## SYSTEM OF STREET LIGHTS

This important improvement has suggested itself for consideration by our city and citizens for many moons and upon every mention every business man and citizens says that it suould be done but so far there has been nothing done.

It goes without saying that we should have our streets lighted for a man or town in the dark needs light unless the work is one to be done under cover or darkness. It is equally apparent that the system installed now should be mod ern and up-to-date; it should be done right at the beginning. We should make all of our plans of improvement contemplate the future as well as the present and then we make permanent progress.

A system of lights on modern iron light pests can be installed at a smal initial expense and then maintained for a very nominal sum and the city could spend money to no better advantage than furnishing lights for our people to see their way at night. About fifteen to twenty-five large lights would cover the business section and give us good light.

The proposition involves a get-to-gether between our council and ligh plant. They should always work together and help each other. Our council should encourage our light plant and every other enterprise for the good of our town and our light plant should be worthy and give the very best of service. Our city in the past imposed some extra taxes on our light plant besides the regular city taxes. This should not be for it would seem nearer right and more like a live progressive town to pay a bonus for the establishment of an enterprise so badly needed and certainly when we secure such without cost we should not penalize it but on the other hand patronize and encourage the plant in every way possible. There are some who have had nothing but criticism for this enter prise since it was established but they kick at everything. The record and service of our light plant under circumstances and conditions is good and remark able as every fair-minded citizen will admit and if our city and citizens will show their appreciation by patronage there will be more improvement and better service

The Mail asks for honest consideration of this matter and suggests that a proposition fair to all be outlined, submitted and and approved by our council, to the end that we may let our lights so shine that all will know that we are not dead-but just sleeping for a time on our rights and duties in the premises.

Let us at least be fair and friendly with each other and give every enterprise and every individual a fair and square deal and then we will be getting on the right plane to work together for our mutual good.

agent. And second, it gives us an ide of the kind of farm work done in the Trent country, as seen by said corres po must be a good one and I am go ing to look him up and get a first class demonstration of deep breaking and model handling of next year's crop. He
can't get around us now but should deliver the goods.
At any rate 1 will be in the Merke and Trent territories right soon and
hope to secure the cooperation of at least a few of, your best farmers in demonstrating to the very best advantage the merits of some very deen plowing. I also, want a few to start a systematic crop rotation with the view of improving the land. Old King Cotton is responsible more than any other oae thing for the depleted con dition of our land and we must rotate in order to save it, Very deep break ing, subsoiling and the application of barnyard manure are three propositions that some West Texas farmer are opposed to but they will eventur ly come to it if they ever
We have a subsoil-plow furnished gratis, by the West Texas Hardware Company and I want to see this plow used all this season. Ion't ask any few acres, a strip across his field any were so that the merits of the work will be plain. Suppose we had had our lands torn up good and deep, no matter very much how, whether by subsoiling or any old way, just so the hard-pan that is so prevalent in all our land is broken"up good; well we could have stored up all this good moisure that we have been getting of late and with the addition of a few more rains during the winter that we are most sure to get and the proper conservation of same, we could feel pretty sure of a fair crop next year. This is a dry country and we should get ready for the rains that sometimes do come by deep breaking, subsoiling, terracing and in every way assist nature in forcing moisture down into the land. When the rains have washed over the hard surface of the fieid and carried with it the choicest of its plant food on into the rivers to never return again, then the farmer realizes that If his field had been well plowed and terraced and the water soaked into his
land, how much better off he would be.

## bill boards and big circulars.

The fact that undesirable permits and conditions have existed in the past is no argument or justification for them now or in the future
The unsighty bill boards in the most popular places of our town is a factor against civic improvement if not a real nuisance, with torn paper to blow loose, litter the streets, scare teams, to say nothing of the usual and general appearance of the board itself and the obstruction of the view to other properties. Who desires a bill board ten to twenty feet long and about ten feet high to be erected in front of their property?
This is but one of the many customs our city council should correct and to guard against any charge of personal selfishness or interest the Mail would urge again an ordinance to regulate likewise or prohibit the distribution of large circulars on our streets-nothing larger than a 6x9. This latter would permit the distribution of funeral notices and small announcement dodgers which would not be a nuisance. The people read the address of those who do not take our paper so the merchant can mail his circulars to them or put them in their homes not scatter them on the streets and highways to blow and scare teams.

The Mail has personally taiked to our city of ficials and advocated this for several years and while the abolition of the sidewalk and street bill boards will interfere a little bit with the owner of the system it will cause a greater loss for our business but our losses will be the gain of our neighbors and country friends and for the improvement of our town.
The use of our sidewalks and streets is denied to merchants and street venders and why should the special privileges be granted for an advertising bureau? It is a poor rule that will not work both ways and we should all be treated alike. The Mail worked hard to protect our merchants from this same unfair competition and we do not ask that they use their influence to give us the same kind of protection except as a matter of right and improvement and to show our good feelings we specially urge that the large circulars be abolished as well which will make us lose more profit than we could gain.
The Texas \& Pacific Railway Company in the improvement of their right-of-way has abolished the bill boards and certainly our main streets are as valuable and our council should keep pace with the railroad company in civic progress. The sidewalk bulletins, street bill boards and distri bution of large circulars should be rigidiy regu lated if not abolished. It would be a safeguard for our people and an improvement for our town and if we make any progress we must surrende selfish profits and interests to the demands of ou community interests.

It becomes necessary for us to reiterate that the policy of this paper is a fair and square deal to all, big and little, rich and poor, fair and unfair, wise and otherwise. If we ever do get wrong we will make atonement upon attention of same being brought to the management.

We publish the cotton receipts as they are given to us and do not guarantee either one of them and it does not make a continental rip to us which is ahead or behind. We try to get the news for our readers in the best shape we can and that's all.
It's a matter of demoeracy with Bill and just a matter of newspaper policy with us. Our policy of a fair and square deal takes a seat above our politics. We are working for this town and country and believe the democratic party can take care of itself.
