Besides these, there were consumed by the local customers 597,000 head Total numder of cattle in the State in 1901, according to report of comptroller of public accounts $6,894,897$; value $\$ 74,568,436$, о $\$ 10.82$ per head.
Total number of horses and mules, $1,531,510$; valued at $\$ 39$, 816,640 , or $\$ 26.40$ per head. Total number of sheep and goats 1,959 284 , valued at $\$ 2,623,886$.
Total number hogs, 1,408,496, valued at $\$ 2,458,397$.
