OIL EXCITEMENT NEAR ABILENE

Oil excitment in Abilene jum ped to fever heat Wednesday mornin following announcement by the operators at the Anderson well, five miles south of this city that a flow estimated variously from 100 to 750 barrels a day has been opened up as a result of the cleaning out process which has been in progress there for the last six weeks.

D. H. Vaughn of Vernon, owner of the lease on the property who personally has been superinending the operations at the well and who has refused to give out any information regarding his plans or progress of the work, Vednesday morning said;

"I have not felt inclined to hake any statement for publiation up to the present time beause I knew nothing definite egarding the condition of the rell or its prospects. We believe ow, however, that we have defnitely proven its value and I have no hesitancy in stating what the results are so far. For several weeks we have been work ing at cleaning out the hole and attempting to disloge a heavy wooden plug that is stuck in the casing about 600 feet from the surface. For the last several days the oil and gas pressure from below has been heavy and we have been runing a small hand pump in order to keep the flow down so we could work. We know nothing of the particulars leading to this tragedy and yet we would not be afraid to lay a wager on our guess that Clara Smith was not the agressor of this unfortunate affair. Our guess is that she did not seek, but was sought. If we had a full history of the case we would find that the rich man paid court at the beauty of the young woman-that he praised her beauty, flattered her, lavished his wealth upon her, and by perjured arts and dissembling smooth won her heart.

Jake Hamon is in his grave and many will speak of his frailties, but not his wife-not the good woman who gave her life into his keeping in her youth, when he was unknown and poor. She will ever contend that he was good, and lay the blame upon the weaker vessel, who though living, suffers far more than Jake Hamon suffered from the bullet that caused his death.

TEXAS HAS RECORD— BREAKING CROP

Texas has had a record-breaking crop year, according to the report of the Bureau of Crop Estimates of the United States Department of Agriculture, just issued by he Industrial Congress.

Corn averaged twenty-six bushels per acre, potatoes aver aged fifty-two bushels to the ac re on Irish potatoes, and on sweet potatoes 105 bushels per acre. The following are the total yeilds of each of the crops. Corn, 172,25 0,000 bushels; Irish potatoes, 2, 340,000 bushels; sweet potatoes, 9,345,000 bushels, grain, sorghum crop, 60,992,000 bushels, peanuts,5,157,000 bushels, Cotton, 3,900,000 (estimate) bales, and fruit as a half crop with 351, 000 bushels of apples and 205,000 bushels of pears

The State also made 705,000 gallons of sorghum syrup.

It was dedicated to the Goddess of Love, which explains the custom of kissing under the mistletoe.
