MERKEL POULTRY AND PET STOCK SHOW OPENS DECEMBER 3, 3 DAYS

Sixth Annual Exhibition and Contest to be Largest in History of Association. Bring in Your Chickens Ducks, Geese, Turkeys, Rabbits and various Pets.

The Merkel Poultry and Pet Stock show will open to the world December 3rd, and continue until the 6th, giving one of the best shows ever held in West Texas and promising to be the warmest for competition yet held in our city.

Entries will be here from various parts of the state and the home blue winning delegation will be on hand with approximately 250 to 300 chickens.

Mr. Thornton explained that he was forced to pay the fire boys nothing whatever but through gratitude would donate something as a token of his appreciation. Said stranger was not yet satisfied, he had seen fireboys ruin good clothing, take forced shower baths and he wanted to know what they got out of all their work. Mr. Thornton then explained to the man that they probably got nothing except the fun attached to such wetting an exposures. The inquisitor seemed satisfied with the results of the conversation but surprised that a body of men and boys would take such an interest in their neighbors property without having a cash consideration in view. Probably the fireboys have a big place in the mans heart now as result of the information.

LITTLE JOHN DICK JACKSON IS DEAD

The hundreds of friends of Mr. and Mrs. John G. Jackson formerly of this place but now of Abilene were shocked Tuesday morning to learn of the death of their four year old baby boy, John Dick one of the most popular little fellows in town. His death takes from a happy home one of the most lovable children we have ever known and it will be a serious shock to the parents. A shock that has marred their plans for a bright future for this little one. It was the pleasure of the writer to have this bright baby boy often in our office and always a spirit of childish affection filled our heart as we would watch him play with the keys of our typewriter in his endeavor to "write a letter" as he would say. There will be no more joyous tapping by him on the keys of our typewriter or the one of his fathers. His absence will forever be noticed by those who knew him.

The following taken from Tuesdays Abilene Reporter gives a full account of the death:

At 2:00 o'clock Tuesday morning death invaded the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Jackson, 17th and Grape street, and took their sweet baby boy, John Dick Jackson, aged four. The little fellow had been sick for 10 days but not considered dangerous until 48 hours previous to his death which was caused from nasal diphtheria. All that loving hands and hearts could do was done but to no avail. In life the little fellow was a most precious child and his fond parents are heart broken over his death.

The private funeral occurred at 4:00 p. m. from the family residence and was conducted by Rev. C. N. N. Ferguson, Presiding Elder of this district at the grave.

Mr. and Mrs. Jackson moved to Abilene from Merkel only a month ago but they are known by hundreds of Abilene people who extend to them their tenderest sympathies in this sad hour of bereavement. May God, the source of all strength, comfort the hearts of those who mourn, and may the Devine Master, who said: "suffer little children to come unto me and forbid them not, for such is the kingdom of heaven," give father, mother, sister and other relatives grace to say: "Gods will be done."

Receipts Continue to Grow Larger Each Week. Heavy Dews Effect Daily Average of Local Gins. Pickers are Still in Demand. Thursday Prices, 7.30 For Top Grades.

QUICK WORK SAVES THORNTON HOME

Prompt and efficient work by the Merkel Fire department saved the A. H. Thornton home from flames, Friday of last week

The fire which started in the kitchen ceiling and roof about a flue was under good headway when the alarm was turned in. Firemen responded very quickly and with the aid of extremely high pressure force soon had the flames entirely extinguished with a damage to the home of probably less than \$50.

One peculiarity was brought about when the alarm was turned in and the fire horses were not at the station ready to respond. Shortly before, Fire Chief Ferrier had taken the team to a blacksmith shop to have them shod and the work had not been finished when the fire was reported under headway. The general alarm was held until the team was transferred to the fire station ready for work

This action delayed the department in getting to the burning house very quickly but nevertheless the boys kept their past good record up, saving a valuable home from destruction.

HALLOWEEN JOKES ONE A FIRE ALARM

Spooks of all kinds were roaming Saturday night doing mysterious things and creating excitement for the entire town for awhile.

Yard gates were taken, signs moved, autos, buggies and various things were taken from their usual sheltering places and conspicuously displayed in many ways. Some practical joker set fire to a refuse stack of straw south of the stock pens causing the fire department to be called out.

Cotton Fire at Abilene

An early morning fire Sunday caused a property loss of probably \$120 to \$150, when five bales of cotton caught on fire, four of which were damaged beyond redemption. The origin of the fire is unknown, but it is the belief of Mr. Ellison, in whose yard the fire occurred that the fire was already in the cotton when it was brought to the yard by a farmer. Another slight fire occurred Sunday evening but was quickly extinguished. The fire company responded to the morning call and assisted in saving much cotton.—Abilene Reporter.

SATURDAY BEST GIN DAY OF YEAR

Last Saturday was the banner gin day for Merkel for the present season to date. The four gins were crowded to their capacity throughout the day and many farmers were unable to get their cotton ginned until after 10 o'clock at night.

The total for the day according to the gin record was 244 bales: The number does not represent the amount brought here for marketing. A report from the cotton yards shows also the largest weighers day of the season, with a total of 404 bales for the time.

83 DEMOCRATS, ONE REPUBLICAN AND ONE PROGRESSIVE VOTED HERE

Six Others Scratched up Their Ticket Until it Couldn't be Said Just how They Did Vote 91 in all Registered Their Ballot During the Day. No Disturbances.

CITY COUNCIL MET MONDAY P.M.

In regular session of the city council Monday evening the amount of \$156.00 in accounts were allowed exclusive of the officers salaries and collections made to the amount of \$130.22 excluding interest on city funds and some fines lately collected.

The proposition on natural or manufactured gas for Merkel was discussed freely and the Secretary instructed to renew correspondence with both the Oklahoma and Abilene companies in regard to the matter. The council also voted to build a drain rack for fire hose at the fire station and to have a lot built at the rear of the station for the team to be exercised in.

The amount of \$41.00 in fines have been collected since the last report exclusive of the court cost. Lloyd Clinton fined \$1.00 and costs on a plea of guilty to a charge of drunkenness. John McLean, John Throop, H. H. Tittle and Jack Barnes were each assessed \$10.00 and costs in a plea of guilty to a charge of gaming.

Here From Arkansas

L. E. Propst of Jonesboro, Craighead county, Arkansas came in last Thursday morning to spend a few days with his cousin H. L. Propst of this place.

The visiting Mr. Propst is in this section of the state prospecting; having sold his farm and other property holdings of Jonesboro at a handsome price. So far he has not become accustomed to milo maize and kaffir corn and he continually been calling for just plain old corn as a necessity for raising good hogs. Other than this one drawback to Merkel, as Mr. Propst sees it, he is highly pleased with our country and is still looking for a location.

According to the Jonesboro weekly newspaper in a comment of Mr. Propst coming west they state he is one of the most progressive farmers of the entire county; one who believes in raising little cotton, much livestock, vegetables, fruits, melons, peanuts and such things as bring money into the farmer's pockets the year round.

Merkel voters usually 426 strong when an issue is up were represented in the General election Tuesday by 91 voters. Of this number 83 were Democrats and voted a straight ticket, one was a staunch Republican and one a progressive. Six others failed to vote so the presiding judge could tell what they were. In Taylor county the much hooted cotton acreage amendment was defeated by about 100 votes. All other amendments took a sail up the same creek and the Legislators will continue to draw their \$800. per per-diem for special sessions.

Throughout the entire country the Republicans made sweeping gains. Uncle Joe Cannon one of the greatest Republicans of the present day will be in Congress again. New York State probably saw a greater Republican gain than any other state.

PICKS COTTON TO PAY MONEY RENT

One of the strongest lessons possible of the usefulness of the Merkel country has been brought to our attention.

At the same time the fallacy of people are living in less productive parts of the state. At present there is one man working in the Merkel country, making good wages as a cotton picker who is devoting his earnings to pay the balance of money due from renting land in McLennan county of which Waco is the capital city. The name of the party in question has been withheld but the information has been given us by reliable parties of the Noodle community. The man rented McLennan county land for a money consideration. His earnings from the place were not sufficient to liquidate the indebtedness so he started west in search of work. Before reaching Merkel he was again unfortunate and lost his railroad ticket and as a result he was compelled to stop and pick cotton to obtain money to reach his destination. He has finally reached here and is now accumulating funds with which he will pay for the useless use of McLennan county land.




