One pound of humus holds 71/2 times as much moisture as one pound of sand Humus is decayed vegetable matter and the best for you here is the cowpea. If you prepare your land it will take the moisture and hold it. It goes down and and then comes back up to feed your crop. I urge you to break your land early and fixtures of the two shops togethdeep. I am going to break my land ten inches deep and let me tell you here that is the reason you hear about the big crops we make back in my country. Our farmers have just woke up to improved farming the last few years. I would urge you to break it one way and then go back over it the other way for it will pay you, then use your harrows. #### Vote For This Amendment.

Anson, Texas, Oct. 28, 1912. Vote for the Constitutional Amendment to Remove the State Institutions from Political Influences.

To the Voters:

At the General Election to be held Tuesday, November 5th, you will have an opportunity to remove your higher educational, eleemosynary and penal institutions from the domain of partisan political influences, and put them upon an efficient and business-like basis.

An amendment to the state constitution has been submitted to the people, providing for a six-year term of office for all members of boards of regents, trustees and managers of the state institutions, such as the State University, A. & M. College, and other higher educational institutions as well as the asylums and penitentiaries, provided that one-third of each board shall be elected or appointed every two years.

There is a saying "To the victor belongs the spoils," and this policy has cost the people of the state to continue longer in a state developing so rapidly as ours. If the people adopt this amendment on Nov. 5th, it means that the policies of these great institutions will be continuous and efmaterially effect their welfare.

I sincerely commend this matter to you as being worthy of your due consideration and ardent support. No citizen can afford to vote against it, and he should insist that his neighbors and friends support it. I have discussed the amendment with a great many voters and I have yet to-find one who will vote against it if he understands it. We cannot afford to let this opportunity pass to make this much needed change in the constitution of our state when it means so much to all the peo-Respectfully,

#### **Vote For This Amendment.**

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the constitution be amended by adding a new section thereto, to be known and era. designated as "Section 30-a" and to read as follows:

Section 30-a. The Legislature may provide by law that the members of the Board of Regents of the State University and Boards of Trustees and Managers of the educational, eleemosynary, and penal institutions of the state, and such boards as have been or may hereafter be establiseed by law may hold their respective offices for the term of six (6) years, one-third of the members of such boards to be elected or appointed every two (2) years in such manner as the Legislature may determine; vacancies in such offices to be filled as may be provided by law, and the Legislature shall enact suitable laws to give effect to this section.


