At Baird two men who were under the new Texas \& Pacific car sheds at the time of the wind were caught by the falling timbers of the shed and painfully if not seriously injured, while at Elmdale the six year old daughor of Mr. Johnson was struck by a flying timber and cut about the body but not seriously injured. A barn falling at that place killed two cows that were under the sheds.
Reports from all parts of the state say it was one of the worst straight winds that has swept the ountry in many years.
