

Oftentimes when local showers are coming over parts of the country, one or two miles of road in one community will become wet and heavy while the same road at another point will be perfeetly dry and firm. In order to even the conditions up it would be necessary to drag any short stretch of road following a shower, and if this is not done and two or three light showers fall on any section the road becomes extremely rough, a condition unnecessary.


