GROSS MISREPRESENTATIONS.

The Sweetwater Review was ry solicitous for was very solicitous for the welfare
of the saloons in its county, and this no doubt prompted it to say things during the campaign which, upon mature reflection, it will regret. But however solicitous it may have been, there is no excuse for it to step out of conditions in other misrepresent conditions in other counties. The
Review did this, but whether intentionally or through ignorance, we are not prepared to say: The Review says

Prohibition went into effect in Taylor county on the 7th day of June, 1902, and since that time the following cases were filed in court." It then goes on to give the number of cases filed each term of court and summarizes as
follows: "Of which 148 were for gaming, 26 for sales of liquor in local option district and 15 for selling liquor to minors." Winding up it makes this broad assertion: "Crime has increased over 100 per cent since the introduction of local option.
Really, the Review's article needs no comment. The facts stand out for themselves. Prohibition was voted in June 7th, 1902, but did not go into effect until April, 1903, a little over 10 months after the election was held. Crime has greatly decreased, as shown by the March term of the grand jury (before local option went into effect) and the August term. This is all that is necessary to refute the charges made by the Review.
Will the Review be honest enough, now that the election is over and it got ingloriously over and it got ingloriously
snowed under, to correct this error?

The Baird Star used column of its valuable space last week in a tirade against The Mail. The entire article was a string of falsehoods-irrelevant and insane jabberings that would put a South African monkey to shame. The Mail thinks too much of its reputation to waste further space on a paper which delights

Leaving out of the question the independent school districts of Abiiene with its nine hundred and Merkel with its 220 pupils, the county has 1,916 studente within the scholastic age and every one of the 42 districts has voted a special school tax except seven which, supplementing the free school apportionment, gives the 1,916 pupils a total of $\$ 13,500.32$, or nearly $\$ 8$ per capita. Few counties can boast of such strongly supported country schools. The State and county apportionment is $\$ 5$ per head and additional to that,"
