The Merkel country needs a system of good roads builded in a business manner, along business lines and not after the method employed in the construction of the present highways that lead into the city of Abilene.

Abilene has greatly profited by the work done in Precinct No. 1 but the citizenship of that precinct was seemingly humbugged to an extent in getting their money's worth out of their road building bonds. With the town of Sweetwater the method employed was a more fortunate one for that country and the town and country have reaped a rich harvest from the excellent roads that lead into their city.
