There is in sight in Texas, for the construction of roads in the near future, a fund of approximately \$200,000,000, according to information compiled by Curtis Hancock, good roads enthusiast and former chairman of the State Highway Commission. At a cost of \$10,000 per mile for permanent road construction, the fund will build 20,000 miles of roads; at a cost of \$5,000 per mile for roads of a substantial though not permanent type, it will build 40,000 miles of the State highway designated by the State Highway Commission is not more than 18,000 miles.

Mr. Hancock said approximately \$9,000,000 of road bonds which had been previously voted were on hand Jan 1. and that sum is now being expended in road construction. Since Jan. 1, and up to July 1, county and district bonds to the extent of \$53, 213.000 had been voted. The State Highway fund shows more than \$1,600000, all of which has been paid out of the fund up to the last report.

Adding to these figures, the Federal aid granted to Texas, amounting to more than \$16,000,-000, a total of nearly \$80,000,-000 is actually in sight now for road work, Mr. Hancock said.

It is not supposed that all of this money will be expended this year," said Mr. Hancock. "There are not enough contractors or engineers and not sufficient material or labor to take care of the enormous amount of construction involved.

"A number of counties and good roads districts have already ordered bond elections, and many more are agitating the question. It is reasonable to conclude that at least \$25,000,000 more in road bonds will be voted before the end of the year. May Get More Federal Aid

"There is now pending before the voters, to be passed upon on Nov. 4. a State-wide bond issue of \$75,000,000. There are also pending in Congress several bills seeking to appropriate for additional Federal aid \$500,000,000. If Congress should make this appropriation, on a basis of distrition to the States of forme Federal aid. Texas will receive \$30,000,000 as her share.

"With the aid actually in sight and the financing that has a ready been done, added to that of reasonable prospect for future State and Federal aid and county financing, \$200,000,000 will be available in Texas in the near future for road construction. Road builders and men who follow closely the road construction movement are surprised at the amount of work now in progress and in contemplation If Texas carries to completion this enormous program, this State will become as well known for its highways as has California.



CONVICTS WILLING TO OBEY RULES

Leavenworth, Kan., July 28 .-Ready ,after a week's confinement in hot cells on a restricted diet, to submit to the orders of an armed guard numbering 1,3-00 troops from three nearby camps, a part of the 2,500 prisoners at the military barracks at Fort Leavenworth resumed work this morning without any demon stration such as precipitated the strike last Tuesday, according to Colonel Sedgewick Rice, commandant of the prison.

Their cells for weapons, and a number of hidden blackjacks removed, according to prison officials, the men were taken by small detachments from the barracks today and put to work inside the walls of the prison. So thoroughly are the men under control, Colonel Rice declared, that normal prison work, including a resumption of labor on the prison farm will be effected tomorrow morning.

Last Tuesday morning the men refused to leave their cells when ordered to work. Represen tatives among the prisoners, in a conference later with Colonel Rice, demanding better sanitary conditions, the right to submit to President Wilson, a plea for amnesty and the return of two men recently transferred from the military barracks to another federal prison. Upon receipt of the demands at the war department, Secretary Baker is said to have stated that the government would assert its authority at the barracks. Troops were dispatched from Fort Riley, Kans,. Camp Dodge, Iowa, and Camp Grant, Ill., and it the meantime the prisoners remained in their cells under heavy guard, on a general restricted diet.

An order for a general courtmartial at Fort Leavneworth was signed by Secretary Baker following the inception of the strike but it has not been learned whether the scope of the hear ing will include an investigation of the strike situation.

TRIBUNE EDITOR GOT HIS SALARY

ORDERED NONE PAID TO EM-PLOYES WHO ENTERED SERVICE BUT TOOK HIS OWN

AGAINST WAR WITH GERMANY

Joseph Medill Patterson and Writer of "Million Dollar Editorial" Testify in Defense of Paper in the Ford Case.

Mt. Clemens, Mich.-Witnesses for The Chicago Tribune in its defense of its action in labelling Henry Ford an "anarchist" included Joseph Medill Patterson, one of the editors of The Tribune and Clifford S. Raymond, writer of what is now known as the 'million dollar editorial.'

In the course of the testimony it was developed that Mr. Patterson issued an order when Tribune men began to enter the service of the country after the United States entered the war, that no wages were to be paid to the departing men, whether they had dependants or not, but that ne personally continued to dr 7 his salary of \$20,000 a year after he went to France.

Both Mr. Patterson and Mr. Raymand also testified that they knew Germany wanted to see the United States at war with Mexico but that despite this fact The Tribune continued to urge intervention in Mexico and to oppose war with Germany. This was drawn out on cross-examination by counsel for Mr. Ford in an endeavor to show that The Tribune was pro-German up to the time the United States entered the war.

Arrested in Belgium

Counsel for Mr. Ford asked Mr. Patterson if it was not true that he had gone to Germany during the early of writing the German side of the controversy. Mr. Patterson denied this and counsel then introduced a copy of The Tribune in which the announcement was made that Mr. Patterson was being sent to Germany to et the German point of view. The witness admitted having been arrested in Belgium, on leaving Germany, on a charge that he had written pro-

Upon direct examination Mr. Raymond denied knowledge of the International Harvester Co., and Standard Oil Co., stocks held by relatives of the editors and publishers of The Tribune and also denied interference with his editorial utterances.

Mr. Patterson likewise denied that Standard Oil or the International Harvester have had any effect on The Tribune's editorial policies.

Mr. Patterson admitted having once been a member of the socialist party. Ford counsel effered in evidence Mr. Patterson's book, "A Little Brother of the Rich" in an effort to prove that Mr. Patterson once held views similar to those attributed to Henry Ford. It was not admitted.

Writer Too "Pro-British"

The witness admitted having discharged Frederick Wm. Weil, The Tribune's London correspondent, before the United States entered the war. Counsel for 1 ord asked if Weil was told that his articles were too pro-Ally.

"Too pro-British is what I probably said," returned the editor.

Col. Henry J. Reilly, commander of the famous artillery regiment from Chicago, known as "Reilly's Bucks" took the stand and testified as a military expert to the necessity for intervention in Mexico. A long deposition was also read from James W. Gerard. former U. S. Ambassador to Germany, placing the blame for Mexican troubles at Germany's door.


