 To Be Considered Saturday "Josiah" Nichols, aged 93 years, who resides near Melissa is the only surviving Texas Ranger in Collin county. In addi-tion to being the only surviving Ranger, he is a Mexican War veteran and an ex-Confederate veteran
soldier.
Mr. Nichols was born in St Charles county Mo., Feb. 6, 1822 He came to Texas in June, 1846 He joined the Ranger company soon after arriving in Collin county and was in service until Feb.2, 1847. His company was stationed where the town of Gainesville is now located.
He has served this county in various ways as a public official, having served as Commission er, Justice of the Peace, Sheriff, Tax Assessor and Collector o Collin and Denton counties.
He was married Feb. 23, 1847, to Miss Elizabeth Fitzhugh, daughter of John and Sarah Fitz hugh, who were among the earli est settlers of North Texas.
After his marriage he settled on a farm four miles east of Me lissa, where they resided for sixty four years, Since the death of his wife in 1911 he has been making his home with a daughter Mrs. Sam Davis, who lives near Anna. Much history in connec. tion with the setting of this county could be written about Uncle Josiah Nichols. He helped to convert Collin county from a wilderness to one of the most prosperous agricultural counties in the United States.
He is enjoying reasonably ood health, is cheerful in spirits and enjoys talking of the hap pening of long ago.

The fall term of the Forty-sec. ond District Court convened is the court room in the Federa Building at nine o'clock Monday morning. The grand jury was immediately selected out of the list of sixteen furnished by the jury commission. One or two were excused and the na

Door Baliff-F. S. Roundtree Walking Baliff-Ed. Tarpley. After the selection of the grand jury this morning Jndge Thomas L. Blanton specially charged them on a number of subject and at the end of charging them asked any person in the cour room who knew of any thing tha should go before the grand jur to advise him of it and he woul charge the jury thereon.

Murder was taken up and the judge charged the jury along this line, stating that if any mur der had been committed whic had been covered for any reason or that might have been commit ed which, for the jury to try to it utmost to unearth it. He said that "the value of human life is so great that there is no limitation in time for ite indiotment." Mur der is one of the most seriou orimes, and limitation never end against it. "Murder will out," a trite saying, but worthy of all oaception.

Assault to murder was defined It is any intention to kill a person which is providentially preven ted. Where there is a will oommit such, it comes under th head to murder where the actio toward it is perpetrated. Wher a weapon is used it constitutes a felony.
Burglary was described and defined. Two kinds of burglaries were explained to the grandjury daytime and night time. In the former aotual breaking in with unusual foroe oonstites it.
Theft in all its phases was taken up and explained. Therer constituted a felony under the laws. Under this amount it is a misdemeanor.

Embezzlement was taken
and spoken of. Misapplication of funds by public officers was reviewed and the grand jury was
oharged alcng this line Unlawful disposition of mortgaged proper. ty. At this point the judge stated that none of the grand jurors should permit his sympathy to on or persons found indict peraw must bens found guilty. This pathy intervening because protects those who have to bor row, and helps those who lend wouldd probably not be able to wouldd probably not be able to

Gaming was dwelt upon by the judge. Complaint had been made
to him that gaming was being perpetrated in the county, and that this should be thoroughly investigated and the perpetrators indicted. laws was also spoken of. The judge stated that complaint had been made that intoxicating li and that intimidation in this nection had had been informed at. He oads of intoxicants had been brought to the city from Albany and Moran, and distributed in the city. He was sorry that the law received intoxicants in the dry territory as well as the one who gives it away.
He spoke of the Sunday closing law. He believed that every man n Sunday in violationg opea hould be indited and a the law indictment for eand a separate tense was committed brought in, it was pointed out that when only small fine was made against such offenders, it was more of a liscense than anything else. The indietments should take in each day, and in this way the offendars oould be brought to law.
