It was through the efforts of the writer that the Good Roads Bonds Election was ordered by the Commissioner's Court but it was not through any of the writers efforts that the issue was defeated.

Throughout the time the bond issue was pending, the attitude of the Mail was friendly in every respect to every voter regardless of his feeling toward the issue.
