However, the word has sifted through that Texans may have a great race shaping up less than a year from now for the governorship of the state.

Likely, or possible, candidates, we understand, include our old buddy, Ralph Yarborough; the incumbent, Preston Smith, who is from Lubbock and also knows where Bovina is; and the present lieutenant governor, Ben Barnes, who spends about as much time, it seems, keeping his nose clean to the public as he does polit-

Those are fine candidates, we're guessing, and Texas Demos could do worse than

elect any one of the three. A confessed candidate in the race is Dolph Briscoe, a state agricultural leader and a Southwest Texas cattleman, largesize. He isn't as well known from a political standpoint as the other three already mentioned, but he has the advantage of a great first name and has made a previous race.

No doubt there will be still others and at this early date. next year's race for the Democratic nomination for governor looks about as interesting as one possibly could.

As a rule, there's nothing flattering about having your name mixed up, but an exception to that happened here a few weeks ago. The Blade received a long distance, personto-person phone call for "Dolph Briscoe."

When the information was relayed that he wasn't here and wasn't expected, the caller remembered that maybe that was the wrong last name. "Ialways get them mixed up," was the flattering explanation.

By making mention of those potential candidates, we don't mean to imply that other candidates won't add to the interest in the race.

Barnes' name has a political ring to it that causes a lot of votes to be cast in his favor. At least, that's been the case in previous races he's been in. At the same time, it should be pointed out that he's never run for anything higher than substitute governor and the going might be tougher and the competition stronger when and if he runs for governor or senator.

Except for his ability to get votes, he hasn't done anything to impress us up to this point. He's been referred to as the young, fair-haired comer of the state political machine. And he might amount to something yet if he manages to keep his troubles, if any, covered up and he doesn't get into a race that's too much over his head.

Here's hoping that next year's gubernatorial race will

be just that. It's too early to take sides, but we feel that we're fortunate as a state to have a man with the stature and qualifications of Ralph Yarborough showing an interest in the race,

Correct Water's Problem

Bovina's water problem of weekend before last is being taken care of, according to city

The problem, which consisted of a dark, oil-like color in the water system, will be eliminated by cleaning and lowering the city well which was pumping the dis-colored water, says Mayor Chas. W. Flynn.

The discoloration came from a fungus, bacteria-type growth in the well and was said to be harmless by personnel at a laboratory in Lubbock who checked samples.

Darrel Read, water superintendent, took samples to the Lubbock laboratory last week.

The well, which has been set at 220 feet, is being lowered this week. That plus cleaning, is expected to eliminate the problem of the strangecolored water in Bovina.

The well, one of three used by the city, has not been pumped since it was found to be producing the unappealing

The marker, which was erected in January, is placed at Highway 60, 5.5 miles northeast of Bovina adjacent to the old Townsite of Parmerton. The high point from a standpoint of elevation in the entire county, and on Santa Fe's lines in West Texas, the site is commonly referred to by area residents now as "Parmerton Hill."

Made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effects, the marker measures 18 by 28 inches and is sponsored by the Parmer County Historical Survey Committee. The inscription on the marker reads:

"Site of Parmerton "(Elevation 4,202 Feet)

"Founded as Parmer Switch on Pecos & Northern Texas Railroad in 1898. In 1906 became site of a model farm, using Campbell Dry Farming method, run by Capitol Freehold



On The Farm In Parmer County

Commission recently announced a quarantine order that reimposes restrictions on swine movements in Texas placed in effect March 29, to control hog

The new order became effective May 28, and it will remain in effect until further notice. All previous restrictions on swine movements contained in the previous order will remain the same, with the exception of

one additional restriction. The new restriction order will require holding all purchased swine for 30 days at the premise of the purchaser, and no movement will be allowed except for slaughter during the quarantine.

If swine are apparently healty, this premise quarantine will automatically expire after the 30th day without any in-

It is strongly felt that extending the quarantine control will bring Texas closer to the complete eradication of the hog cholera virus by the December 1972 target date. Although 22 cases of hog cholera have been confirmed since March 29, none of these cases have been connected with swine movements after that date.

Five counties -- Denton, Freestone, Wise, Parker, and Palo Pinto -- have been completely released from federal

quarantine. Originally, all or portions of 33 Texas counties were under federal quarantine. All swine can be moved, provided that proper inspections

and permits are acquired. Swine moving to slaughter can be transported to packing houses or public markets without inspection or written permits. Once at the market, they can't be legally sold as feeders.

Swine can be moved for exhibition purposes on permit from the Executive Director of the Texas Animal Health Commission. Hogs going to the farm, earmarked or tagged, and accompanied by the per-

Special breeder or feeder sales must be cleared with authorities in the animal health commission. Written permission can be granted with certain requirements, including on the farm inspection.

Swine may be moved one time with no diversion enroute from one farm to another if they are inspected on the farm and moved under permit.

applied with the plant's seasonal water use pattern in mind." "Irrigations during "Irrigations during high water use stages of growth contribute heavily to high corn yields while only slight increase in yields is obtained during growth stages require-

ing less water." Generally, irrigation should begin at the six-to-eight leaf growth stage. The water requirement is normally about one-inch every ten days by this stage and increases rapidly as growth continues. Irrigation prior to six-leaves often produce rapid vegetative growth that results in a large, more lush plant early in the season. Such plants may require more water later in the season for grain production. Larger plants can increase the demands for irrigation water that is already limited on many

"Corn has a high water requirement from just prior to tasseling through the dough stage of grain development."
"Adequate moisture is espec-ially vital to the corn plant during this period. Water can be four-to-five inches during tasseling and selling, especially when temperatures are Irrigations should be

keyed to this growth period." Corn irrigation studies were conducted last year on the Aubrey Heathington farm that supports this information. There was no yield increase from an irrigation applied at the sixleaf stage when the last of five additional alternate furrow irrigations was applied during the early dough stage about August 1. However, the application of six additional irrigations so that the last irrigation occured during the dough stage on August 15 brought a 15 bushel per acre yield increase.
