



Time's Changes Since 1859. Times have changed since 1869, when John Eaton, Jr., was superintendent of schools for Tennessee. In


Eaton's biennial report, published in 1869 the following excerpt appears: "The prejudice existing in most communities to this class of instructors (women teachers) is as groundless as it is unjust. The eight lady teachers who have so honorably acquitted themselves in our school have proven beyond a doubt their capacity to teach, govern and manage the largest and most unruly. They are not only equal to male teachers in the exercise of the
