IF YOU WANT AN energetic worker, hire a woman. Employers typically assume that since women are still largely responsible for childcare and household chores, they work less hard on the job—either because they're too tired to begin with or because they want to preserve energy for use at home later," says sociologist Denise Bielby, Ph.D., of the University of California, Santa Barbara. "But we found this isn't so."

When Dr. Bielby and her husband, William Bielby, Ph.D., also a sociologist, analyzed data from a national sample of 1,515 working men and women, they discovered that women report devoting more time and attention to their jobs than men, even though they spend twice as much time on childcare and household tasks as men do.

"And it's not that women simply perceive their jobs as more demanding because of the toll taken by their other responsibilities," says Dr. Denise Bielby. "If that were so, we would not have found more women than men putting in effort on the job beyond what was required. It's precisely in this 'discretionary' area that we would have found women cutting back."

While the Bielbys conclude that women's high energy level can be a boon to employers, they caution that it can be a bust to women themselves. "Energy has to come from somewhere, and research shows that women are sleeping and playing less in order to meet both family and work responsibilities," says Dr. Denise Bielby. "We need to strike a balance between our obligations and ourselves."

(Editor's note: We could add that in our career in the weekly newspaper business, we have found that women usually are the better workers than men.)

Most of our employees through the years, at Friona and Bovina, have been women. Occasionally we have hired a "token man," but they have disappointed us a lot more often than have the women.)

THE LONG ARM of the law has found that speeding motorists like to tickle its funny bone.

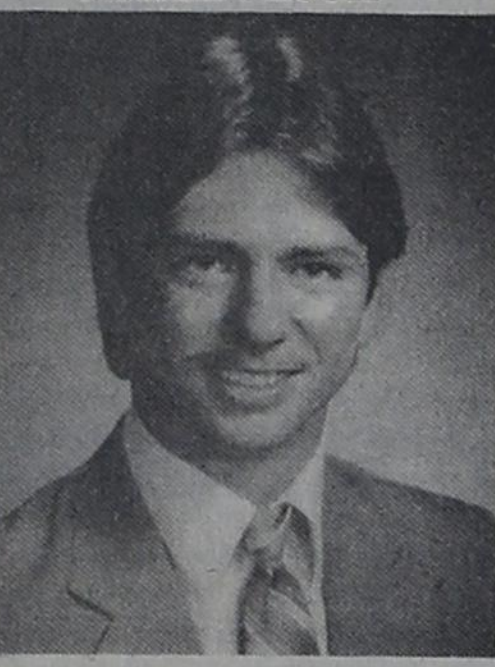

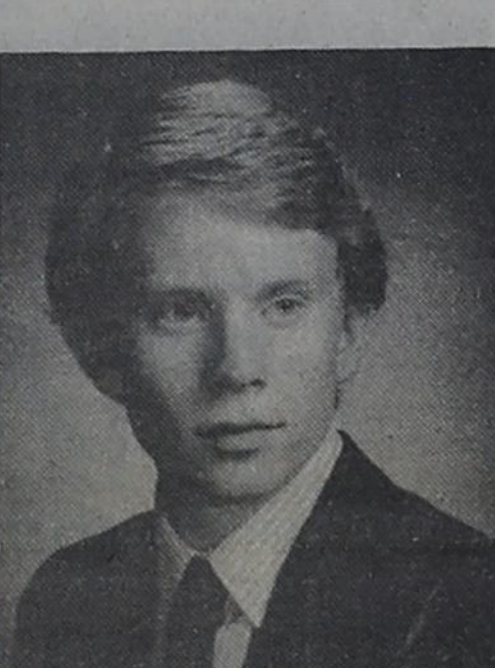

Commodity Program Is In Jeopardy

Parmer County's participation in the free commodities program is up in the air, after action by the County Commissioners Court at their regular meeting this past Monday.

Judge Porter Roberts had received a letter from the Panhandle Community Services concerning the handling charge on the commodities. The charge was to increase from 25 cents per case to two cents per pound. The increase was due to the agency's loss of funds.

Because of the difficulty in storing the commodities during the summer months, a motion was passed that Parmer County drop out of the commodity distribution program for June and August, and then see what the program is like in September, at which time it will be reconsidered.

A motion was passed unanimously to pay the boarding care bills for the county's foster children, in the amount of \$3,710.00, which amount will be reimbursed the county.

The court voted to grant permission to Farwell's Bordertown Days Committee for the use of the Courthouse lawn, north parking lot and the unused yard north of the parking lot for the annual Bordertown Days celebration.

In other business, the next regularly scheduled meeting date was changed from May 26 to Tuesday, May 27, due to Memorial Day.

Soil conservation work was approved for the farms of A.L. Glascock and Dickie Clayton in Precinct 2 and Marlon Inman and Percy Merritt in Precinct 3. The work is performed by county machinery when the machinery is not otherwise in demand, and cost of such work is paid by the farmers.

Dedication Ceremonies Set For Home

One of Farwell's oldest homes will be dedicated as a Texas Historical Landmark on Sunday, May 25.

The house was built at this site between 1915-1917 for R.C. "Coke" Hopping, Parmer County's sheriff from 1910-1918. It was purchased by James and Minnie Aldridge in 1918. Aldridge succeeded Hopping as the sheriff, with his term starting in 1919.

The Aldridge's two sons, Sam and John, grew up in the house. After John married Lillian Orr, they moved into the house with his parents. Their two daughters, Mary Bell Aldridge Washington and Nancy Aldridge Mehler, grew up in the home, and it remained in the Aldridge family until selling to Mack Heald in 1981.

Special guests will be the former owners, Mrs. Lillian Aldridge and her two daughters, Nancy Mehler and Mary Bell Washington.

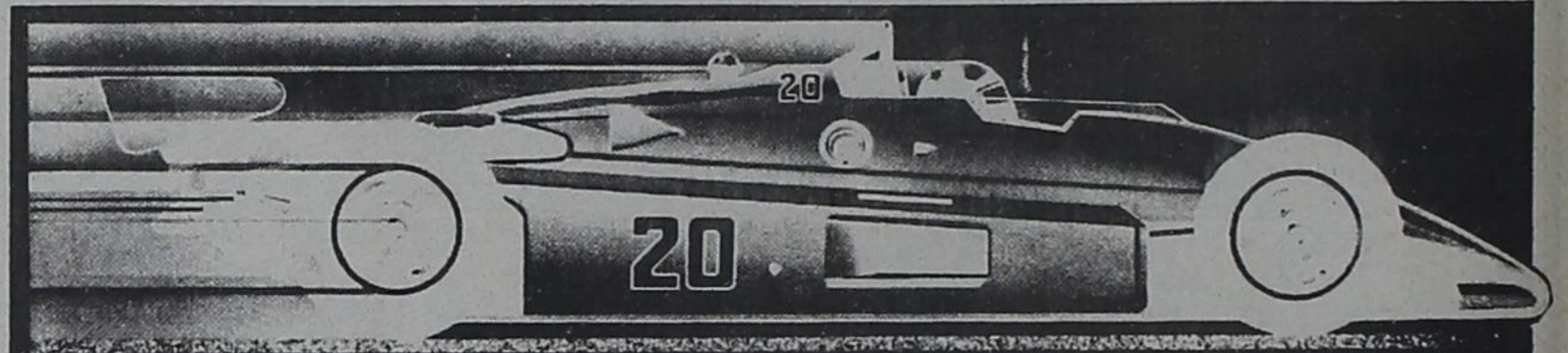
Bovina Man's Aunt Is Buried In Andrews

All the signs show that summer is fast approaching--Little League play is starting up, the mosquitoes, are out, the days are lengthening and children everywhere are packing for summer camps.

For many children with diabetes, summer means spending three wonderful, fun-packed weeks at Camp Sweeney in the green hills of North Central Texas, ten miles northeast of Gainesville.

Camp Sweeney is a summer camp especially for diabetic children ages six to eighteen. The camp is sponsored by the Southwestern Diabetic Foundation and is funded through the United Way and private donations.

Children at Camp Sweeney participate in the same activities that their peers in other summer camps enjoy, such as swimming, boating, fishing, archery, hiking and horseback riding. In addition to these activities, campers at Camp Sweeney learn how to deal with their diabetes and lead normal lives. Each camper's diet is individually monitored by an experienced kitchen staff.

The medical staff is on duty 24 hours a day to check the campers for any adverse signs and to conduct classes to help educate the campers on the medical aspects of their disorder. Any child with diabetes may attend Camp

Sweeney, regardless of ability to pay. Scholarships are available for any diabetic child who wishes to attend the camp. Camp Sweeney does not discriminate on the basis of race, sex, religion, creed, nationality or handicap.

This summer's sessions are as follows: Session I--June 8-June 27; Session II--June 29-July 18; Session III--July 20-August 8.

Stress Seminar Is Set May 30

Stress and its impact on the farm family will be the focus of a conference for health professionals at Wayland Baptist University in Plainview on Friday, May 30, from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

"It is essential to the mental health of the rural community to identify the stressors specific to rural living and then to develop tools for assessment and compre-

hensive strategies for coping," according to Karen Mountain, R.N., M.S.N., project director for the Texas Office of Rural Health, sponsor of the conference. The Hogg Foundation for Mental Health is supplying funding for the conference, one of a series of regional conferences on stress and rural Texas.

Rick Van Hersh, executive director of the Plainview Counseling Center, is the local coordinator. All activities will take place in the Nunn Business Administration Building on West Seventh Street.

The morning session of the conference will concentrate on an overview of stress and its consequences by Bill Pierce, director of the Caprock Plains Center for Counseling. A panel discussion on the farmers' perspective will complete the morning program.

Afternoon workshops will address various specific issues, including drug abuse, alcoholism, suicide, depression, family violence, child abuse, re-education and training for farmers, and the future of farming.

According to Lois Barry, director of the Texas Office of Rural Health, the conference will provide health care professionals with information on stress and its impact on the mental and physical health of the farm family, along with skills to assist the family in coping with stress.

On The Farm

Cotton, corn and sorghum producers in Parmer County are again receiving a special invitation to take part in the annual High Plains Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of their pest management programs.

The first of two workshop sessions will focus on early and mid-season pests and will be held Tuesday, June 3 at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview, Gary Patterson, county Extension agent, said. The center is on U.S. 87 Business Route south of the city.

The second workshop is scheduled for July 8 in Plainview and will cover mid to late-season crop pests.

The workshop, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, was first held in 1973 to train scouts in the pest management programs conducted by Extension, part of the Texas A&M University system.

In subsequent years, it has expanded to include scouts employed by consultants, aerial applicators and others, as well as producers who want to learn how to scout their own fields for insects. The workshop focuses on perfecting skills in identifying crop pests and making timely pest management decisions which can protect investments and yield, and hold down production costs, Patterson said.

The workshop will begin at 8:30 a.m. with Dr. James Leser, Extension Entomologist, outlining

the scope of the training, and explaining general concepts of pest management, and sampling. Leser will then open the cotton pest section with information on thrips. Cotton fleahoppers will be discussed by Greg Cronholm, Extension Agent-Entomology headquartered in Plainview. Dr. Pat Morrison will discuss sorghum pests. Aspects of pesticide safety will be presented by Mark Brown, Extension Agent-Entomology from Crosbyton.

The afternoon segment will open with a presentation on corn pests by Allen Knutson, Extension Agent-Entomology, based in Dimmitt. Morrison will discuss pests of soybean and sunflower crops.

The daylong workshop will conclude with a hands-on session in which participants will learn how to determine the per cent square set on potted cotton plants and will identify insect specimens. Handouts will be available.

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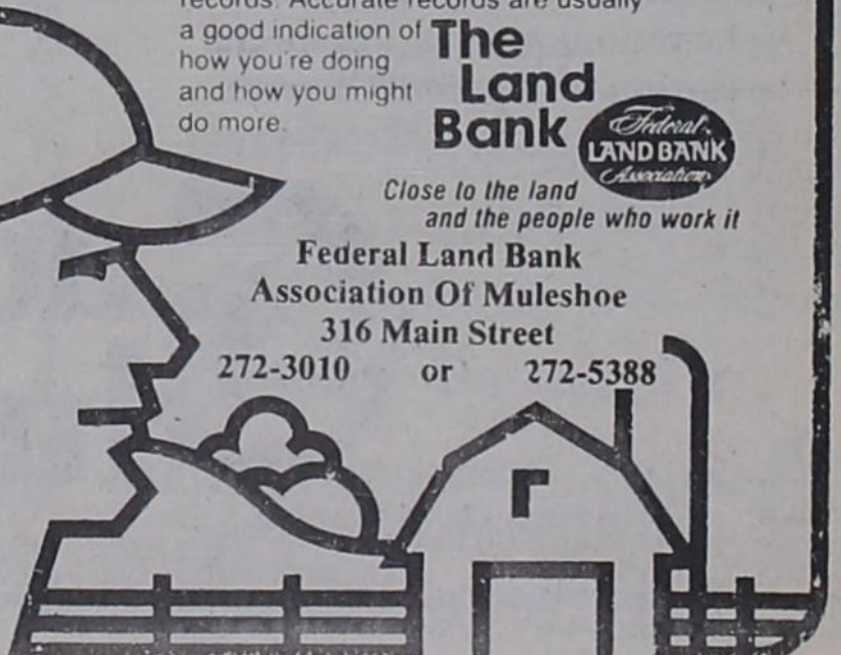
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Scooter's Scoops

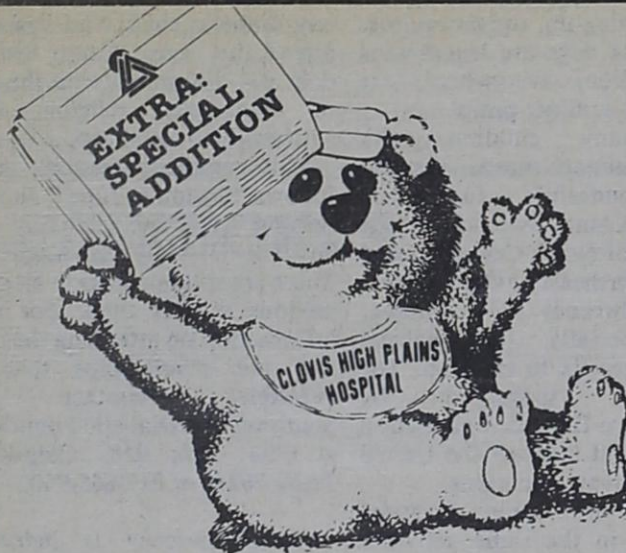

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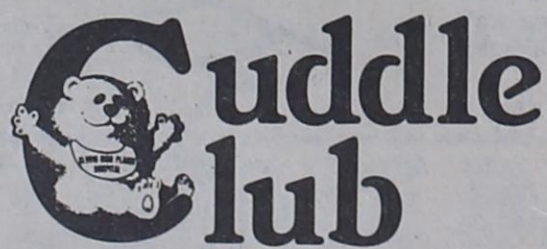

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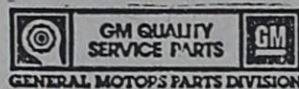

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Sesquicentennial Notes

Bovina Ambulance Service history continued from *Prairie Progress*:
"With the donation of a cot, suction, and oxygen bottle racks by the Ralls Ambulance Service, members of the service built in the cabinets needed to convert the Suburban into an ambulance. The new ambulance, complete with lettering supplied by Billy Whitecotton, began making appearances at home football games early in the season.

On Sunday afternoon, October 8, 1978, the ambulance went on display for the citizens of Bovina on the Supermarket parking lot. To mark the occasion, the emergency helicopter from Amarillo flew down and was on display along with the new ambulance. And Bovina had emergency service, just a phone call away.

Realizing that the most important thing on an ambulance is a well-trained crew, members of the Bovina Ambulance Service began an emergency medical technician's course in February of 1979. Eighty hours of classroom work were required along with forty hours of training in the hospital. Clovis High Plains Hospital cooperated with the local service to provide this training. By late March, Bovina had fourteen EMT's working on the ambulance in three shifts of four each plus a number of associates both EMT's and ECA's.

Many of the new EMT's went one step further, undertaking additional study on their own in order to pass the National Registry of EMT's test. Nine members of the service passed this difficult exam, showing their competence to perform emergency techniques throughout the U.S.

A highlight for the young service came in the fall of 1979 when the City Council approved the purchase of a new ambulance for the city. After much study, the service selected a mini-modular ambulance from the Modulance Corp. They took delivery on the new vehicle the first of December of 1979. Not only was the new vehicle more reliable, but the room enabled the crews to carry as many as four injured persons and give them emergency treatment at one time.

The Bovina Ambulance Service has succeeded because of the efforts of many people including those individuals and businesses which donated funds for supplies; the Bovina Study Club's Christmas Card donations, those who have collected cans to sell for added equipment, as well as those who have trained and practiced and gotten up on cold winter nights and stayed home from fishing trips to man the ambulance."

The following is an update to the history of the Bovina Ambulance Service:

The Bovina Ambulance Service now has two paramedics, Don Spring and Larry Mitchell. At least one of these paramedics is on every ambulance run.

The present officers of the organization are: Larry Mitchell, president; Galen Hromas, vice president and Audelia Serna, secretary.

There are now fourteen registered EMT's that man the

ambulance. The service has just finished a class to train new personnel for volunteer service to the community.

Don Spring, one of the paramedics, stated that the Ambulance Service hopes to be able to build a building in the next two to three years to house the ambulance and provide a classroom for training of personnel.

Our sincere thanks goes to these wonderful people who give so willingly of their time and talents.
