Tuttle Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church in America, Kathleen Booth of the Salvation Army, Secretary of Labor James A. Davis, Secretary Andrew W. Mellon of the Treasury, Rabbi Stephen S. Wise of New York, and from others of equal note. Letters from Cardinals. Dougherty and O'Connell follow:

"His Excellency, the President of the United States, having declared by proclamation that the Annual Membership Roll Call of the American Red Cross shall begin on Armistice Day and continue until November 24th, I deem it a duty to exhort all our citizens to enroll themselves in this admirable organization, which, for many years past, and especially during the World War, has rendered to mankind such noble services and benefactions. "In times of peace, it has come to

the rescue of the victims of pestilence. famine, fire, floods, and other great calamities; and it strives to devise and carry on measures for preventing the causes of suffering.

"In war, it has been a medium of communication between the American people and their Army and Navy; and It has cared for the sick and wounded throughout the world, irrespective of race and creed.

FLOUR SACK CAUSES FIRST-AID CALL

An odd case of first-ald was required of a newly installed Red Cross nurse at Bendena, Kan., recently, according to advices from that town.

A deaf man, who was endeavoring to help the woman clerk in a grocery store carry a sack of flour from the store room to his waiting automobile, inadvertently caught the drag-hook in her finger and dragged her instead of the sack of flour across the floor. His back was turned, and being too deaf to hear her cries, he did not know of the accident until he turned to lift the flour into his machine. The hook was so deeply imbedded in the woman's hand that surgery was necessary to remove It, but the Red Cross nurse was able to relieve her pain with first-aid at once while a surgeon was being summoned.

Red Cross nurses in the chapters where public health work is conducted are constantly having just such calls as this, and frequently find themselves the only available help in serious emergencies. In many of the Red Cross Chapters employing public health purses, the work is financed by the receipts from the annual Roll Call. 

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSES CARE FOR 200,000 IN THE SOUTHWEST

Workers in Red Cross Chapters in Seven States Have Big Job.

If the 194 public health nurses now working under the emblem of the Red Cross in the Southwestern Division of the American Red Cross were withdrawn tomorrow, more than 200,000 sick and infirm men, women and children would be left without nursing care and advice, according to Miss Olive Chapman, Director of Nursing of the Southwestern Division of the American Red Cross.

The Public Health Nurse is one of the most important officers in the American Red Cross today. Her job is to help the people to get well and to keep well. She teaches mothers how to look after their babies and school children how to avoid illness and disease. She is found in schools, homes, playgrounds, industrial plants, department stores, hospitals, and health centers. Her work is in the small towns and in the big cities, in the rural communities and in the lonely mountain regions of the West. She is wherever there is need for her service, regardless of race, religion or social conditions.

Any form of community work in which the health of the public is concerned is hers. She visits the rich and the poor alike and teaches both the common sense rules of good health. She locates tuberculous patients and cares for them, and at the same time teaches the families how to prevent the disease from spreading to other members. She assists in school medical inspection of children and follows defective children into their homes to advise the parents and induce them to act on the advice of the school doctor. She watches over families in which there are contagious diseases, such as dyphtheria, scarlet fever, whooping cough and influenza, and teaches the families how to isolate the patient so as to prevent infection.

Messages were received from President Harding, Vice-President Coolidge, General John J. Pershing, Chief Justice of the United States William Howard Taft, Secretary of State Charles E. > FLOUR SACK CAUSES FIRST-AID CALL

An odd case of first-ald was required of a newly installed Red Cross nurse at Bendena, Kan., recently, according to advices from that town.

A deaf man, who was endeavoring to help the woman clerk in a grocery store carry a sack of flour from the store room to his waiting automobile, inadvertently caught the drag-hook in her finger and dragged her instead of the sack of flour across the floor. His back was turned, and being too deaf to hear her cries, he did not know of the accident until he turned to lift the flour into his machine, The hook was so deeply imbedded in the woman's hand that surgery was necessary to remove It, but the Red Cross nurse was able to relieve her pain with first-aid at once while a surgeon was being summoned.

Red Cross nurses in the chapters where public health work is conducted are constantly having just such calls as this, and frequently find themselves the only available help in serious emergencies. In many of the Red Cross Chapters employing public health nurses, the work is financed by the receipts from the annual Roll Call. JUNIOR RED CROSS GIVES SCHOOLS TO ITALIAN CHILDREN

First Farm School in Italy Supported by American Boys and Girls.

The Junior American Red Cross is responsible for the pioneer foreign school of Italy. This school is located in the province of Umbria, not very far from Rome, and is housed in a historic building consecrated in ancient imes by St. Francis d'Assizi. In this school Italy is trying its first experiment in student government as a means of training the children of that nation in the duties and responsibilities of citizenship. The success is not yet assured, but the experiment is attracting nation-wide interest and has brought much renown to the Junfor Red Cross of America.

When the army of Austria first over-ran Italy in the fall of 1917, many school teachers fled to the South with their pupils. One of these, who had taught in a boys' school and had managed to bring his entire class through to safety, planned the farm school, which is known as the Collestrada School. Officials of the American Red Cross aided in the selection of the site, a huge, well-proportioned old hospital, where years ago St. Francis d'Assizi used to visit the sick. The Junior Red Cross of America provided the means for supporting these Italian children who were orphaned by war, and in recognition of this fact an inscription was placed over the door as follows:

"The Junior American Red Cross restored this historic building, consecrated in ancient times by St. Francis, and it is now the home of the Italian children orphaned during the war."

The boys in this farm school all work together for the common good, They apportion the work among themelves, have a school president, whom they elect by popular vote, and have a regular disciplinary code and a board of discipline, members of which are appointed by the school as a whole, This board decides the punishment to be given offenders against the school's

With the aid of their teacher in mathematics, the boy farmers keep their own accounts. Under the guidance of their other teachers they cultivate the school's lands, raise chickens, turkeys, rabbits and bees, and with the surplus of the proceeds of their farms they support other orphans like themselves who wish to join the col-

There now are fifty boys in the school, and other schools in Italy are trying out in a more or less complete the Collestrada School,

A dispatch from Chicago announcing the intention of the class A railroads to post notices of another cut in wages, says:

"Before the notices are posted however, according to execut ives here, a committee of the American Association of Railroad Executives will confer with the Interstate Commerce Commision at Washington and discuss lower freight rates on bas is commodoties. It is the intention of the carriers, it was said to make clear that the wage-re duction sought would be translated into reduced freight costs in the hope of stimulating business."

This looks supiciously like an attempt to join irrevocably in the public mind the question of rate reduction with that of fur ther reductions in wages. Such a connection may indeed exist in fact, but the railroads are un der no obligation to prove it to the public before they can expect support for another move for reduced wages on that score. Freight rates are too high. But wages have been reduced and rates have not. When the present scale of rates was made the chief plea made was that the in crease in wages made necessary. Moreover, almost every thing the railroads use has come down in price in the meantime .Every thing is cheaper. Besides that there is reason to believe that the payrolls were unnecessaily overaoded at the time the rates were fixed, and much efficiency has been introduced into the op eration of the roads in this res pect since. Instead of insisting that the wages must be reduced further before there is a cut in rates, it would seem that it is up to the railroads to show why rates should not be reduced now.

The Railroad Labor Board should not be placed in the posit ion before the public of standing in the way of a reduction of rates, if it finds the railroads are not entitled to a further wage reduction.

All this may be superficial. But it is up to the roads to make out a case before the public .--Star Telegram.
