The very day of November on which Thanksgiving falls this year-Thursday, the 26thwas set apart by George Washington, in the first year of his administration, "to be devoted by the people of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being Who is the Beneficient author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be." He prefaced these expressions by saying that both Houses of Congress, through their joint committee, had requested him to make this recommendation.

It was nearly six years before Washington isuued a nother Thanksgiving proclamation; then he set apart a Thursday in February, assigning as one of the reasons, "for the seasonable control which has been given to a spirit of disorder in the suppression of the late insurrection," referring to the almost forgotten Whiskey Insurrection in western


