

A probation bill is up before congress for the building of federal buildings in Texas, to cost as follows: Coleman, \$30,000; Huntsville, \$30,000; Sweetwater, \$35,000; Plainview, \$45,000. 

MERKEL GARDEN TRUCK FARMER MAKES Good Profit on Backyard Investment

This is no fairy story, is based upon actual measurements of a garden raised by Thos. Smith who lives in the south part of town.

Hearing of the record Mr. Smith had made in the sale of garden truck during this year, we called at his home and obtained permission to measure the ground in his garden. The part from which he actually sold vegetables of various kinds was the nine six-tenth part of an acre and from this ground the accounted-for sales as kept by Mr. Smith amounted to \$263.10. This included sales of twenty-five cents and above. No record of sales were made where people came to their home and purchased small amounts of vegetables under twentyfive cents worth. most of these being of dime denomination. Averaging this productive value, an acre of such land would have netted gross \$2,513.60.

In order to get at a more correct average we measured the garden plot over all its extremities, which included spots from which nothing was raised or from which no sales-were made. This measurement totaled exactly one-quarter of an an acre, for it accounts for all pass ways, waste land, but with this average we found that the productive gross value per acre to amount to \$1,052.40.

These figures are correct. Mr. Smith kept a careful account of the sales which amounted to \$263.10 and we saw to it that that the land was measured as above. If in comparison, any section of Texas or even the Imperial Valley of California can exceed this, or our estimable friend "Junius" can describe we would in rapture sit while the account of such was being given.

"The Cotton Town of the West" is not only one of the most successful cotton producing sections of western Texas but we believe it has no superior in general productiveness. Some people, who through their own miscalculation, have "gone hunched" may look upon this statement with disgust, but a dollar against a dime if they had their chance back, they would stay here doom's day.
