LT. GOVERNOR Bob Bullock, speaking to the Texas Press Assn.'s mid-winter meeting, made some remarks that we thought our readers would be interested in. The following is a re-hash of the main part of Bullock's speech to the press:

Texans are frustrated. They are in no mood for new or higher taxes. There are three over-riding reasons why the next legislature should heed the frustrations of the people:

1. The current tax system is unfair but Texans cannot agree on how to reform it.

2. The economy continues to be sluggish, putting a real strain on all but a few lucky Texans.

3. The will of the people is overwhelmingly against any new taxes.

The legislature should resist any attempt to raise taxes and see to it instead that state government lives within its existing means. (The one exception might be a specific mandate from the Supreme Court for new taxes for public schools.)

Matching the budget to available revenue will not be easy in a state with a growing population, an increasing crime rate and a growing number of families living in poverty.

State agencies must do more services with proportionately less money. There will be some new money even from sluggish economic growth--but there will be less dollars per capita to spend on services, whether it is per child in school or per criminal in prison.

But efficiencies and the small amount of new money alone won't cover the gap when we are looking at 92,000 more children coming into our public schools, 25,000 new prison cells coming on line to be staffed and paid for, a six per cent increase in demand for nursing home assistance and a 19 per cent increase in Texans eligible for Medicaid.

Texans must make a wide-awake assessment of what this decision means.

Texans need to understand up front the consequences of dividing the same money by more services--be it schools, nursing homes, prisons or highways.

A commitment now to hold the line on taxes will take the issue out of politics. And it will take politics out of this issue because the pain will be spread across the board.

In the past, the issue has been political and partisan because there have always been those who consistently voted against raising the money but still wanted to keep the schools well-funded back home.

These people--legislators and their supporters alike--must now quit being political and realistically accept what happens when we make the foot fit the shoe.

In the shorthaul, this approach will save taxpayers money. What it will cost in the long run remains to be measured--whether in the costs of an illiterate workforce, more at-risk youngsters turning to lives of crime or the further crumbling of an infrastructure already in trouble from lack of preventative maintenance.

It is unfortunate that there is no mechanism for the people of Texas to vote directly on these budget issues. The people of Texas deserve an opportunity to go to the ballot box and express their frustrations and their opinions as to what they want from government as well as what and how they are willing to pay for it.

But until that is possible, all officeholders, candidates and political parties should respond to the will of Texans with honest assessment of what it really means, not what sounds good politically in an election year.

Bullock pointed out to the TPA that from 1971 to 1984 the Texas Legislature did not increase tax rates or enact new taxes, yet during those same years, the state's population increased from 11.2 million to 16 million, or 42 per cent. Yet, we not only provided existing services to these new citizens, but also started new programs.

## Bovina Tops Vega; Scores 19th Win

Bovina High School's Mustangs scored a pair of vital district wins during the past week, to run their district record to 2-1, and their season record to 19-4.

The Mustangs are standing second in district play, behind Sudan's 3-0 record.

Tuesday night at Vega, the Mustangs downed the Longhorns, 71-70 in an overtime battle that was a great come-from behind effort.

The team trailed by ten points, 25-15, after one quarter, and Vega had a 38-27 lead at halftime.

Corey Kirkpatrick scored 11 first-quarter points, but only Rusty Venable with a pair of free throws and Cain Neal's two-pointer were able to get into the scoring column otherwise, as Vega took their 25-15 lead.

Bovina matched Vega's scoring for the most part in the second quarter, but could not cut into the lead, as the 'Horns went to halftime with a 38-27 edge.

The Mustangs came out with a great third quarter. Kirkpatrick zapped in nine points, Neal added seven, and Darren Hromas five. Bovina outscored Vega, 23-16, and trailed by only four, 54-50, after three quarters.

That left it to Kirkpatrick to pace the Ponies with 10 fourth quarter points, on four baskets and two of two at the line and force an

overtime after the teams finished regulation play all tied at 66-all.

In the overtime, Kirkpatrick scored a pair of baskets and Neal was one of two from the line for the hard-fought win.

Kirkpatrick blazed the trail with 39 points. He bagged 16 of 31 from the field, 51 per cent, and three of six from the free throw line. Kirkpatrick had four three-pointers among his shots from the field. He also led the team with 14 rebounds.

Neal was the only other Mustang in double-figure scoring with 12 points. He added eight rebounds.

Hromas scored only six points, but had nine rebounds and an assist. Kirkpatrick and Venable each had four steals.

Last Friday, the Mustangs scored a 65-62 win over rival Farwell, to even their district record at 1-1.

It was a close game all the way. Rusty Venable started off with seven points in the first quarter, but the team trailed the Steers, 16-12.

Neal hit a trio of baskets, and Hromas scored two field goals and hit two of two from the line as Bovina outscored Farwell, 14-10 in the period and tied it up at the half, 26-all.

Farwell took a 41-38 lead after three quarters.

Hromas, Venable, Kirkpatrick and Cain Neal all hit the basket with regularity as the Mustangs racked up their 18th win of the season.

Hromas led the scoring with 20 points; Venable added 17, Neal scored 13 and Kirkpatrick 12.

Neal hit five of seven from the line, 71 per cent, and Hromas blazed with six of seven for 86 per cent, and eight of nine from the line, 89 per cent.

Neal owned the boards, with 21 rebounds for the game. Hromas came up with five blocked shots and Kirkpatrick had three steals.

The B.H.S. Fillies have had some hard luck in district play. The team dropped both of their games during the past week, losing a tough 72-69 decision to visiting Farwell last Friday, and then falling, 62-46 at Vega on Tuesday.

The Fillies took an 11-8 season record into district play, but finished the first round of district at 0-3 and saw their overall record knotted at 11-11.

Local fans thought the Farwell game should have produced a district win for the Fillies. Cindy Quintana had an eight-point first period, pacing BHS to a 23-19 lead.

Donna Griggs popped a three-point basket, another two-pointer,

and hit six of seven from the foul line, as the Fillies hiked their lead to 41-35 at the half.

Miss Quintana again warmed up, hitting five baskets, and Teresa Stone contributed a three-point bomb, as the Fillies held onto a 56-51 lead at the end of three quarters.

But the Lady Steers saved their best 'till the last, rallying for 21 points, and holding the Fillies to 13 in the final quarter, to snatch the three-point win.

Miss Quintana, who scored 21 points to pace the team, fouled out of the game, as did Kim Kirkpatrick, hurting Bovina's cause, and Miss Griggs was playing with four fouls. She scored 17 points.

Miss Quintana also led with 13 rebounds. Misses Kirkpatrick and Griggs each had four steals.

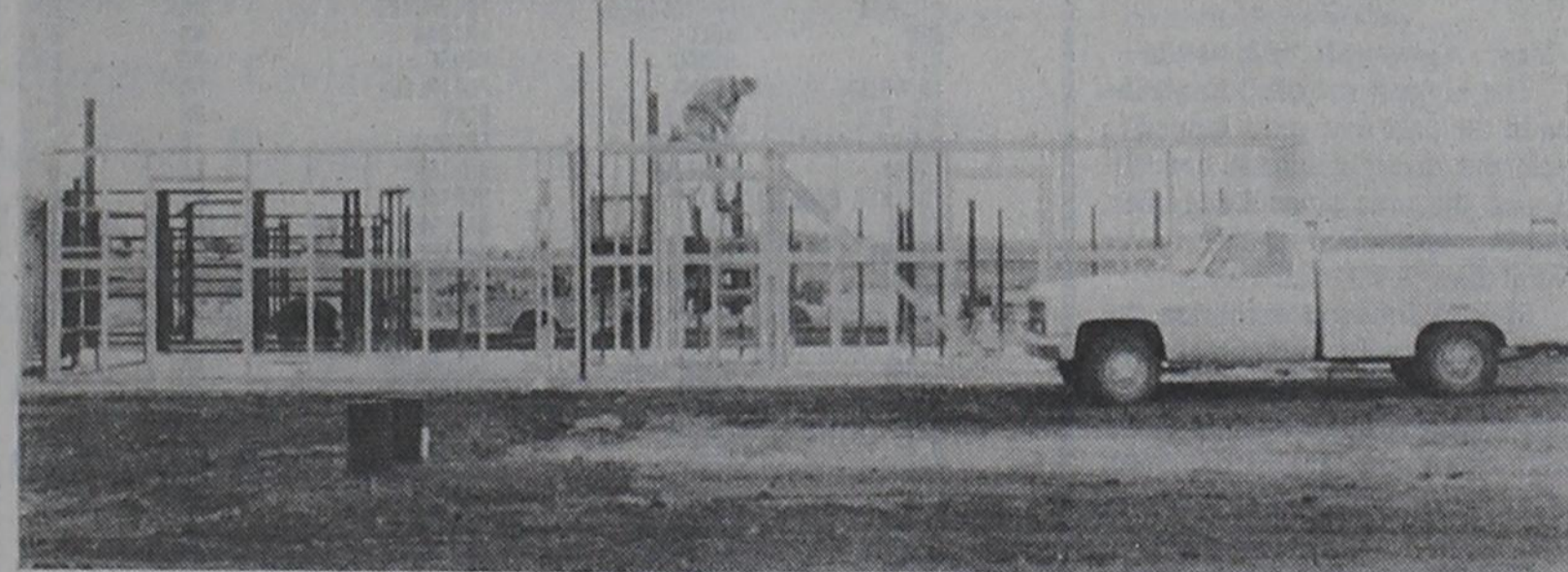

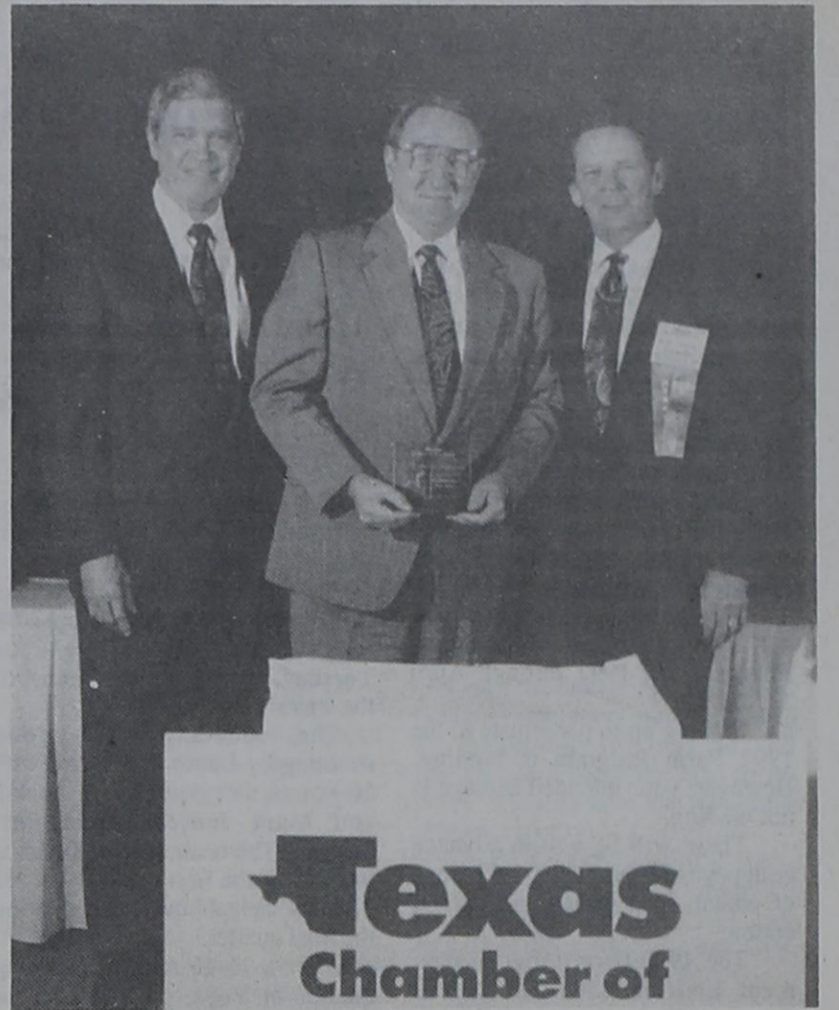

In its third year locally and its fourth year nationally, the Super Cities Walk is becoming the primary fundraiser for the National MS Society.

Organizers conducted the Walk in 235 locations last year, which generated more than \$20 million for the Society's research and chapter service programs. Last year, locally more than 1500 people walked in the 15-kilometer, or 9.3 mile event and raised \$85,000. This year's event will also include in-line skating for those who wish to skate instead of walk.

Lueise Tyson, Co-Chairman for Preservation Amarillo, is designing this year's Walk route. It will include parts of the downtown, Plemons Oliver Eakle, Bivins, Country Club and Wolfli areas. "The MS Society appreciates all the research that goes into planning our historic route," said Lucia Gray, Panhandle Chapter Executive Director. "The people of our area are proud of our heritage. This event enables our walkers to learn more about the Panhandle history as well as raise funds to combat this mysterious disease."

Walkers will collect pledges based on the distance walked. Organizers will award prizes to all walkers based on the level of funds raised. Prizes range from T-shirts and gift certificates to our Grand Prize - a six-day trip to Italy courtesy of American Airlines and The Travel Store.

National Home Health Care is a primary sponsor for the Walk. A special promotion is being done during the month of March by Roman Meal bread with proceeds going to the Super Cities Walk. Other local sponsors include the Olive Garden, American Airlines, Pepsi Cola, United Supermarkets,

Multiple sclerosis is a chronic, often disabling disease that "short circuits" the central nervous system, usually striking adults between the ages of 20 and 40. The disease affects more than 500 persons and their families in the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles.

The National MS Society funds numerous research projects aimed at developing a treatment and cure for MS. Through its local chapter, the Society provides services such as equipment loans, counseling and referral, and public and professional education.

A meeting was held at the EMS Building in Bovina on Monday, February 3 from 9:00 to 11:00 by the ASCS County Office to explain the 1992 Farm Program as well as the 1991 Disaster Program.

Approximately 70 area farmers turned out for the meeting to get acquainted with the new Director of the Parmer County ASCS office, Kurt Miller. Also in attendance was the ASCS District Director from Hereford, John Fuston, and Danny Noble, Director of Bailey County ASCS office.

The 1992 Farm Program sign-up will be held Monday, February 10, 1992 through April 17, 1992.

Signing up to participate in the 1992 Farm Program is binding. However, your intended acreage is not binding.

There will be a 40% advance cash payment for the 1992-93 crops of wheat, feed grains and upland cotton.

The 1992 Farm Program payment limit is \$50,000. Status dates: ACP-the day you make application; Arp-the last day of sign-up April 17, 1992.

Texas is a community property state. Therefore, spouses must be on payment limit form as combined with the producer. Also new this year, the contract to participate in the farm program will also require the spouses signature. You may pick up a power of attorney for your spouse at the County office.

If any required signatures are missing on March 13, 1992, the County Committee cannot approve the application.

The sign-up period for the 1990-1991 Disaster Program is February 18, in Bovina, starting at 8:00 a.m. at the EMS building on the corner of 3rd Street and Ave. B, which is the old Legion Hall location.

Those who wish to receive the commodities are being asked to please bring head of household Social Security Cards and proof of family income, as all recipients must reapply for the year 1992.

Commodities will be distributed Thursday, February 20, at the County Barn. Commodities will be given out starting at 8:00 a.m.

## Blood Bank Will Receive Donors Next Thursday

Coffee Memorial Blood Center, a non-profit organization from Amarillo, will be in Bovina on Thursday, February 13, 1992, at the Bovina High School to receive blood donors from 2:00 till 5:30 p.m.

Coffee Memorial Blood Center is licensed by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and accredited by the American Association of Blood Banks.

The FDA inspects the Blood Center annually to insure compliance with regulations established by FDA and mandated by federal law. These regulations are designed to assure the highest possible degree of safety of every unit of blood or blood product issued by the Blood Center for transfusion purposes.

The volunteer blood donor is the cornerstone of any blood program's operation. A blood center can only remain responsive to the need when people who are able to donate take it upon themselves to do so on a

regular basis.

As state law requires the written consent of parent or guardian for 17-year-olds, an acceptable minor donor permit form will be provided by the Blood Center. Donors age 66 or older may continue to donate provided there are no changes in their health, and they meet all normal donor criteria. First time donors over age 66 may be requested to have written permission from their physician.

You may be temporarily deferred if you have or had recent flu, cold, sore throat or fever; close contact with hepatitis in the past six months; active infection or disease presently requiring prescribed medication; vaccinations in the past 24 hours; dental surgery in the past three days; pregnancy in the past six weeks; or major surgery or blood transfusion in the past six months.

You cannot contract AIDS or any other infectious disease by donating blood.

## Clinic Schedule For February

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for February.

Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps, and HIB (haemophilus influenzae type B).

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

The February schedule of clinics in this area is as follows:

The Dimmitt clinic will be held at Azteca Complex at 910 East Jones on February 7 from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and 1:00 to 3:00 p.m.

In Hereford the immunization clinic will be held three different days during the month at the Texas Department of Health Office located at 205 West 4th Street, Suite B. Dates are February 6, 13, and 20. Times are from 9:00 to 11:30 a.m. and 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. for each of those three dates.

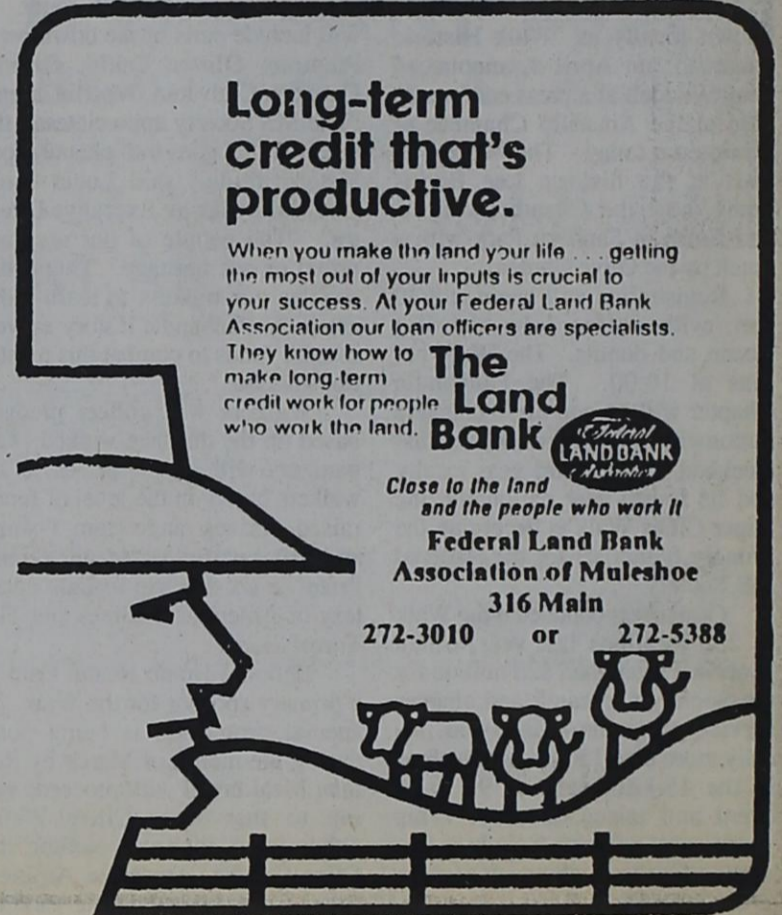

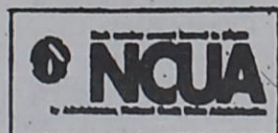

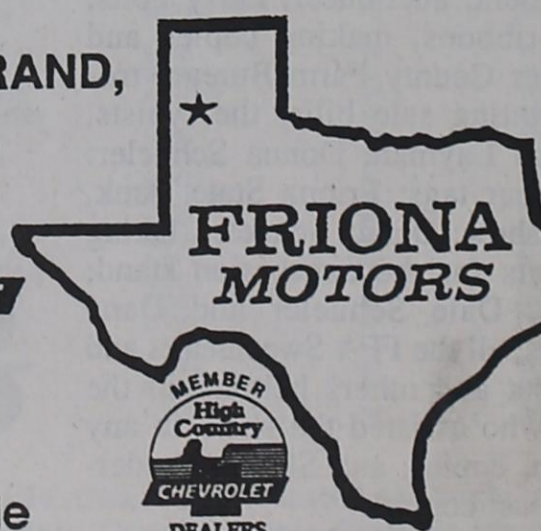

Under the direction of Neil Hess, company members not only have an opportunity to play to full houses every night but also to receive expert instruction and valuable exposure.

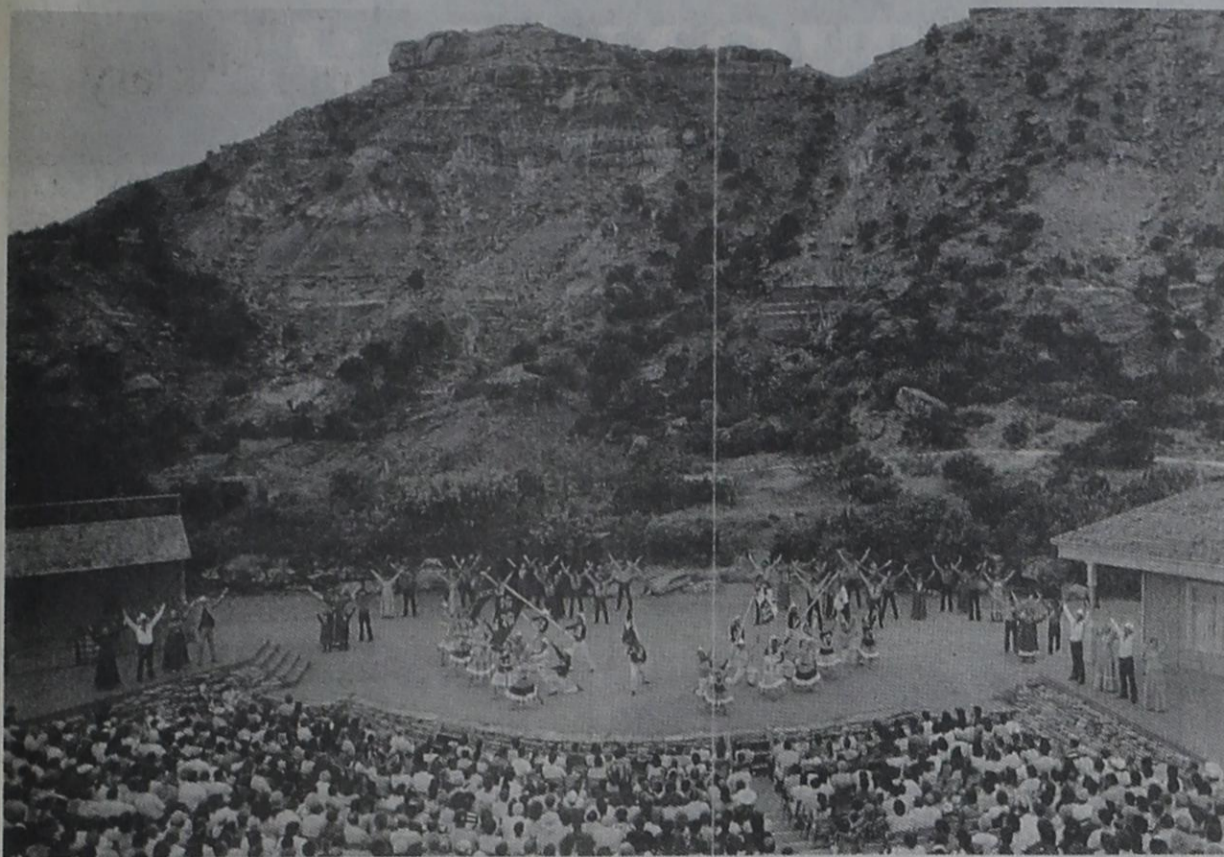

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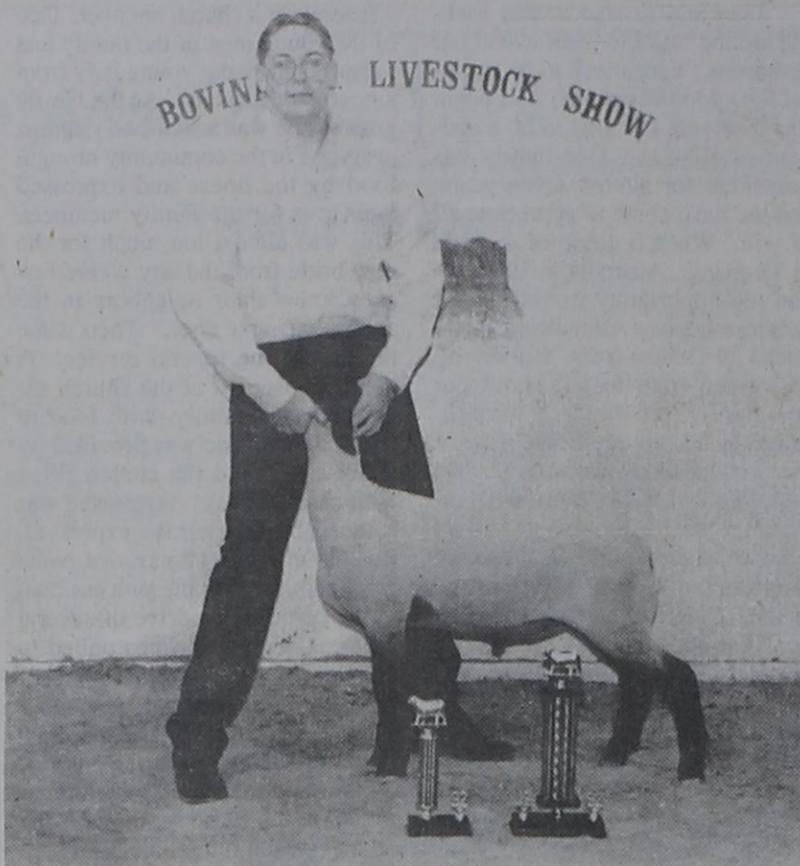

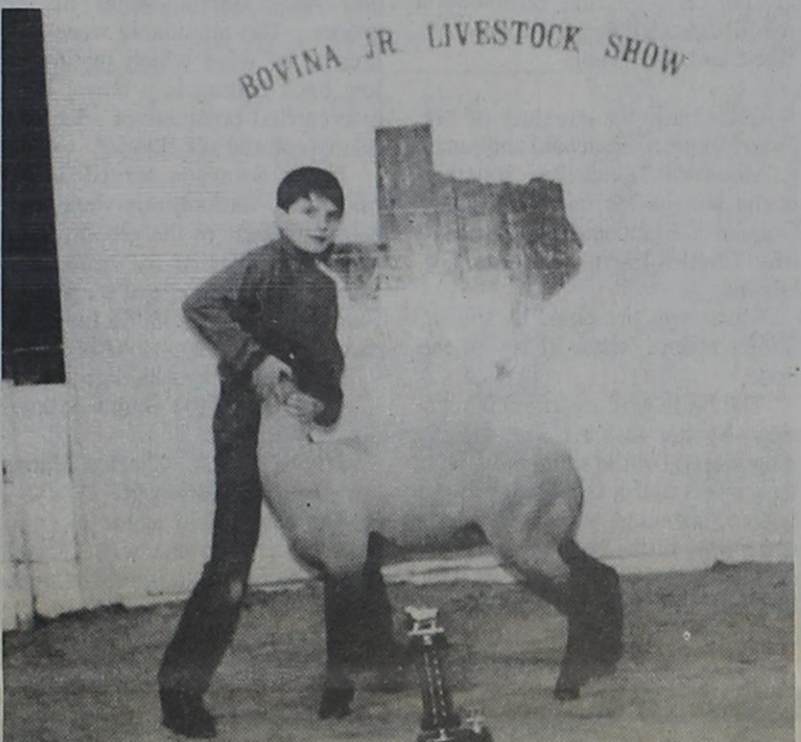
