Our Irish potatoes did well and verything was good excep oabbage and insecte ruined them I am highly pleased with the re sults and I expect next year to do better. Yours for all the good we can do for the Merkel country

BEATIE MUST DE
Last Hope of Escape Swept Away When Mann Refused Petition.
GOV. WILL NOT WTIEPFEBE

## Says That Verdict of Lower Court Has Bee Sustalaed by That of Supreme and that He Will Take No Further Action.

Richmond, Va., Nov. 13.-The supreme court of appeals today denied the petition for a writ of error by Henry Clay Beattie, Jr., wife last July
This decision on the appea from the judgment of the Chesterfield jury, which sentenced him to die in the electric chair Nov. 24, is final.
Only clemency or reprieve by Governor Mann can save the condemned man. Beattie's last hope of judicial interference was dashed when the supreme court announced that "the trial court was plainly correct in its ruling and the appeal is therefore denied." No further comment was made upon the case.
Richmond, Nov. 15-Governor Mann today declined to interfere in any way with the decree of the Chester county court, which had been sustained by the Su preme court of Criminal Appeals f the state.
A petition was presented to the governor praying for a respite of at least thirty days for spiritual preparation but this was also denied
In a signed statement Gov. Mann said in part: "I followed the case during the trial and as its horrible facts were developed regretted that a crime so cruel and malicious should have occurred within the confines of the state. That Beattie is guilty of wilful, deliberate and cruel murder of his young wife 1 have not the slightest doubt, nor is it insisted that there shall be any greater relief offered than commutation of his sentence to imprisonment for life, I do not think the affidavits of Paul Beat tie, printed, or any other evidence brought to my attention
sufficient for that purpose.
"To grant a respite would to set a precedent, to tempoize with law andencourage appeals to the supreme court with the sole purpose of gaining time. I believe that the best way to prevent such crimes is to punish them adequately, certainly and speed ily. Therefore the judgment the circuit court of appeals shall
be carried into effect without interference from me."
