Every farmer should be on the ook out for grass hoppers now nd should use some kind of poison when they first appesr arge numbers before making war against them
Either of the following remedies re recommended.
50 lbs of wheat bran mixed with 8 lbs Arsenite of Lead or Paris Green made into a mash he consistancy of a soft dough with about a half gallon of molasses to sweeten.
The criddle mixture is mad by securing a half barrel of resh horse droppings in which mixed one pound each of salt and Paris Green stirred well toether. This is claimed to be a ery effective remedy and one hat they take very readily. Place the poison near the grass and where the hoppers are merging from and be carefu not to let the stock get to it or the children handleit as it is dangerous.
Report any-other troubles that you may have to me and if I can't furnish the necessary rem dies I will take it up with one of our Entimologists and sooon get

the high standard we all so much covet, it will be done by railruad men, and their views on our transportation problems are, therefore, instructive. We may, if we choose, differ from them, but it is well for the public to listen to what they say. Peoognizing the importance of their co-operation in our industrial prog-
ress, the chairman of the Teras Welfare Commission invited the leading railroad men of the nation to appest before ft; when asked for his views
on consolidation of lines, Mr Frant Trumbull, executive head of the Katy system, said:
"I think that consolidation of
end-to-end lines or lateral lines, or to be permitted but ought only ought couraged. They go much further in England ; they encourage working greement - between competitive lines and the amalgamation of them, as
they call it. I don't think you need go that far; I don't see any more
ebjection to a railroad acquiring an end-to-end line by consolidation
than it is to a man buving an adjoining farm, and it is in the interest of public service that that should be done. Having to form a different corporation every time you build a few miles of railroad perfects the holding company proposition, not You have three or four staffs of men woun have tought to suffice; you can't ghen oue ought the sunfifice; you can't standard; you cannot get locomotives and cars because when they are under the same ownership there will be petty competition."
Mfr. F. P. Ripley, president of the Santa Fe , also gave his experience with the present law: "We have twenty-six miles of railroad running from the New Merioo state line to El Paso; it is our little duder the laws of the State of Texas offices and a separate organization for the twenty-six miles of railroad at El Paso.
