
Basketball camps to get underway

Summer food program cancelled

A Summer School Food Service Program scheduled to begin May 31 to serve free breakfast and lunches to children ages one to 18, has been cancelled.

The program, which is sponsored by the Texas Department of Human Services, was to be administered by the Muleshoe Independent School District at DeShazo Elementary School.

According to Jim Clinton, contract manager for the Texas Department of Human Services in Lubbock, the application by MISD was approved for the program. However, Clinton said he later learned that an employee of the school's food services, ARA, not a school employee, attended a training workshop that is required to administer the program.

Clinton said that federal guidelines require that a school employee attend training.Clinton said he spoke with MISD officials, including Food Services Director Laine Meek and Buck Johnson, assistant superintendent of operations to try to work something out and allow them to make accomodations and possibly have an employee take self-paced training. However Clinton said MISD chose not to have it this year because of a lack of time to get someone

Study: Organic cotton production offers advantages

AUSTIN-A study funded in part by the Texas Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Diversification Program has concluded that organic cotton production in the High Plains offers economic advantages to farmers and to the state's economy, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said.

Along with paying farmers about twice what they receive for conventional cotton, organic cotton production also generates additional economic activity in the state.

On average, an acre converted from conventional to organic production results in an additional \$419.50 in demand for goods and services within the state, according to the study done by the University of Texas' Natural Fibers Research and Information Center in Austin.

Of the 13,300 acres of organic cotton planted for the 1992-63 season, the 11,000 bales harvested earned \$5.5 million directly in farm-gate value. Organic cotton farmers

on average earn about \$1 per pound for organic cotton, compared with about 50 cents for a pound of conventional cotton. However, the total impact to the state was an additional \$5.6

"This study shows that organic cotton production is a viable alternative for farmers to explore, especially in the

million in economic activity.

High Plains, where Mother Nature has given our farmers a comparative advantage with a climate that discourages large insect populations and where freezes naturally defoliate cotton before harvest," Perry said.

The shift to organic cotton production increases economic activity by moving production inputs from chemically intensive items that are generally imported into the state to local inputs and labor-intensive methods.

Economic activity also is increased because organic cotton brings a higher export price.

The study found that on average, an organic cotton farm requires an additional \$2.51 in inputs per acre of cultivated land, and one job is created for every 1,000 acres converted.

Even though the average organic cotton yield is 13 percent lower than conventional cotton, added revenue per acre for organic cotton is about \$190. This added revenue impacts the Texas economy by generating demand, income and jobs

in other sectors of the economy. The study noted that the Texas High Plains is an ideal

location for organic cotton production because the cattle feedlot industry provides a local source of animal manure for fertilizer; freezing temperatures kill and defoliate cotton plants in time for harvest; and the area's relatively dry and cold climate creates few weed and insect problems.

Texas is the nation's largest producer of organic cotton with an estimated 18,000 acres of organic and transitional cotton expected to be planted this year.

Transitional cotton is a crop

that is undergoing TDA's organic certification process, which requires cotton to be free of synthetic pesticides and fertilizers for three years. About 45 farmers are involved in organic cotton production in the

The study, funded by an \$18,000 grant from TDA, was conducted by Dr. Mina Mohammadioun, senior economist and manager, with the University of Texas' Natural Fibers Research and Information Center.



In 1942, he was called into the Air Force. During the war, he was stationed at Shephand Air Force Base in Wichita Falls, where he taught math to cadets.


At the end of the war, he returned to Amherst and served



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

Taming the Tongue Is a Most Difficult Task

was playing a game of speaking evil of our neighbor Trivial Pursuit--not taking a class in physiology--when I learned that one of the most powerful muscles in the human body is the tongue.

James, the New Testament writer, would not be too surprised by that. He has a lot to

say in his book about this small but powerful organ.

Anyone who can tame the tongue, James says, is "a perfect man, able to keep his whole body in check."

This little organ, James writes, is like the bit which makes an animal obey its rider. It is like the rudder which steers an entire ship. And it can be like the spark which sets a whole forest blazing, setting "the whole course" of an individual's life on fire, itself "set on fire by hell.'

Is James overstating his case? From hard experience,

most of us know that he is not. William Barclay is probably right when he says that most of

us would be unlikely to count

as one of the deadliest of sins. But he comments, "Scripture would say that it is one of the worst of sins" because when we wag our tongues wantonly, we break the law of God which tells us to "love our neighbors as ourselves."

That kind of love almost certainly does not include roasting them with fire from our tongues!

When we chew one another up verbally, we not only break God's law, we usurp His position as the one Lawgiver and Judge.

'Who are you," James asks, "to judge your neighbor?"

None of us is immune to the poison of the human tongue. None of us is so good that he is never tempted to use this feisty organ to envenomate his foes. It was, after all, to very ordinary Christian people that James wrote, "Brethren, do not slander one another." Simple advice. Easy to hear. Hard to

Morris Mandel writes, "Gossip is the most deadly microbe. It has neither legs nor wings. It is composed entirely of tales, and most of them have stings."

James would agree.


