

will either be an inmate of a poor house or an insane asylum. In the cities demands are for higher prices and increased wag es and shorter hours of service and lower cost of living. Class organizations are working for selfish purposes regardless of the interests of all others. Farm ers will likely "cut the cotton acreage" and produce more of other necessities and find themselves up against an "overproduction" and unprofitable prices for the "diversified products and high prices for the things they can't produce and must buy. Business seems to be planned to make the farmer work long hours, live close, sell what he produces below cost of production, and pay big prices for the things others produce on few labor hours at high wages and under charming living conditions as compared to the majority of those living on farms. If Farm and Ranch was in the

"advising" business it would say to the farmer: cultivate only half the amount, or less, of land that has been cultivated, and on that cultivated, plant and till first for home consumption and second for the market, and don't sell anything until a price that will return a fair profit on labor and investment is offered. Others, by organizing or "gentlemen's agreements" regulate their working hours and wage scales and prices of what they make and sell, and until the farmer places himself in position to demand and obtain fair prices he will continue producing what others must have or starve, and see most of the remainder of the population live easy at cost of his long hours of hard work under, as a rule, almost unendurable living condi-






