
OVER HALF INCH



Boy Accidently Shot.

Our entire community was greatly shocked on last Saturday afternoon when news reached our town, stating that Elmer, 19 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. P. Warshaw of the Barron Ranch community had been accidentaly shot.

Elmer, with several playmates had gone out into the pasture on a rabbit hunt when the untimely accident happened. Previously to the hunt they had rigged up a home-made vehicle and hitched a burro to it and Elmer and two companions occupied the cart and had taken the guns and drove down Cottonwood Creek to make a stand while the other boys followed on foot to drive the rabbits to them.

Elmer and the two boys had just reached the designated spot for the stand when the accident happened. He had placed the breech of the gun on the footboard of the cart while the barrel of the gun rested on his shoulder. When the cart was stopped the breech of the gun slipped off of the board and in some manner the hammer struck the board and discharged the gun. The entire load of shot entered Elmer's right arm and passed inward and upward into the shoulder, finding lodgment against the shoulder blade.

The gun was a 12-gage 2. loaded with No. 4 shot, and the inflicted wound was a ghastly sight.

Elmer fainted from the shock of the injury and his companions carried water from a nearby creek and revived him, after which they placed him in the cart and started for his home. One of the boys held him in the vehicle while the other lead the burro. They were a mile and a half from home at the time and it required some time for them to reach home. Elmer suffered a great loss of blood during this time as all the arteries of the arm had been severed by the shot and it was some time after they had carried him home before medical aid was obtained. Mr. and Mrs. Warshaw were in Roby at the time of the accident, and a physician who happened to pass the home was called in and he administered some relief to the boy's intense suffering. Other physicians were quickly summoned and all available relief was administered to him, but his life was taken Sunday afternoon at 12:20 o'clock.-Roby Banner.


