perience as a laborer on a con struction gang of the Internation al \& Great Northern between Jack sonville and Palestine and reach ed the top round in railroad man ggement in 1905 when he wa olected chairmay of the execu tive committee of tte Rook Island and Frisco lines and dirested the affairs of 17,000 miles of railroad -the greatest aggregate mileage under any single control in the world.

He does not think there is any probsbility of the United States tak. ing a hand in the affair saying that the Federale were well able o handle the situation and only 4 the mountainous courtry are the rebele doing much of their pillaging and even United States soldiers could not handle such situations as well as the Mexioan army which is accustomed to the hilly country.
Personally Mr. Elias as he is known in this part of the country is a very interesting charaoter, being highly educated in both English and Spanish languagee, having graduated from one of the best colleges of this country.
