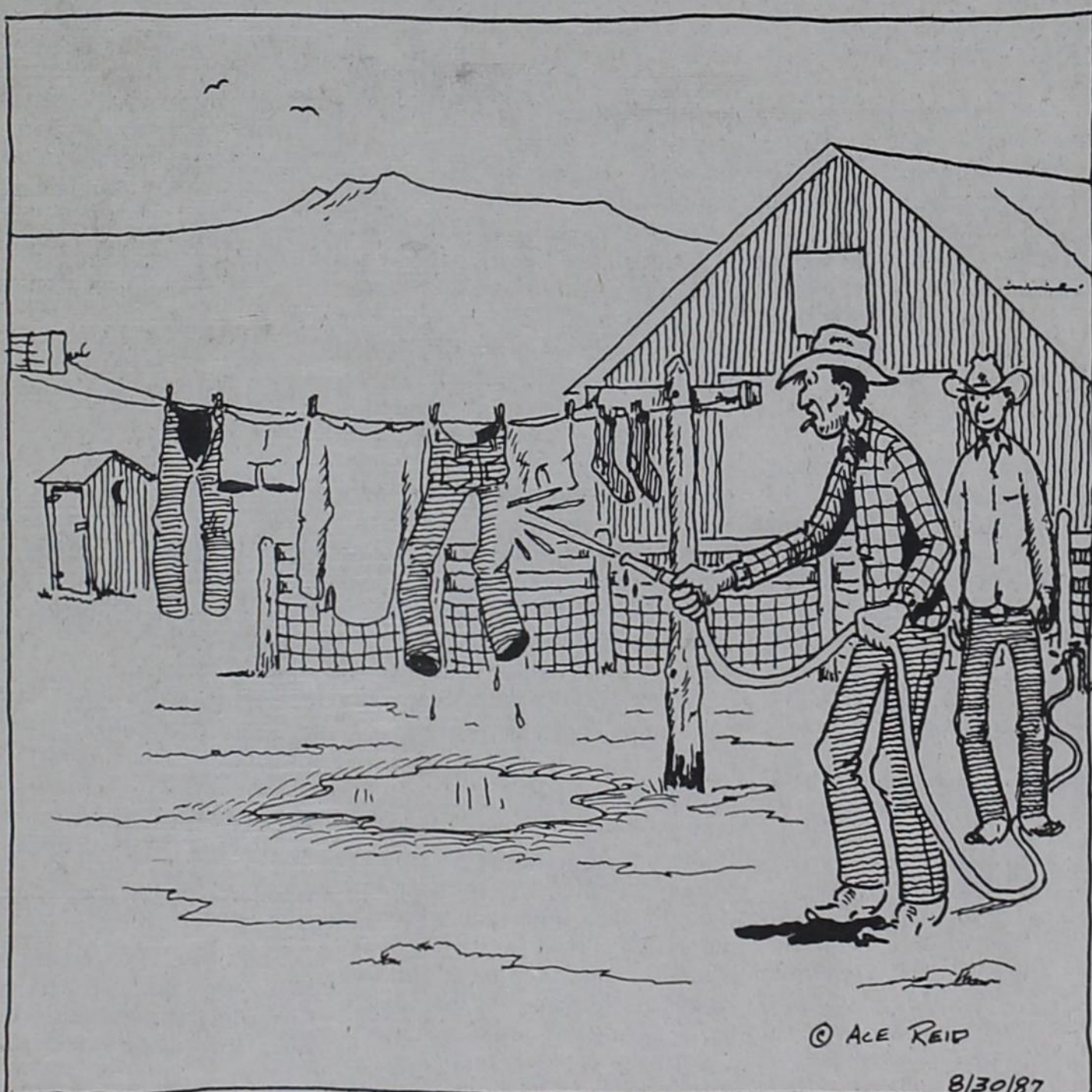

The Bovina Colt football team continued in its quest for a successful season here last Thursday as they downed the visiting Whiteface Antelopes by a score of 28-8.

After stalling on their opening drive and being forced to punt, the Colts' defense threw the Antelopes for three consecutive losses leaving them with a fourth and 28. Corey Kirkpatrick returned the Antelope punt 35 yards to the Whiteface 35 yard line.

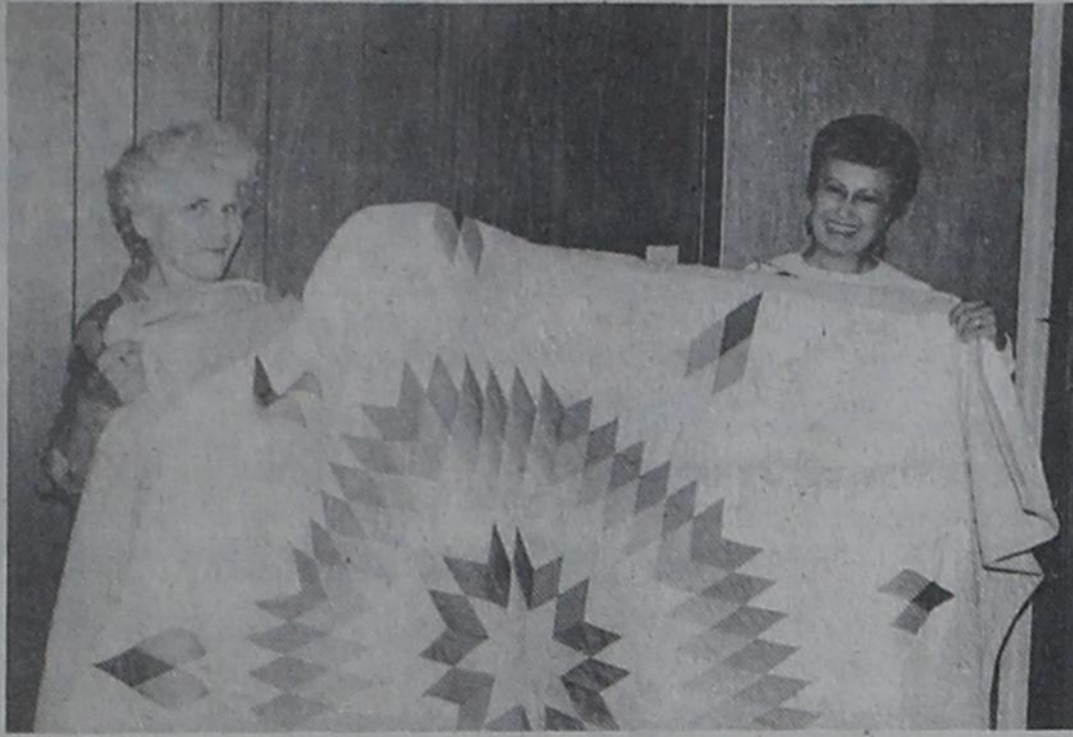
Two plays later, Izzy Marufo picked up a fumbled pitch on the left side of the field, reversed his field, and went around the right end for a 30 yard touchdown. The two point conversion, attempted by Joe Torres, failed.

On the Antelopes' next possession, their quarterback attempted a pass from the Bovina 40 yard line. Trying to avoid a sack by a very quick pass rush, led by Angel Espinoza, the quarterback tossed the ball toward one of his backs. Juan Reyna then had a defensive lineman's dream-come-true. Upon rushing the quarterback, from his defensive tackle spot, Juan stepped in front of the pass and caught it. He then proceeded to sprint 60 yards to paydirt and the Colts led 12-0. The two point conversion failed when Izzy Marufo was stopped short of the goal line.

About halfway through the second quarter, the Colts had the ball on the Antelope 27 yard line. Kirkpatrick ran the option and was forced to pitch the ball to tailback Andy Stormes. Andy took the pitch on the left side of the field and cut back against the grain and went 27 yards for the touchdown. Kirkpatrick kept the ball on a quarterback sneak for the successful two point conversion and the Colts led 20-0 at the half.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, Kirkpatrick ran a bootleg and hit Hector Guevara with a 34 yard pass play for a touchdown. Izzy Marufo muscled his way in for the two point conversion and the Colts were on top 28-0.

The "B" team played part of the third quarter and practically all of the fourth quarter. The "B" team's defense played pretty well, allowing one touchdown with about 2:30 to play in the game. The final score was 28-8, running the Colts' season record to a nice 4-1-1.



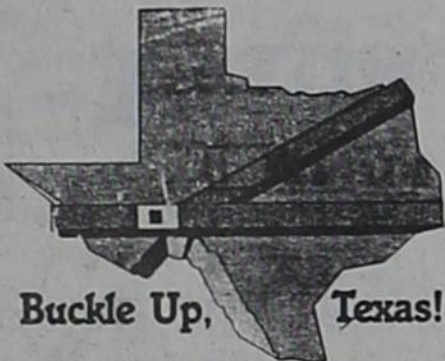
