





An Ordinance.

An ordinance making the City Secretary of the City of Merkel ex-offico Assessor and Collector of taxes and relieving the City Marshal of such duties on and after the 6th day of May, 1915.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Merkel: Sec. 1. That on and after the 6th day of May, 1915, the City Secretary of the City of Merkel, in additional to the other duties now required of him under the ordinances of said City, shall be exoffico Assessor and Collector of taxes for said City and shall do and perform all duties in reference to the assessing and collecting of taxes for said city as is now required by ordinance of the City Marshal of said City; and for such additional services as such assessor and collector of taxes the City Secretary shall receive such compensation as the City Council may allow, in additien to the compensation now allowed such officer; that from and after the 6th day of May, 1915, the City Marshal of the City of Merkel shall cease to be ex-officio assessor and collector of taxes for said City, and shall not therefore be required to perform any of the daties relating to the assessing and collecting of taxes for said city, except as hereafter may be required of him by order of the City Council.

Sec. 2: That all ordinances, orders and resolutions now in force in conflict herewith be and the same is hereby reapealed from and after the taking effect for stomach trouble," writes Mrs. G. of this ordinance.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11 .- The Unit- To My Friends and Patrons: ed States Government, it became known today, is not entirely satisfied with Great Britain's preliminary reply to the American note on the interference with commerce, which the United States alleges has been going on under the instigation of the Eng-

lish Government. While gratified that England admits the justice of practically all the principles cited by the American note, the United States Government holds that long diplomatic correspondence will not save American trade from ruin, nor that will it necessarily change the practices of the British, which do not agree at all with the theories the British Government admits are right.

The United States expects to take vigorous action on each individual complaint hereafter, and it is stated that the United States intends to see that all complaints are traced down and should they continue, demand that interference be stopped without delay. The Government purposes that American commerce to the warring nations shall not be interferred with, and that it shall continue unchecked.






