SACRIFICIAL GIVING IN W. S. S.

Our eyes have beheld wonderful outpourings of personal sacrifice in this great western country since the war began. The Liberty Loan, the Red Cross and W. S. S. came in punctual procession and none of them have been turned away empty handed. Heretofore we have gone over the top with a rush, and how it was done, no one knows, no one can explain. The W. S. S. campaign failed to go over the top, but it ran up magnificently. Merkel's allotment was over \$60,000; she raised over \$18,000. This was in the face of a year of drouth, in the face of loss, and when the hot winds were making another promising crop look sick.

The campaign ended at the Presbyterian church, with an ad dress by Judge Cunningham of Abilene. Introductory remarks were made by T. A. Johnson. He explained that it seemed that some people seemed to hold to the notion that the W. S. S.was a gift, when it should not be so considered. It is an investment and a safe one.

Judge Cunningham spoke interestingly to the audience. He said: "We were told for a time that this war was not a war on the German people, but on the Kaiser. We have at last awakened to the fact that we are fighting the German empire. Visit the schools in Germany and you don't find the German children playing innocent games, but find them marching, to be trained as soldiers. They have the idea that might makes rigt, idea that might makes right, that the Kaiser reigns by divine right.

SOME BIG FIGHTING PLANNED

Severe battles are brewing on the several fighting fronts. All indications point to an early resumption of heavy fighting on the western line. In Italy the mountain zone is again the scene of infantry operations. Tension is increasing along the British front in France in the crescendo of the German artillery fire mouns higher and higher. From Ypres to Rheims, the big guns are busier than they have been for some days and the Germans probably are preparing to reply strongly against the allied nibbing tactics which cost them important points last week.

FOR WOMEN VOTERS

How ballots are prepared: Women present their registration certificate, receive their ballots, slips of paper with names printed thereon, and go to a booth where, in secrecy, they mark out with a black lead pencil the names of all the persons they do not wish to vote. Leaving the ones they are for unmarked. Election judges will not permit aid to be given in preparing a ballot unless the voter cannot read or is physically incapable of preparing the ballot. WARNING-If a ballot is muti-

lated, torn, marked, or erasures made on it do not deposit it with the election judge. Ask for another an mark it correctly. Then hand it to the election judge. He will place a number on the election ballot, which should be folded so he can not see how the person voted. He will then deposit it in the ballot box. Now remember, a blue pencil mark or a hole in the ballot is sufficient to cause the counters to throw out the ballot.

The regiment was divided into three separate trains, one for each battallion and each train was composed of about sixteen cars. The different battallions came by a different route. We had quite an exciting trip. I saw more yesterday than I ever saw before, all put together. We were loaded on a boat on the New Jersey side, and sailed around the biggest end of New York City. Had a close look of the tallest buildings, Saw the Statue of Liberty, and passed under the famous Brooklyn Bridge, and several others just as big. We also came a part of the way down the Hudson River, which is a very notable piece of scenery. We were on the road five days to N. Y. We stopped off once or twice a day to exercise and parade. 



Aug. 24-"Runoff" primary for state and district officers who did not receive a majority vote in the July primary.
