SMALL BIT OF
TEXAS HISTORY

Something About the Man Who Established the Name Maverick Given Cattle.

Over in the northwest part of South Carolina, near the line which separates Anderson and Picket t counties and about five
miles from Pendleton, there is an old graveyard or burying ground. comprises about fourteen acres of land, all of which are thickly wooded. There are five marble nonuments, one of which is of considerable size. The inscript-
ion on one of the monuments is as follows;
"In memory of Samuel Maverick
Born in the City of Charles-ton Dec. 30, 1772
Died April 30, 1852
Aged 79 years and 4 months.
Inquiry of those who live in the neighborhood elicted the follow ing facts:
Samuel Augustus Maverick the eldest son of Mrs. Elizabet (Anderson) Maverick, went to Texas and was the first man to make cattle raising a business on the grassy plains. He made a great success of this business, and when others went into it h insisted that others should brand their cattle in order to distin-
guish them from his, which were unbranded. Because of this all unbranded steers were known as "Mavericks." Even to this day unbranded steers are known as "Mavericks," although it has was anybody to lay claim to them as the original cattleman did. Maverick now means a steer that escaped branding and that is a subject of indentification and claim by whom can establish ownership.
The people whose deaths are were neighbors of John C. Cal houn, whose plantation was not more than five miles away
The ground is used for burials still, but now mostly by negroes. There has been no objection made to this, and it seems to be understood that it is a free burying ground for any who wish to use it, white or black. The fourteen acres make ample room for both races, and there is no encroaching on the ol
