Juarez, Mex., May 22.-Tranquility of an officially declared variety, not unlike the quietude of the erstwhile general armistice but possessing more of the normal atmosphere of real peace, reigned in northern Mexico today for the first time in six months. Messages were flashed today over all wires and by courier to remote parts of the country announcing that a peace greement had definitely ended the hostilities between the revolutionists and the federal government.
Undisguised joy beamed in the ace of Judge Carbajal, the federal peace unvoy, today as he prepared to depart for Mexioo City, his mission here being ae complished after nearly fou weeks of parleys. Francisco 1 Madero,Jr., triumphant leader of the revolt, will await the resig nation of President Diaz, starting or Mexico City within a week, when it is expected to become an stablished fact.

The sudden and unexpected assurance of the immediate resignation of President Diaz in all probability bringe peace to Mexico, while it reveals with astonishing abruptness the real depths of disaffection throughout the country. The "old lion" would never have yielded had not conditions been so grave as to threaten almost- immediate anarchy and disintergration. Only a few days ago he had declared a tentative purpose to resign, but throughout his statement breathed a defiance that boded ill for an early termination of the uncertainty. His almost complete surrender indicates that the seriousness of the situation has been borne on upon even his iron determination.
Diaz is also disclosed as capable of that patriotism his intimater have all along claimed for him. personal fear entertained into his calculations. So that even those who have most resented the old man's obstinacy must now admit he has been actuated by a sincere, if uncomprehending, desire for the ultimate welfare of the nation
Given the confidence of the people, it ought not to be difficult to stamp out guerrilla warfare and, in due time, to work out a genuine democratic government. As for Diaz, personally, there can be only strong admiration, tinged with sympathy. He will stand out as one of the most powerful figures in the history of peace to Mexico by the brought rehabilitation and peace toMexico by the
only mathod that could, at that time, have bee effectual. With the inevitable readjustment time and progrese, other mediums and processes were nesded. The world will hope that he will be
spared to see his country's welfare vindicate a sacrific that required even more courage than he displayed in his earlier and more ruthless days.
Incidentally, the advocates of violence and in. tervention, the profeseional hot-heads, in our own oountry, are properly rebuked. Had President Taft been less firm, the present placid prospests would never had been approached. In all likelihood, we would have been drawn into an entanglement the end of which could only have been embarrassmest, loss of life and and extra tax levy on our people.-Atlanta Constitution.
President Diaz goes down under almost identically the same pressure that put him at the head of the government more than 30 years ago. There will never be permanent peace in any country on the western contiment as long as the common people are oppressed. More than 400 years ago a spirit of equal rights to all the people was the prominent feature and direct cause of all the trouble the first settlers had with their mother oountry. Their cause prevailed and freedom proolamed through out all the land. Since then other nations have been added to the roll and in no case where a republican form of government has been established have they ever returned to the autocrat rule.
