Sohool will begin the 23 rd of September, and it is important that all children enroll the very first day. If you keep your ohildren out two weeks or a month, they will be a month behind their class with their work. Hence they cannot do the work with their class, and they will be required to go in a tower grade. All children that have never gone to rohool must enter the first day. If these children stay will be no class for them until after Christmas. Therefore, it is urged that you start them the first of echool. No one that is not practically six years old will be admitted to school.
All pupils below the eighth grade who live in the Merkel In. dependent School District north of the rail road, must go to the North Side School. All pupils in the High School will go to the
South Side School. South Side Sohool
The South Side School is very much orowded. Twenty-five or more students were crowded last year into a small room 15 by 17 feet. This is not conducive to health. You ean not ventilate well a room so badly crowded. Hence, the studente inhale the poisonous. To have good health 2,000 cubic feet of fresh air per hour is required for esch person.
A room ten feet high, twenty feet long and ten feet wide is required to contain 2,090 cubic feet of air
