33 BILLED BY CO. GRAND JURY

The Taylor county grand jury returned thirty-three indictments at noon Saturday, seventeen being felonies and sixteen misdemeanors. The jury will recess until Monday sometime.

Of the seventeen felony indictments returned, nine of the persons billed are either in jail or out on bond. J. W. Wall was indicted for forgery, an account of which appeared in the Reporter some weeks ago. Two bills were found against him. He lives at Clyde. He had been out on bond and he appeared before Judge Thomas L. Blanton Saturday and made bond and was released.

Jose Paralk, a Mexican, was billed on a charge of burglary, alleged to have been made on the home of one of his race near Trent. This occurred four months ago.

Oran Powers was indicted for the burglary of the Meek Brothers store at Ovalo, an occurrence of several weeks ago.

Frank Holton, Bonnie Cass, John Crawford, B. K. Bruce, Dolph Cass and Jim Wims, all negroes, were each indicted on charges of robbery of Jim Brown several weeks ago. Jim Brown is a negro and a recent arrival in the city.

The misdemeanor charges for the main part, where offenders are under custody of the sheriff's department, were selling liquor or giving it to minors; for disturbing public worship and petty theft. — Sunday's Abilene Reporter.

MERKEL WILL HAVE WAREHOUSE BLDG.

That Merkel will have a cotton warehouse is practically assured. Saturday afternoon Messrs W. A. Scott and J. D. Gaither were prepared to say definitely that they would have warehouse facilities for Merkel cotton within a short time.

The plan proposed by Messrs Scott and Gaither is closely in conformity with plans outlined at a meeting of Merkel and Merkel country citizens at the Fire Station Saturday afternoon. According to the managers of the proposed warehouse, storage and insurance can be obtained for 50 cents per bale and within a short time their facilities will be open to those who wish to take advantage of a better protection for their cotton.

Closes Fine Meeting.

Rev. R. J. Tooley of Weatherford was in Merkel Monday on his way home from Noodle where he has been for the past week holding a meeting.

Rev. Tooley reports about 40 conversions and reclamations with 26 additions to the church during the weeks services.

RECORD'S PLAN SPREADING LIKE WILDFIRE

It was a good thing. It started at Fort Worth, and The Record turned it loose. This buy-a-bale movement is flying on the wings of the wind. If the people will take it up everywhere it will help move the wheels of commerce and save the cotton growers of the South millions of dollars.

Twelve-cent cotton means three hundred million dollars for the Texas cotton crop of 1914.

Six-cent cotton means one hundred and fifty million dollars.

Why shouldn't the patriotic people of this state guard against this tremendous loss? The plan is not impractical. This buy-a-bale movement is not even a risk. The Houston Post jumped in Sunday and "pushed the cause along."

It printed a half page editorial in big black type. The call was signed by twenty leading citizens of Houston, who led off by buying a bale each for 10 cents a pound, with a pledge to hold it for a year.

Leading lawyers, leading business men and leading financiers signed the call.

"Right this minute," says the Post, "there are \$40,000,000 gathering mold in Houston banks, and almost every dollar of this \$40,000,000 made from cotton, either from direct participation in the barter and sale in that king of Texas commodities or through trade channels closely allied. Think of it! Cotton brought \$300,000,000 into gold into Texas last year. Almost as much as the year before."

Then the Post gives advice its readers straight from the shoulder, following the lead of The Fort Worth Record. "Buy a bale," it says, "and be a business man as well as a patriot. There will be money in it for you if you do. You cannot lose even should you lose \$50 for the stimulation to trade and the restoration to confidence that will follow will be of more direct benefit to any business man or any one of his employes than the sum required for buying a bale."

This is the gospel truth. It is both sensible and practical. It is one safe bet to buy cotton and hold it. The Post says, "With the Texas crop paid for and stored away the worries of this state will be over."

This is true.

A third of the crop should be bought and held for a year. Again the Post reminds its readers that "right now our Kansas neighbors are selling their wheat at \$1.35. Kansas is getting hers right now."

Read this golden nugget from this address, signed by South Texas builders and patriots:

Man must be clothed as well as fed. Ultimately the world must have our cotton. That is where Texas will come in.

The man whose motives are mercenary should stand aside. If he can't help he should not croak. If he isn't willing to assist his fellows he should hide out and hold his tongue.

There are 15,000 commercial travelers in Texas. They are the angles of commerce, the messengers of glad tidings, the avant couriers of the army of optimism. They are on the firing line.

The above article in Friday's Fort Worth Record has in reality spread like wild fire throughout the country and is absolutely a sensible plan. To the man who can BUY-A-BALE and hold the same off the market for a year, that man is taking an interest in the protection of the thing in Texas that means life and sustenance to our people, THE FARMERS for truly they are the people of our state.

Merkel has inaugurated her buy-a-bale plan, the same having taken effect here Tuesday and has met with considerable success. During the first day there were 16 signatures added to the list of names of Merkel people who proposed to buy one bale of cotton for 10 cents per pound and hold it off the market until cotton attained that price.

WAREHOUSE BILL PASSED BY SENATE

Austin, Texas, Sept. 7.—With but three votes interposing, the Senate gave final passage to the emergency warehouse bill today after a strenuous all-day session.

The one salient feature of the bill—State guarantee and liability—was not changed, though the provision giving such guaranty was vigorously attacked and unsuccessful attempts made to amend it. And, too, the state will have the leasing of the warehouses and they will be under the supervision and control of the State Commissioner of Insurance and Banking. He will not appoint the local warehouse managers, nor fix the salary of such managers, but his authority is extensive. No local manager may be appointed without the approval of the Commissioner. The bill was

changed in that respect today.

The Senate adopted an amendment signed by Messrs. Warren, Gibson, Harley and Willacy, placing the appointment of warehouse managers in local hands. The amendment as adopted reads:

"Such warehouse manager shall be selected as follows: if in an incorporated city or town, then the City Council or City Commission, as the case may be, shall, by a majority vote and at a regular or special meeting, nominate such manager and shall, within ten days after such nomination, certify his name to the Commissioner of Insurance and Banking for approval, and such person, if approved by the Commissioner, shall act as manager for such warehouse."


