BOYS ARE MAKING a comeback in the realm of top scholars, according to the photos of area honor students that we studied this past weekend in the Amarillo Globe-News.

For years, it seemed as though the girls took all the top classroom honors, and boys were further down the ladder, but not so in 1992.

Cain Neal, for example, grabbed class valedictorian honors at Bovina High School.

We noticed that of the 50 schools included in the Panhandle area by the Globe-News feature, Neal was one of 25 boys who took top classroom honors.

For the boys to have gained an even split should put to rest the idea that the boys were only supposed to be "jocks," study agriculture, or whatever, but not to compete for top scholastic honors.

In addition to the 25 valedictorians, boys captured class salutatorian honors at 20 other schools.

At 11 area schools, the boys swept both of the top two class spots. They held forth at Clarendon, Claude, Friona, Gruver, Hedley, Higgins, Lazbuddie, Silvertown, Texhoma, Texico and Tucumcari.

Bovina's third-ranking student, Corey Kirkpatrick, gave the males two of the top three spots in the B.H.S. class of 1992.

At Friona, Scott Houston and Ryan Sifford led their classes, and at Lazbuddie it was Frank Gonzales and Stacey Barber.

In the cases of Neal, Kirkpatrick, Houston, Sifford, Gonzales and Barber, they also should have struck down another stereotype, that of the "dumb jock," since virtually all of these guys were three-sport athletes.

And they weren't just "participants," either as seen in the fact that the two B.H.S. fellows brought home silver medals from the state track meet after stellar performances in both football and basketball, having helped lead the Mustangs to the bi-district round in the hoop sport.

The Friona and Lazbuddie boys were equally as involved in their schools' sports programs.

And all of these guys were totally involved in other aspects of their school as well, we know from having just written the senior biographies of each one.

In fact, we were reminded once again of how the students in our smaller schools are involved in virtually every program and organization available to them. It has been this way for years, and sometimes the parents may wonder at times if their children might not be over-extended, for having to be involved in so many activities.

However, it was our experience years ago, going to Texas Tech from a small town, to see how the kids from the smaller schools seem to adapt better, overall, than those who come out of the larger schools.

Students from small towns and schools seem to be better-rounded individuals, and project hope for succeeding as they prepare themselves for going out into the world.

We hope we haven't sounded too chauvinistic this week, and we're sure that if we have, Carol will quickly point it out in "Her Turn."

But recalling the days when we competed with some pretty sharp girls for classroom honors (and generally coming out second best), we just had to say a word of praise for this year's guys.

There used to be a notion that boys who excelled at the books might be a mite bit "sissyfied." That was probably a rumor started by the boys who just couldn't cut it in the classroom.

Anyway, we know the six Parmer County fellows mentioned above, and that label just wouldn't stick on any of them.

Way to go, guys.



Guatemalan Missionaries To Speak Here Wednesday

How many of you would have the faith to leave everything you have here in the United States to go to Central America with only a vision to start a ministry among the poor children of Guatemala?

Yet that is exactly what Bo and Jeannie Bartley did in the late 1970's! Leaving friends and family (Jeannie's family, the Iveys lived here several years ago; Tonya Gober is Jeannie's sister) in the Bovina and Farwell area, Bo and Jeannie went to the Guatemalan jungle to carve out "El Rancho de los Ninos" on a 300-acre tract of land donated by the national government, in the northern region six miles north of Lake Peten.

Since then, Bo and Jeannie have struggled mightily for the past fifteen years to keep El Rancho and the ministry to the children there afloat. Although they are Baptist in faith, they are independent missionaries with no denominational ties.

Their support has come solely from individual churches and concerned people interested in their work. First Baptist Church of Bovina has been directly involved with their ministry now for several years, budgeting money for El Rancho de los Ninos, as well as helping purchase a car, two-way radio equipment, etc., and sending school supplies, clothes, and personal items, for the needy and orphaned children of Guatemala.

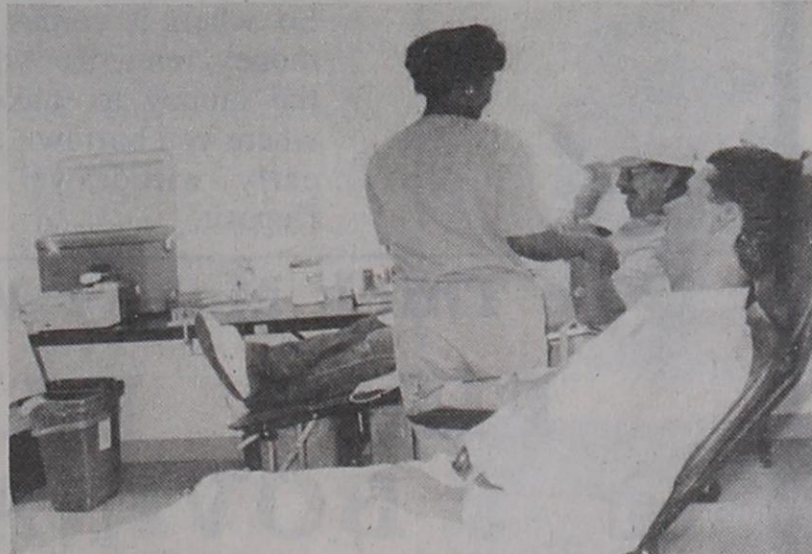

The Bartleys and the children's ministry of El Rancho has gone through many difficult times. In 1989, a fire destroyed a dormitory, claiming the lives of several boys. Bo and Jeannie grieved greatly over their loss.

Since that time, Jeannie has spent much of her time in their home in Guatemala City, working and keeping many of the younger children and girls there.

Other difficult times include the constant on-going need for food and clothing for growing children, medical and dental attention, transportation, farm and ranch equipment, water supplies, electric generators, and housing improvements.

It seems that the equipment is always in need of constant repair or replacement. And of course there are the everyday needs that school and ministry demand, plus the need for qualified teachers and workers.

Baptist Church members went to Guatemala to help with dormitory construction, painting, tractor repair, and ministry to the children. We were impressed by Bo and Jeannie's perseverance, and by the children they minister to, bright-eyed boys and girls of all ages.

At that time they had a total of 44 children; six girls and 38 boys, ranging in age from 18 months to teenagers. The ranch was becoming more self-sufficient with cattle, honey bees, orchards, and other farming projects. The children themselves do most of the work. Bo and Jeannie have adopted one child, Jennifer, who is now eleven, and have also helped place other children for adoption.

In the last year, Bo and Jeannie and the ministry in Guatemala have undergone much transition, with the opening of a school in St. Andreas, a little village on the northern shore of Lake Peten, across the lake from the larger town of Flores. Also, the board of directors for El Rancho de los Ninos in Farwell has been dissolved. The new headquarters for the ministry is now in Vinita, Oklahoma, and functions under the new name, "The Children's Ranch."

Local residents interested in the children's ministry carried on by Bo and Jeannie are encouraged to come hear them share their work and needs this coming Wednesday evening, June 10, at 7:30 p.m. in the fellowship hall of First Baptist church. Anyone wishing to help with school supplies, clothes, etc., for the children may call the church office at 238-1632. You can help keep things looking up for the children of Guatemala.

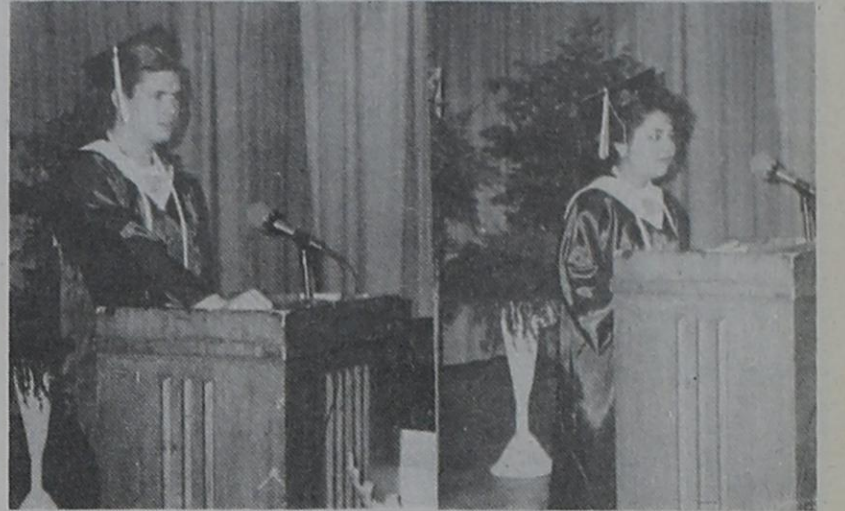
There were 288 girls that tried out for this team so the competition was a real factor in this game. The Young Guns had a great showing, losing out 48-47.

Bovina To Host THD Clinic

The Bovina Medical Clinic, 509 Avenue I, will be hosting one of the immunization clinics offered by the Texas Department of Health on Monday, June 8 from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m.

Bovina's clinic will be operated just the one day in June.

Children may receive vaccine for protection against a variety of childhood diseases, including polio, diphtheria, lockjaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps, and HIB (haemophilus influenzae, Type B).

The Department of Health charges a fee for the vaccinations, in order to keep the clinics open. The amount of money charged is based on family income and size, and ability to pay.

For those who cannot make it to the Bovina Clinic on June 8, the service will also be available in Hereford at 205 West 4th Street, Suite B, on June 11, 18 and 25, from 9-11:30 a.m. and 1-4 p.m. each day.

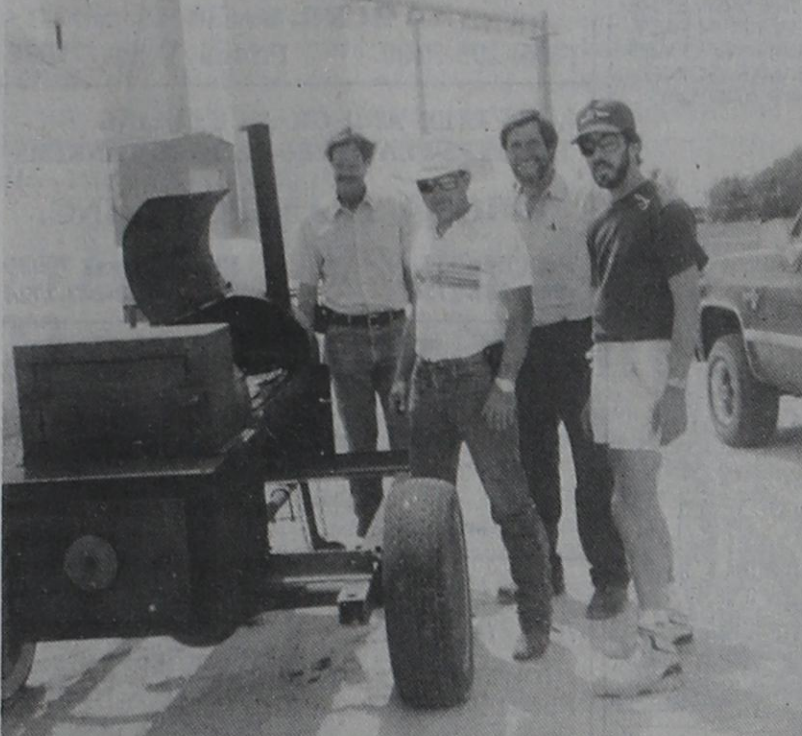
Imperial Holly's sales and advertising programs will continue to be administered under the direction

DPS Gives Tips For Safe Travel

It's vacation time and time to start thinking about our summer travels and those year long planned vacations. Major Vernon Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, says, "With some pre-planning on our parts, our summer travels can be made a lot easier and a whole lot safer."

Major Cawthon suggests that before you take to the road that you first check out yourself or other drivers in your group to ensure that everyone is well rested. Do not push yourself to the limit, ensure that you take proper breaks and spread the driving out over short distances. Ensure that all drivers feel good physically and emotionally and that no driver is taking medication or has had any alcoholic beverages to drink.

Make a check of the vehicle to include tires, brakes, belts, hoses, wipers, lighting and fluid levels and include spare parts for any minor repair that might unexpectedly come up. Remember to use your headlights to allow other drivers to see you in adverse conditions. At night, do not over-drive your headlights. Over 50 percent of all traffic deaths happen at night. Also, remember that at night, our eyes take 4 to 7 seconds to re-adjust to night conditions after facing bright lights.

Keep posted on weather conditions. Adverse weather can affect your ability to see and be seen. In bad weather, slow down and put on the low beam headlights. If conditions warrant, it is advisable to stop and take a break. Be alert to traffic conditions and if you are traveling at night, and especially on the weekends, be aware that a lot of drivers sharing the road with you are either fatigued or intoxicated. Alcohol impaired drivers cause at least 50 percent of all fatal accidents. One of your best defenses against the drunk driver is your safety belt, but it is only effective if you and all your occupants wear them.

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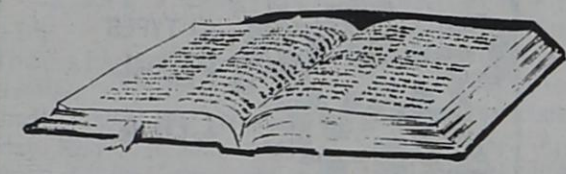

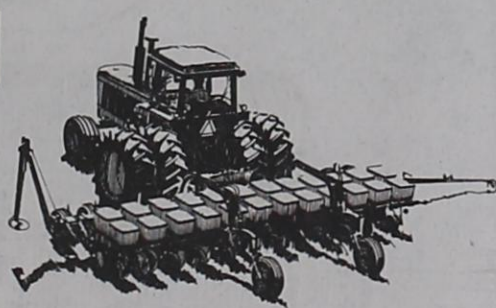

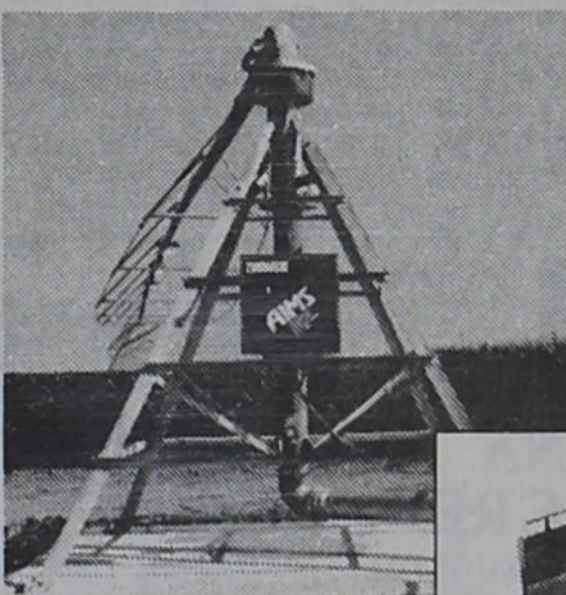
