The Abilene representative returned home Monday night and further negotiations are now in progress between the Abilene company and Mr. Britain as to the closing of their deal. Busines Conditions More Promising Than Ever Berore at This Season of the Year. Deposits Have Shown a Daily In crease With Our People.

Financially and every other way the Merkel country has improved during the past sixty days. On March 4 a statement of condition of the Mer first of May Merkel country money on deposit incrised to $\$ 374,408.42$. On March 4 the cash on hand in the Merkel banks amounted to $\$ 212,928.19$. To this amount there has been an increase to $\$ 221,484.46$, while the demand for money is somewhat slow at both the Merkel banking institutions and their total loans have only increased $\$ 1,383.47$ since they filed their sworn statements on March 1. This showing is indeed a good one and, according to Cashier T. A. Johnson
of the Farmers and Merchants Banks, it is the first time in sixteen years thas he has experienced such conditions in the banking business. To the man who has good security the Merkel banks evidently would be glad to go the limit in extending him credit.
