We endorse the platform and nominees of the Baltimor the people of Texas as the splen did expression of progressive Democracy, progress within the lines of constitutional protection system of judicial procedure in this state, both civil and criminal eliminating therefrom useless and antiquated technical rules and
decisions of procedure, which delay and clog justioe, and to this end we favor the enactment of the followling laws
A law providing that no case, Al or criminal, shail be reversed especially error of procedure or practice, where such error can not from the record be reasonult of the trial injuriously to the party complaining.
3. We favor the passage of a law requiring all places where intoxicating liquors are sold to be closed at night between the hours of 9 o'clock in the evening and 6 o'look in the morning, and a law prohibiting the sale of
whiskey by drink and only in whiskey by drink and only in
paokage, the same not to be package, or about the premises
drunk on or where sold. With the passage and enforcement of these laws We deprecate any further agita-
tion of state-wide probibition for a reasonable number of years, giving to these measures a fair trial of their effieiency.
4. We favor the enactment of ampaign ng tributions in elections, both before and after he election, inoluding the source trom whioh such contributions are received, the amount thereof and the objects and purposes for which the same are used.
5. The enactment of a law
imiting the expenditures of all andidates for office to a reason. able sum, whether spent by the candidate or others in his behalf, hus enabling the poor man and compete with the rich when offercompete with the rich when offer-
ing for office, and preventing the dapger to popular government from the profligate use of money
7. We believe in the rule the majority, and demand an amendment to the election law
providing for all nominations by providing for
the majority.
9. We pledge the Democraoy to the adequate support and proper provision for all our stitutions, believing that the af flicted and unfortunate are the wards of the state and entitled a its hands to adequate protection, care and maintenance; and to this end we favor a state Board of Charities and Correction, in order that all our eleemosynary institutions may be properly cor related and their administration taken out of the hands of partisan politios.

In a talk with a Mail reporter Mr. Coggin gave an account of the battle at Montevista a mining town in the State of Sonora, in which two Germans, John Hurting and Guido Shulbert were hanged. The two men were residents of Douglass and were well known in that place. Hurtling had taken out original oitienship papers but was termed a aubject of Germany. He was well-known by Mr. Coggin having been with him in Douglass. This action taken by the rebels hows very plain that the forigners have no protestion in or bout the country ocoupied by he rebels and the hanging is aken as a general warning for 11 foreigners to leave the coun ry. This is one of the reasone why Otti has returned to Merkel. He seems to feel very safe here where he will stay until the situa tion improves.

City Ordinance.
n ordinance to reguiate draymen and Baggage and Express Wagons, Imviding a penalty
Be it ordained by
he city of Merkel, that city council of the passage of this ordinance there shall be levied and collected from each public drayman, expressman and baggageman, pursuing the occupation and calling of carrying goods, wares and merchandise for hire within the coporate limits of the city of Merkel an annual license tax of five ( $\$ 5.00$ ) Dol-
lars for each two horse vehicle and two and fifty one hundred (\$2.50) Dollars hall be horse vehicle. A person cupation of drayman or baggeman or expressman if he haul or offer to haul goods, wares and merchandise for they
public, irrespective of the time he may be so engaged in said occupation. If any person shall pursue said occugageman as above defined without having first paid the license tax aforesaid, he shall be deemed guily of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of Ten Dollars.
The city council hereby reserves the right to refuse to issue such license, or where in their judgment the licenseed, person applying therefor has been or shall be guilty of extortionate charges for goods, wares and merchandise tion with the the carriage of said goods. From the fact that this city has now no ordinance regulating draymen, exfee therefor, creates an emergency, and the rule requiring ordinances to be read at three several meetings of the
council be dispensed with and that this act take effect from and after its passage and publication as required by
