





member to follow directions. Dripping is essential for smooth drying of cotton and rayons with a minimum-care finish, according to extension clothing specialists. Lift the clothes from the rinse water after laundering. Hang smoothly on a hanger. Don't wring, twist or squeeze to remove

As the water drips off, it smooths out creases or wrinkles left from laundering. A final touch-up with the iron may be needed to make hems, seams and edges as smooth

Some of the synthetic fibers, as dacron, also have this drip-dry quality. Clothes made of these synthetics will be wrinkle-free when dry only if lifted from the rinse water and hung to dry with the least possible handling. The more they drip, the smoother they dry.



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
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
