New State Highways Designated. Austin, Texas.-Carrying out policy of expanding the State's highway system to keep pace with the State's growth, the Highway Commission designated about 200 miles of new highway. The following routes were designated and added to the system for construction of new permanent highways: Newcastle, Young County, through Throckmorton County to Haskell, to Rule, to Asperment eighty miles; Brownwood to Carbon, Eastland County, by way of Rising Star, about fifty miles; Eastland to Stephenville, about forty miles; Munday to Knox City, about ten miles; Benjamin to Guthrie to Dickens about sixty miles. The commission granted Eastland County State aid of \$125,000 on three roads, provided the county supplies the balance of about \$200,000.
