## Liquor Defense Fund.

New York, Nov. 11.-In fear of further drastic legislation following that of last winter, when the license fees were advanced greatly, the central organization of the New York City Wine, Liquor and Beer Dealers' association has adopted resolutions approving the defense fund plan formulated at the recent liquor dealers' national association, and has fixed New York state's con tribution at $\$ 750,000$.
It was announced that this money is to be raised by a-tax label to be put on every package of liquor and barrel of beer. Some of the dealers said the label may not be used. They stated that the money would be raised by regular assessment
upon each saloon keeper. In Manhattan there are alone 6,000 members of the association in good standing. If every state represented in the national association takes similar action, the defense fund with liquor dealers will reach $\$ 6,000,000$.
"Our organization," said one of the officers, "is not a political body in any sense. It is a business men's organization, formed for strictly business purposes, but when a political par attacks our interests we el play politics, and hencefory 1 we propose to do it. Th loon-
keepers are not alon this business. Wholesale cealers, brewers, those who supply mineral waters and everybody associated with
the plan."

## Thanksgiving in 1789.

It is commonly understood, and frequently asserted, that Abraham Lincoln was the first president to issue a Thanksgiving proclamation, and that he established a custom to which all his successors have adhered. Before that time the observance of the day was confined chiefly to the New England States, where it had been ushered in every autumn from early colonial times by governors' proclamations. The common belief is essentially true. It was not until 1863 that any President proclaimed the last $\left.\right|_{t}$

Thursday in November as a day of national Thanksgiving. Mr. Lincoln had nineteen months before designated a particular Sunday for that purpose.
Yet it should not be forgotten that in the early days of the re public there were occasional presdential proclamations of this sort. The very day of Novem ber on which Thanksgiving falls this year-Thursday, the 26 thwas set apart by George Wash ington, in the first year of his administration, "to be devoted by the people of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being Who is the Beneficient author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be." He prefaced these expressions by saying that both Houses of Congress, through their joint com mittee, had requested him to make this recommendation.
It was nearly six years before Washington isuued another Thanksgiving proclamation; then he set apart a Thursday in February, assigning as one of the reasons, "for the seasonable control which has been given to a spirit of disorder in the suppression of the late insurrection," re ferring to the almost forgotten Whiskey Insurrection in western Pennsylvania.
