

WORK OF A BRAVE PEOPLE

Trent Occupies New School Building-Work of School Making Rapid Progress

We took advantage of an opportunity to visit Trent and go through her magnificent school building last Tuesday. The school had been using the building only a week. It is the crowning crown of splendid endeavor by as patriotic, lofty-minded citizenship as ever blessed a community of this great commonwealth. In the face of adversity when fire had destroyed a good building, when the doors of heaven were shut up and drouth prevaded the land, this citizenship rose up in mighty purpose and voted bonds that has placed a building on their campus that would do credit to a city many times the size of Trent. he building stands out in splendid relief as an index to a population whose purpose reach es out to their posterity in beneficent helpfulness.

We called upon Superintendent Roy C. Scuddy and found him to be aggressive, purposeful, planning a school system that contempates affiliation with the State University next year. Mr. Scuddy is from Simmons College, a young man subject to draft, but the patrons of the school are very nopeful that he will not be called until the close of the term. Speaking of his faculty, he said he felt proud of every teacher, believing they could hardly be beat, and that he felt that every one was putting forth every energy to the end of efficiency in the school system. He said he felt that the student body was the best he had ever seen, full of "pep," and possessing a marvelous amount of school spiirit.

F. H. Toombs is principal of the school, a very affable and able educator. He is over the science and mathematical departments. Mr. Scuddy is over the English and history departments.

6,500,000,000 LBS. OF MEAT FOOD

What City and Country Can Pro duce in the Form of Poul-

try and eggs.

If poultry production is doubled next year, as is rapidly possible with this city and county co-operation, we will have 6,500, 000,000 pounds of meat food, in the form of poultry and eggs. This will release almost that many pounds of other meats,pork and beef, for our Armies in Europe, and for the Arimes and civilian populations of the

If we do not produce this amount of poultry we may find ourselves short of meat food to just that extent.

It is a patriotic duty of the utmost importance that every farmer and every person in town do his part in producing this increase of polutry, which will help to win the war. It is also a profitation proposition for the average individual. Both town and farm families will produce, at its lowest cost, meat food for their own use, and by putting up eggs for winter use will further reduce living ex-

The polutry will be handled as a by-product of the farm and back yard; each flock large enough in numebrs to utilize the scraps and waste from the kitchand the "pick-ups" around the place, supplemented by some feed. But no flock should be out of proportion to the ground space and kitchen wastage-not so large that feed will become, relatively, too costly an item. The idea is not only to increase our polutry production, but to do it economically; to do it as very little cost, by turning the waste of kitchens and backyards all over the United States into chick ens and eggs. Fowls are the only medium through which a good deal of this waste can be transformed into a valuabe food product.

motorman; Its fits me like an el's skin. After I had given my self the once over, when I was all togged out, dressed to kill (the Germans). In a couple of days, they staked us to a lot of other furnishing's like shoes, weaters, socks, and peacoat, and so fourth, and by the end of the week we had more stuff than the average young married couple starts out life with. Uncle Sam is sure good to his neephews, take it from me; I don't see how they can afford to give us all this stuff, and some of these guys are living better right now than they ever did in their lives.

We had to stay in detention camp nineteen days. Did not do much drilling as we had to be vaccinated. Not only were we vaccinated but received three shots in our left arm. The shots are not very severe although some of the boys keeled over as if they were dead. My vaccination is almost well now.

I believe this will give you a pretty good idea of what we have to go through with in getting our clothes, and the life in detention camp.

QUARTER BUYS FIVE BULLETS

DNE THRIFT STAMP FILLS RIFLE'S MAGAZINE-BABY BOND GETS U. S. SOLDIER PAIR OF

If you have an idea that your quarters won't help win the war and do lots of service when invested in thrift stamps and war savings stamps, just look over this table. The little bonds are translated in terms of soldier equipment. Here's how they stack up:

1 Thrift Stamp-5 Builets. 1 War Savings Stamp-1 Pair of

1 War Savings Stamp-2 Woolen

1 War Savings Stamp-4 Winter Undershirts.

1 War Savings Stamp-1 Steel Helmet and \$1.12 over.

1 War Savings Stamp-1 Shelter Tent and part payment on Over-

Those quarters will do the Government lots of good. And remember you are not giving them away, but lending them at four per cent interest compounded quarterly.

A single thrift stamp doesn't look very large and the quarter it costs doesn't seem like it would count for very much, but that thrift stamp means five bullets for one of our soldiers-a clip of cartridges, they'll fill the magazine of his rifle. With them he may save his life and the lives of two or three American heroes in France.

These little war bonds will do lots of big things. Armies can be ammunitioned with them, hungry soldiers fed, fighters kept warm in No Man's land, lives saved-enough of them will bring victory, save the Nation and liberate thousands of poor Europeans whose condition is worse than

They stand for patriotism, those little certificates which cost only a trifle. They are evidences of willingness to serve and back up the boys in the trenches. People who refrain from spending their money on unnecessary things and put it in the tiny war bonds don't have to talk about their loyalty-they are proving it,

The price of the victory stamps can thrift stamps purchased instead. Everyone can give up luxuries, becauss nearly everyone spends money for thing he is not compelled to have. Money saved is money made. Let part of the money in the pay envelope be put to work for Uncle Sam and the Liberty boys. The old hen out there at the barn can help you. Evhave the price of two thrift stampsthat's ten bullets. There are just lots of ways to earn the little treasury bends.

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Those little stamps stand for something else-thrift and prosperity. You help the Government when you buy them, but you also help yourself. You have saved the money, it will come in handy later on, and when you get it back will get a lot of extra Every minute of the time since you lent it to the Government it will have been working for you-making more money for you. When you buy thrift stamps you are not giving away a thing, you are getting paid

for everything you have done. Have the pleasure of knowing that one of those soldiers "over there" is wearing a pair of shoes you bought for him; that a coat your money purchased is keeping him warm: that the ammunition you got for him will help him out of tight places and bring him back home to those who love him.

PLANS MADE TO ENLIST 91,000 TEXAS FACTORY EMPLOYES AS SAVERS

Plans to enlist the 91,000 factory workers of Texas as members of the thrift army have been suggested by L. J. Black of Beaumon's president of one of the largest manufacturing concerns in the South, and approved by Louis Lipsitz, State Director of the National War Savings Committee.

The concern, of which Mr. Black is president, has given every one of its employes a thrift stamp. Since the gift was made, nearly every worker has added five or six stamps every week to his thrift card. That his employes will have no difficulty in buying the little war bonds, Mr. Black has established a stamp sales agency at the plant; the cashier acts

RECORDS BEING MADE IN THRIFT CAMPAIGN BY TEXAS PATRIOTS

Since it was announced by Louis Lipsitz, State Director of the National War Savings Committee, that the Government expects Texans to purchase thrift stamps and savings certificates valued at \$91,000,000, enthusiastic workers have rolled up a number of records that speak volumes for Lone Star patriotism.

The people of Cherokee county lead the counties in the State in the number of limit buyers-persons who have purchased the maximum amount of bonds the individual is permitted to own. The county has eighty-eight members in its Thousand Dollar Club: in Jacksonville alone, seventy two persons have 'gone the limit' and bought 'baby bonds' valued at \$1,000. A. G. Adams is county chairman.

DNE THRIFT STAMP FILLS RIFLE'S MAGAZINE-BABY BOND GETS U. S. SOLDIER PAIR OF SHOES.

If you have an idea that your quarters won't help win the war and do lots of service when invested in thrift stamps and war savings stamps, just look over this table. The little bonds are translated in terms of soldier equipment. Here's how they stack up:

PLANS MADE TO ENLIST 91,000 TEXAS FACTORY EMPLOYES AS SAVERS

Plans to enlist the 91,000 factory workers of Texas as members of the thrift army have been suggested by L. J. Black of Beaumont president of one of the largest manufacturing concerns in the South, and approved the National War Savings Committee.

The concern, of which Mr. Black is president, has given every one of its employes a thrift stamp. Since the gift was made, nearly every worker has added five or six stamps every week to his thrift card. That his employes will have no difficulty in buying the little war bonds, Mr. Black has established a stamp sales agency at the plant; the cashier acts as selling agent.

Mr. Lipsitz is anxious that all of the 5.084 manufacturing plants in Texas make it easy for their employes to buy savings stamps and help them to put aside a definite amount every week. He has suggested that all of these factories, large and small, make arrangements to place thrift and war savings stamps on sale in

If each of the 91,000 workers buys a thrift stamp every week the aggre-

gate weekly investment will be \$22,-750. If they put up a quarter every week for a year, they will have lent the Government \$1.183,000. The Government pays 4 per cent interest comcunded quarterly. The interest lone on this would be a snug little

RECORDS BEING MADE IN THRIFT CAMPAIGN BY TEXAS PATRIOTS

Since it was announced by Louis Lipsitz, State Director of the National War Savings Committee, that the Government expects Texans to purchase thrift stamps and savings certificates valued at \$91,000,000, enthusiastic workers have rolled up a number of records that speak volumes for Lone Star patriotism.

The people of Cherokee county lead the counties in the State in the number of limit buyers-persons who have purchased the maximum amount of bonds the individual is permitted to own. The county has eighty-eight members in its Thousand Dollar Club; in Jacksonville alone, seventytwo persons have 'gone the limit' and bought 'baby bonds' valued at \$1,000.

Letter carriers, the blue-clad men who plow through snow and mud and sun to fill Texas mail boxes, have become enthusiastic ministers of the new gospel of thrift which will help win the war and make possessors out of slackers. R. A. Furr, rural mail carrier in Collin County, has sold more than \$6,500 worth of stamps; \$2,200 of this repravels 28.5 miles every week day and delivers over 4,000,000 pieces of mail every twelve months.

"Well, if you get more out of it in the way of pleasure than I," said Uncle Dan, "you are going some."


"Billie, I have been talking seriously with your father and mother about sending you to a military academy and they asked me to talk with you about


