Mr. and Mrs. W. M. O'Briant DIVIDING THE NEW STATE? THEY WILL OR WON'T-WHICH

In a talk with Mr. O'Briant Prestige of Historical Name Should Not Be Forgotton by West Texas People

The stir created in Austin about forming a new state named Jefferson of the western portion of Texas seems to have taken on alarming possibillties which may or may not be logical as to the different view points from which the division is considered.

One regretable phase of the proposition submitted by Senator Johnson was the proposal to name the new state Jefferson. The name Jefferson is a cherished one in the hearts of all good democrats but this is the wrong time to use it. The Jeffersonian policy, as the Mail sees, would demand that in creating a new state in the western part of Texas that the new state be called WEST TEXAS. There is a certain distinction attached to the name and a certain amount of prestige which forbids that the delineation we have so long been accustomed to, be discarded. The Virginias are well classified as to location and condition, when a person speaks of Virginia and West Virginia. The Dakotas and Carolinas are examples of the similarity of names to states, then why not Texas and West Texas?

About ninety-nine per cent of the people west of the east line of Clay, Palo Pinto, Jack, Erath, Comanche, Mills, San Saba and north of the south line of Llano, Kimble, Edwards, Kinney and Maverick counties no doubt when selecting a name for a new state bordered as above would advocate WEST TEXAS as their first love.

The joint resolution offered by Senator Johnson of Hall county, hailing from the Plainview country provides that an election on the constitutional amendment shall be held on the first Tuesday in July and that in event the amendment is adopted and election shall convene in the new state on the first Tuesday in August to elect state officials; that the first session of the legislature shall convene in the city of Abilene on the second Tuesday in September (Shadows of Hon, J. M. Wagstaff's foresightedness).

The western part of our state or West Texas has throughout the history of our statehood been the medium through which Texas has been advertised. This part of the state is exemplified of real Texas more than the eastern part and the name is worth consideration. THE JEFFERSON BUT IF YOU WILL HAVE A NEW STATE MAKE IT WEST TEXAS.

If the new state is organized the people from El Paso to Wineral Wells and from Texline to Eagle Pass will see one of the warmest fights for the state capitol ever inaugurated in any country. The two contestants would no doubt be Abilene and Sweetwater. Amarillo probably would ask for a look in on the Governor's mansion, San Angelo would get the fever, a few other towns would roar out their possibilities but it would all simmer down to a battle royal between the first two mentioned, and in all probability it would be some battle with the best town the winner.



This noted scientist of the University of Texas asserts that the new material has displaced the silk worm silk. This is not all he asserted. A recent invention makes cotton goods fire-proof. He has subjected samples of this material to a a fire-proof material. In other words the cotton they have done for 125 years? or a flannelette is made fire-proof by the invention of a substitute known as cellit.

Dr. Schoch says this material is in every respect similar to celluloid but is absolutely noninflammable.

There was a time not remote when cotton was not supposed to have any by-products.

How is it today? Paper goods is made from the short lint taken from the seed. This paper may be washed and used repeatedly. It is as tough as fibre and water will not dissolve or destroy it.

Did you know that motion picture films are made from cellit, this new cotton compound? Did you know that cellit also forms the base material for the production of artificial leather?

Well this Texas chemist says so and he is one destiny. of the foremost in his profession.

Crisco is a compound from the hard substance from which cotton seed oil is extracted. It is relief. said to be a prime article of food.

ton seed oil. It is a material similar to rubber problem which concerned the people alone. and is obtained by a simple mechanical separation of this material from the rest of the cotton seed oil.

Prof. Schoch predicts that within a very short while cotton seed meal will take its place as one of the cheapest and best food materials on the market.

He advises against its use until further tests have been made, but is confident that when a meal has been produced free from fibre and hulls and excessive oils, the value of the meal will then be easily double that what it is now and the possibility of it being much more valuable still is also admitted.

r Texas is the leading cotton producing state. Under southern skies farmers have a practical monopoly of this fleecy staple of commerce. This scholarly chemist in a recent lecture prefaced his remarks by calling attention to the magnitude of the cotton industry in the Lone Star State. He said:

"Texas is a huge factory; it has a fuel supply equal to 250 times the output of all coal mines in the world and an annual output of products that may be conservatively estimated at \$300,000,000. I refer to the cotton industry, which is impelled primarily by the heat of the sun's rays, and which yielded during 1914 more than 4,000,000 bales of fibre and 2,000,000 tons of seed. The latter yielded 480,000 bales of lint, 750,000 tons of hulls, 80,000,000 tons of meal."


