## Roung on tie menspaper uiv.

Attorney-General Wiokereham has handed down a written opinion on the new federal law re-
quiring daily and weekly newspapers, and some
general semi-annual sworn statemente of circulation, ownership of their stocks and bonds and ther information.
The law went into effect Oct. 1, and will
be rigidly enforced, according to the be rigidly enforced, according to the postmastergeneral.
In the event of failure to comply with the new legal requirements the use of the mails is denied. Attorney-General Wickersham's opinion on certain aspects of the new law throws light on several dubious points, and, above all other thinge, shows what a miserable hodgepodge congress has made of the new amendment to the postoffice appropriation bill, for it was in this guise that the law was enacted.
Sifting the matter to the bottom, it appears as
if the bill was the if the bill was the outcome of a certain progressive sentiment which desires to ehow resentment oward certain newspapers.
Col. Roosevelt was a strong advocate of the Chicago Record-Herald until it turned against him, and then from the street corners in Chicago he advised his admirers to see who owned the mortgage on the paper.

postmaster-general's construction that it is immaterial whether the subsoriptions are individual or in bulk, and that the provision of the law cov-

That the new law will be enforced, there is little doubt. It will be enforoed so far as the department finde it practical to do so. The department last week began to mail to 120,000 editors, publishers and others interested forms to be filled out in compliance with the law. Under the aot they must be filled out and returned as soon as possible.
