

TAAS Tests Scheduled Next Week

The Bovina Independent School District has announced that the TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills) test will be administered to grades 3-7 in the mornings of September 22-24.


The writing and reading tests will be on September 23, and the mathematics test will be on September 24.

The TAAS test is a mandatory test of the state and it is very important that our students do their very best on the test since the Bovina school system is rated by the results of the tests.

The exit level test for students enrolled in school who are juniors and seniors who have not previously mastered the test will be given on October 27-29.

The Out of School TAAS/TEAMS test will also be given on October 27-29. This is for individuals who are not enrolled in a Texas Public School and need to master the TAAS/TEAMS for graduation. If you are interested in taking this test you need to call the high school (238-1317) and register for the test with Joe Rackley or Brenda Wilson.

The parents have been asked that they make sure their children get plenty of sleep the night before the testing and that they have a good breakfast the morning of the testing. This will help the children to be alert and on their toes for the

The boys got to ride the train from Amarillo to Clovis that was being pulled by the restored Santa Fe steam locomotive, #3751.



Gidley Wood, Kelly's daddy, is the Diesel supervisor for Santa Fe in Amarillo and just happened to







Many pagan religions practiced the ritual of child sacrifice in ancient times. Even a few presentday cultures and some satanic groups still sacrifice human souls.

Child sacrifice is mentioned in several Biblical passages, notably 2 Chronicles 28:3 and 33:6, where evil Kings Ahaz and Manasseh of Judah made their sons "pass through the fire!" I'm sure none of us would ever consider such a pagan, dispicable thing as that.

Yet too many parents tend to be like good King Hezekiah of Judah. Although he survived and repudiated

father, Ahaz, he was himself guilty of sacrificing the future of his children in another way. Isaiah 39:8 tells us that

the heinous child sacrifices of his

Hezekiah was content to keep peace in his own lifetime and reign at any cost, even if it meant sacrificing the well-being of the next generation which would pay in war and through bondage.

Sounds a lot like modern day America! I read a sticker on the back of an RV that stated, "We're spending our children's inheritance!" In many ways that is exactly what is happening nationally. If our soon-to-be-elected President, whether Bush or Clinton, and the U.S. Congress do not soon deal with our national debt in a serious way, we will indeed sacrifice the financial and economic well-being of the next generation for our own present benefits!

Every American citizen ought to be demanding through written letters and phone calls to our elected officials, that the issue of the national debt be addressed immediately, or else we will vote them all out! The Preamble to our U.S Constitution states that "We the people . . . " have the right to " . . . secure the blessings of liberty

to ourselves and our posterity . . . "
But parents may be guilty of sacrificing their children's future in more personal ways. For example, when Dad and Mom do not discipline their son or daughter, that child may end up a troubled adult who never masters the art of seltdiscipline. And parents who continually bail their son or daughter out of every little problem and difficulty, saving them continually from the consequences of their own bad choices and wrong actions, are doing their child no

Youth need to learn early that they cannot always "pass the buck" or blame another for their own failures! Dad and Mom may further sacrifice their child's future by giving "junior" everything he wants and asks for, not allowing him to learn the true value of honest work and hard-earned money.

Finally, we are guilty of "child sacrifice" if we do not teach our children that there is a spiritual and eternal side to life. It may not always be seen, but it is essential to our spiritual well-being.

Faith in God through His Son, Jesus Christ, is the most important truth we can instill and pass on to our offspring. It, above all else, has eternal value and brings true meaning to life now. After all, we are always only one generation away from that paganism with which I began this article.




