In fact, the ships whith sail be twaen New York, New Orleans or any other American port and South America are usually devoted to carrying freight instead of passengers The average American, when he thinks of his summer vacation turns his eyes toward Europe. They never seem to realize that there are certain oities in the developing nations of South A merica that are equally if not more interesting.
The real truth is that we know very little about South Amerioa. The nations of Europe are far better advieed and appreciate the advantages of fered for business. England, France and Gerfered for business. England, France and Ger-
many divide honors, while we, nestling close to many divide honors, while we, nestling close to
the South Amerioan repullios and in a measure their sponsors, do little business with them.
Only with Argentina do our trade relations seem
to expand and it was through the efforts of tha nations that suoh a thing has been made possible The contraot awarded to the Falls River Ship building Company was the first impetus given to reciprocal business relations between the tw oountries and it is in this country alone that th United States oan lay any claim to success, com mercially speaking.
Our shipments to Argentina have doubled with in the last six years, but there is yet room for ex pansion. Our relations with Chile and Brazil are most cordial. Both countries are anxious and willing to make these relations closer and to trade with the United States if we will only enter the field. On the other hand, European concerns have their best men in the field. One firm of locomotive manufacturers of Berlin sold a single railroad in Argentina 400 locomotives to be used on the railroads of that country, while the United States secured a contract for only 25 . If we will go after the business we oan get it. It is natural that we should, but we oannot stand idly by while
foreigners are actively represented and expect foreigners are actively represented and expect
that business will come to us of its own accord. We muet fight for what we have and fight to keep it these strenuous times.-Commercial Appeal.

## the deaniy fir.

This deadly ineect, now called the typhoid fly, having visited a privy vault which has been the reopptacle of undisinfeoted disoharges, may next be found in milk, raw vegetables, fruits or other foode, oarrying typhoid germs on its legs and in its body. A circular desoribing measures for the
extermination of flies will be sent without obarge on request to the State Board of Health.
One case of typhoid in the neighborhood of a airy may be the source of an extensive epidemic, as is censtantly being demonstrated, or an entire neighborhood may be endangered by a case in which there is negiect to disinfect discharges before depositing them in an open privy vault. In view of the foregoing facts the entire ohain of preventive measures is obvious. If faithfully carried out the result would be the complete eradication of typhoid fever, the most easily preventable of all diseases and the existence of which is a diggrace to any community.
the prevestion of typhoid fever.
Typhoid fever is an infectious or communicable isease caused solely by a specific germ called the typhoid bacillus, which is passed from the body in the discharges from the bowels or blad-
der. Preventive measures begin with the disin. fection of these dischrrges and if properly car. ried out in all cases no other measures would be required, but unfortunately, for various reasone, this result is not attained. Some cases are of so mild a type as to escape discovery, the socalled walking typhoid being an example. Others have spread the infection in the early stages before a diagnosis has been made. A third class comprises a small percentage in which the germs comprises a small percentage in which the germs
continue to be present indefinitely in the discharges of a person having had the disease. These cases are called typhoid carriers. The ases, however, which are usually responsible, are the ordinary ones in which, through ignorance or indifference, the proper disinfection of discharges has been neglected. Every case of typhoid fever results from the failure to disinfect discharges from a former case.

It is one of the most pitiful sights in twentieth century civilization to see a farmer after he has raised a bale of cotton sit helplessly by and watch the bulls and bears of Europe and America tear it to pieces, and yet the farmer's union has warehouses that will afford shelter against these artificial storms, and backed by six per cent money to loan on distress cotton, the farmer can fence out the animals that devastate his crops. The armer needs co-operation as badly as diversififarmer
cation.
