> Paris, July 16.—The battle continues violently, especially south of the Marne and in the region of Chatillon. Americans and French are counter-attacking magnificently and taking many prisoners. South of the Marne the Germans were unable to advance their line beyond Stagnon, La Chapelle, Monthodon, Lisieras and the Forest of Bougigny. The French here took 1,000 prisoners.

Thirty to thirty-five divisions one to every two miles, have been put into the fight by the Germans. The enemy losses were considerable.

That the Germans failed at the start of the offensive is the opinion of French military critics, who though cautious, are unable to conceal their elation at the results. Paris and London press praise the American troops' valor.

Furiously launching new attacks against the allied position on the Marne front from Chateau-Thierry to Rheims, the Ger mans are continuing their offorts to break through the French and American defense. They have made progress during the past night but it has been decidedly slow in comparison with the sweep of the Teutonic legions in their attack in Picardy, Flanders and along the Aisen.

It appears that the enemy after crossing the Marne between Dormans and Chatillon has reached in this area the villages of St. Agnan, La Chapelle and Monthedon which are approximately a mile and three quart-

Wednesday opened up with conditions favorable to the allies Extraordinary heavy artillery fire was in progress by both sides. The general belief by the military critics is that the German drive is a failure. The estimated loss of Germans is about 100,000, while the loss to the allies are almost insignificant. The casualty report of the Americans for the day carried 172 names. There is considerable hot fighting in local points on the line. In many places the allies have gained ground.

The battle still rages, and a fresh German attack is momentarily expected.

Milan, Italy, July 16.—The situation of the belligerents in Albania has been considerably changed by the battle now in progress there. On the night of July 5 the Italians, scaling the rocks above the Tomorica river began a three days' bloody battle in which they captured Cafa Devris, which has an altitude of 3,000 meters (about 10,000 feet) At the same time troops crossed the Vovusa river and attacked the formidable rampart of Malacastra, which could be defended by simply hurling down rocks on the assailants.

Depression, lassitude and hun ger were the principal causes of the Aus trian rout. Two British monitors bombarded the enemy while the Italians gained the first line on Malacastra. Simultaneously cavalry, crossing the marshes near the sea, seized the north cornor of Malacastra, debouched on the plain of Fieri and took an aviation field. Here an Austrian flyer on descending was surprised to find himself a prisoner.



TAKING OF TESTIMONY IN CRIMINAL CASES

House Joint Resolution No. 2.






