## THOUSHNOS ARE HOMELESS

Water is tar Above the Danger Itne in Most Country bordering the Mississippi
Ohlo and Cumberland Rivers.
Memphis, Tenn., April 3.Two hundred miles of levees Tuesday night had held the greatest volume of water known in Mississippi river history.
Early spring freshets due to heavy rainfall on watersheds of the Ohio, Tennessee and Cumberland rivers caused the rivers to rise.
The orest is not in sight, an average rise of about two feet being yet expected in the district being yet expected in the distriot
between the vioinity of Hickmay, Ky., and Helena, Ark.
"Fourty-four or higher" is the prediction at Memphis, where several hundred people were driven from their homes when a small levee broke, and where street car traffic is partially suspended, railroad service irregular and the gas plant threatened. The flood stage at Memphis is 35 . One of the two levees at Hiekman, Ky., broke, rendering 2,400 man, Ky., broke, rendering 2,400
peopte homeless and throwing out of work several hundred men The larger levee protecting the main portion of Hiokman seems to be holding its own against the flood.
Nashville, Tenn., April 3.-The gauge on the Cumberland river this morning read forty-seven and one fourth feet with the river still rising at a fast rate. Hundreds of families have been forced to flee for their lives and leave their homes as quickly as they could.
In the vicinity of Cario. Ill.,two out-side levees broke today, one and Scott county, near Commerce, Mo. The outlets have relieved to some extent the strain at Cario, and has glven those fighting to hold the water within bounds at that city freth hope. At Birds Point a negr as drowned the first fatality $\quad$ flood.
At Point Pleadant, Mo, where the river went through several ays ago a mile of levee is gone. he lowlands are flooded to a water four to five feet and the rancis river basin This is the immediate basin of that river n stand.
Linda, Mo., is threatened. At that point the bank has eaved to a point of danger and every available man is at work building a short loop around the danger zone. If this is completed before the levee goes out it is believed water will be held

Taking into consideration that we have a fine season in the land, in many instances good seed beds prepared and the present outlook very promising, let's don't fall down on a crop just by being careless enough to plant any old kind o seed. Refering to the old adage that "like be gets like" we cannot hope for good or satisfactory results from the planting of inferior seeds.

The Census Reports show the average value of

 progre⿻丷木，March 14，－The ment of cities and towns in Cen tral Weat Texas during the las three yeara ha been suffieient théne oaco 0 who have the stories of drouth and hard times which have gone the rounds of the state．The go－shead spirito the people did not dry up during the drouth，nor blow away when the winds came sweeping over the prairies，but manifeeted itsel streets ；in erecting new homes and the general preparation for thề business to come．
## Hopeful of the Future．

Conditions in Abilene，Merkel and Sweetwater are similar to those found in other Central West Texas cities previously mentioned in these articles．
General improvement is noted in General improvement is noted in
the towns，while the farmers have made preparations for a large acreage of staple crops． prospects are bright for an abun－ dant yield．Progressive produc－ ers who plowed early and deep and who prepared their seed beds with the view of conserving moisture are practically assured crops．Others，if rain falls in April or May，will also make good orops，and because of the
good season already in the good season already in the
ground，men of all classes are ground，men of all olasses are in the city and country develop ment．

## large Acreage of Feedstufts．

The largest acreage of oate in the history of the country ha been pút in and good stands are reported．Preparations for an increased acreage of maize，kaf fir corn and sorghum have bee made，while not a few will try peanuts．The general disposi－ tion is to diversify，and this being urged by farm demonstrat－ ore and by business men who are beginning to appreciate th fact that a one－crop country is far less prosperous than one in which general farming is prac ticed．
Traveling men，who have made this country from year to year ever since railroads were built in－ to it，confirm all repotts of cro prospects，not only－in the section immediately referred to in these letters，but in all countries in Central West and West Texas． These men are in close touch with general conditions．The are unanimous in their repor that conditions have not been equaled in many years．Mer chants are not buying heavily and farmers are holding expens es down to the minimum．Re sults of the last three years hav made action necessary，but ac tual failures have been few and business men generally are in position to tide over until a cro is made and marketed．

Combliation farms
A large acreage of feedstuffs a few good cowe，a few hoge and plenty of poultry is a winning combination in this country，as well as any other．This sort of farming is not generally practio ed here，but its advooates are in－ oreasing in number．The old idea that nothing must be grown that cannot be sold in the crude form still prevails，but the excepp tions are frequent enough to fur－ nieh the neceseary demonstra
tion to those whe will not listen but who can be shown． Conservation of Molsture The practice of drilling cotton aee，main or kanl corn int if it rains some crop will be made and if it doesn＇t it won＇t make any difference，is not so common as a few years ago．The drouth of the last three years has driven that class of farmers，if farmers they can be called，out of the country．Those who remained re the true pioneers of the farm ing industry and are making good．They are the ones who had the advice of practical ex－ perts and are adopting methnd of moisture conservation．

Bullding of Citiles．
Sweetwater has made wonder－ ful progress in city building and is pushing the work with energy oeptibly delay the transporiation of the village into a city of con siderable pretensions．Recently eleven blocke of asphaltt maca－
dam paving were laid and plans are ready for the laying of thirt additional blocke，property own rs to pay two－thirds of the cost， his work was planned durin the drouth．In addition to pav－
ing the streets of the city $\$ 100$ ， 000 is being expended on coun－ try roads．
Abilene is also spending $\$ 150$ ， 000 in building macadam roada those completed giving such per－ fect satisfaction that opponents of the bond issue have been con－ verted．Abilene has also weath－ ered the drouth period and is in position to prospar with the making of the next crop

## Housing of Tenants．

The proper housing of tenants is still a problem，the solution of which is yet to come．Those who are charged with the dnty of inducing immigration find their hardest work in securing ren farms with comfortable homes Intelligent men do not alwaye go into a new country and pur－ chase land at once．Many pre er renting for a for a year or two afore investing．Intelligent armers of the tenant class also demand comfortabla homes fo heir families，and the most de sirable citizens are often turned away because landlords refuse to provide respectable quarters． The problem is a large one，but one which must be solved before best results are obtained from the frorts of the commercial clubs， ewspapers and railroads to set ie unoccupied lands and develop
