The experience of many of our most successful farmers gives weight to the contention that a combination of stockraisiug and farming gives the best returns for the investment in the Merkel country.

This is true of the experience of Price \& Hunt whose stock farm is located eighteen miles north of Merkel on the Clear Fork of the Brazos. They cultivate about 1,000 acres of land and raise hogs.

The result of their hog induetry even last year, as told by Mr. Price whom we met Saturday should prove of interest to our readers. "We shipped three cars of hoge last year. It was a hard year and we bought some of the hogs and most all of the feed. We realized by the sale $\$ 3,700$ and netted a clear profit of $\$ 1,000$ worth of feed which we fed to twelve head of mules during the year and had a little balance left besides. In any average year we would have realized a much better proït.' At present they have 350 acres in wheat and 100 acres in oats, up and pronounced by neighbors the prettiest they ever saw. On 128 acres of this they are reoeiving $\$ 150$ per month for pasturage. Mr. Price stated that they will sow 150 acres more to oats. He said: "When I was dusting in my wheat my neighbors told me that I had betfer opend my money for feed but now they see I was correct. All of it is doing good and am more than pleased with our prospecte." About sixteen years ago the subject of this little article arrived in Abilene with a wife and baby and $\$ 560$, his total worldly possessions and some sickness in the family relieved him of this money before he was located
He rightly claims there is no better country for stock-farming or with better opportunities for the man who wants to make and accumulate a competence by tilling the soil.

## worry kills.

Modern ecience has brought to light nothing -ore interesting than that worry kills. Mose remarkable still, it has been able to deiermine from, recent discoveries just how worry does kill.
It is believed by many scientists who have folsowed carefully the growth of the science of brain dieease that scores of the deaths set down to their causes are due to worry and that alone. The teadily understand it.
Briefly put, it amounts to this: Worry injures beyond repair certain cello of the brain, and the brain being the nurtritive center of the body, the ather organs become gradually injured, and when wome disease of these organs or a combination of them arise death finally ensues.

disquieting sort the cells of the brain are not proof against.
It is as if the skuli were laid bare and the surface of the brain struck lightly with a hammer every few seconde with mechanical precision, with never a sign of a stop or the failure of a etroke. Just in this way does the annoying idea the maddening thought that will not be done away with, strike or fall upon certain nerve celle, mever ceasing, diminishing the'vitality of the delicate organisms that are so minute that they san be seen only under the microscope.-Journal of Physiological Therapeutics.

## Road Work has Begun.

The work of improving roadways in Commissioners Precinct tractor Keller of Dallas, whe is the general foreman, has thirty the general foreman, has thirty teams at work oording rock for
the rook crusher and will add fifteef more Monday. Before the week is out, declared a prominent country representative Saturday, there will be enough work in sight to accommodate as many men with their teams that care to work.
County Judge Bledene gave The Reporter an interesting interview Saturday in which he gave elaborate details as to the manner in which both rock and gravel roads are laid. One third of the roads are to be built of rock and two thirds of gravel. This is due to the fact that practically all the stone in the precinot is east of Lytle creek, yhile the gravel is on the west.
The crushed rock roads are made in an intricate manner. First the road is graded and all bumps taken out, leaving thirty feet between the ditches. Holes are filled up and where the road goes down steep places the grades are eased up, só to speak.
